# Khaki Clothes; Mercy Mission; Night Flying

Fifth of a series edited by Mark E. Cramer of The Herald, who was one of 40 American newsmen assigned to observe U. S. Atlantic fleet and Allied units in NATO maneuvers during September off northern European coast.

I have adopted navy clothes. After greasing up a suit on a few plane tie-down cables I found my way with the other land-lubbers to one of the ship's stores. There are five stores on board the Midway. Most of the newsmen are wearing khaki shirts and pants by now.

There are too many dark areas, too much fresh paint, too many greasy cables and too much dripping oil as you climb around and under planes to wear anything but khaki.

**Finding The Way**  
The distances on this ship are tremendous. The quickest way to reach the ward room (our mess,

or dining and lounge room) from my cabin, for example, is to go down two sets of ladders to the hangar deck, then in my way under plane wings and over cables for about two blocks off, and then down a ship's ladder one more

deck. If the hangar deck is filled with tied-down planes and it is windy at night, the next best route is to take the catwalk for some 400 feet and then drop down to the hangar deck. Either route involves going under the folded wings of planes and over cables and generally means several new head and shin bumps per trip.

It is a full-size job to feed, house, launder, clean and generally take care of some 3700 men on one ship. That is as many people as live in Wayne.

**Real Mercy Mission**  
The Navy has a big heart. Human kindness moves anything to clear the path.

Here is an example: Ernest E. Ashley, chief aviation structural mechanic aboard received an emergency message stating that his seven-year-old son had died after a tonsillectomy.

Immediately an emergency leave was granted by the ship captain and wheels began to turn. Nearest land was Bermuda.

Only planes aboard ship with range and passenger accommodations are a few patrol bombers, which were located in an inaccessible corner because the fighter

planes were making frequent flights in maneuvers. More than 100 Navy men had to clear decks and move several score planes over a period of about two hours to clear the path for Lt. W. F. Johnson, Transport Squadron 22, to take off with Ashley and the mail for Bermuda, then return to ship.

A "lift" by teamwork. This mercy mission to get the grief-stricken father back to his family in time for the funeral services and to comfort his wife, who

And you might need a little help, even ask the Wayne Poultry and Egg to bring out a few supplies.

For 3,700 men at breakfast, about 7,000 eggs, over 700 dozen, are served every morning (while fresh eggs last). After some time at sea ... It is always scrambled eggs (from powdered eggs), and quite a few hens would be needed from a Wayne county farm feed lot to furnish the bacon for one breakfast. Average is 650 pies served at one meal.

More than two tons of potatoes literally 'disappear' daily. Sunday dinner we had turkey, and I saw that pile of turkey when first taken out of the cold storage lockers. About the size of an automobile! (Chicken, steak, chops) roasts are served by the ton.

One is expecting another baby soon, gave every sailor aboard a lift. Working half the night to clear the decks for the flight was "nothing". Teamwork which looks out for each member of the crew is the teamwork that wins battles, too. About the time the sad news

reached Ashley, the carrier Midway was launching and receiving night fighters. The ship was blacked out. In the moonlight the dark, hazy, figures of other ships could be seen in regular position. Night fighters took off with little visible assistance, roaring off into the black. Like their daylight counterparts, the night hawks formed into squadrons, flew out to sea for various purposes. Some went on patrol duty, some made passes at their targets.

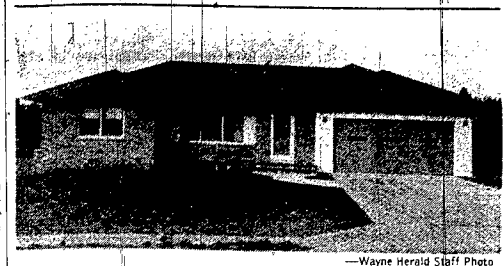
**Landings - No Lights**  
Night landings are fascinating. Practically no lights are used. The signal officers wear mittens with luminescent stripes on them, directing the planes just as if it were day. Steps are taken to outline a portion of the ship to the incoming pilot, but all bright lights strictly are taboo. Men streak back and forth on little towing trucks, pulling planes here, moving them there working up and down elevators, both on the interior and on the side.

The dark figures fitting from plane to plane are men accustomed to working in the dark. Light impairs their work because several minutes are required to accustom themselves to the darkness again. The pilots stay away from all light for 30 minutes to an hour before taking off on a night flight.

## Building a Better Community

It is one thing to design a home and another to realize the dream of building it. Mrs. Chris Tietgen planned the complete 58 x 38 ranch-style home at 722 Sherman and she and Mr. Tietgen moved in Oct. 18. It was begun April 10.

Since the 9x18 kitchen is Mrs. Tietgen's dream-come-true, perhaps that should be described first. Light blue walls and rose floors set the pace of the color scheme with rose trimming and the dark blue interiors in all the cabinets. The table top is grey and most metal accessories are copper.

The arrangement of the kitchen is complete: shelves roll out easily; drawers are metal lined, and one cabinet has a group of revolving shelves to hold supplies needed quickly. A group of shelves may be opened from the kitchen and from the dinette. There is a maple-top ped space used as a chopping block near the stove. The china closet is in the kitchen near the dining

area. Lined chintz drapes are rose, yellow, white and brown plaid. There is a bay window effect consisting of a thermopane flanked by two small windows in the dinette where the table sits.

The living room measures 15x23. The dinette 9x11 and two bedrooms 12x14 each. The cocoa brown walls and valances in the living room and dining space are brightened by chartreuse metallic drapes. The north wall has plaid wallpaper in all colors of the room, brown, cocoa, rust gold, and chartreuse.

These colors are also picked up in the flowered chair and glider. Other chairs are rose-beige and lime green with matching rose and white lamps. The wall-to-wall carpet is swirled in grey, green and brown. There is a feature in the living room area which Mrs. Tietgen is especially proud of: a picture window in the back opens onto the patio on the west side of the home. A large gold-framed mirror on the

south wall in the living room is flanked by two birch-framed pictures of a whole Mrs. Tietgen was at the Canadian Rockies.

All woodwork is blond birch in semi-gloss finish, and all furniture, except in one bedroom, is mahogany. There is a built-in novelty and book shelf space in the living room.

Master bedroom has pinkish-sand colored walls and dark sea-green wall-to-wall carpeting. White, rose and green flowered valances top the white criss-cross curtains. The double wardrobe with sliding doors belongs to Mrs. Tietgen and the other is Mr. Tietgen's.

Brown, chartreuse and dark green French provincial block print paper covers the hallway. There is a large linen storage and a cedar-lined closet.

Guest room walls are dark aqua and the carpet is rose-beige. Criss-cross curtains are sand-colored and the satin spread is peach. Wardrobe is three-door and has a built-in chest. All closet rods in the home are chrome.

Orchid walls and woodwork, and yellow tile trimmed in burgundy form the color scheme for the bathroom. Over the orchid dressing table is a 30x40-inch mirror. Grey and yellow flowered drapes, trellis-like plant rack, and grey fixtures complete the bath. Mrs. Tietgen designed the clothes hamper which opens from two sides.

The utility room has rose walls and brown and tan asphalt floors. The double garage is painted light green and has automatic door control. The recreation room in the basement has maple furnishings covered with green plaid. The checkerboard floor is brown, tan and rust. An antelope head, deer head and deer horns decorate the south

wall. Mr. Tietgen shot the animals himself.

There is also a furnace room, fruit room in red, and a kitchen in yellow in the basement. The kitchen floor is light and dark green with red trimming and the table-top is grey. Shower room is light green.

The front hall has wallpaper in a brown, white and green polka-dot and feather design. There is a wide closet and the floor is of cork. Roof of the home is made of fire - check shingles in grey. The home is in Arkansas harmony lodge-stone and white siding trimmed in a rose color to match the stone.

Closet doors are equipped so that the closet lights go on when the doors are opened. Switches throughout the home are about mercury switches. There is a disappearing stairway to the attic. The patio is floored in quarry tile and is closed in with a wrought iron rail.

The Tietgens are beginning work on the backyard which will have a sunken garden and outdoor fireplace. The terracing has begun. Shrubbery will be planted later.

Mrs. Tietgen composed a poem prior to their moving in, a poem which describes the complete home adequately.

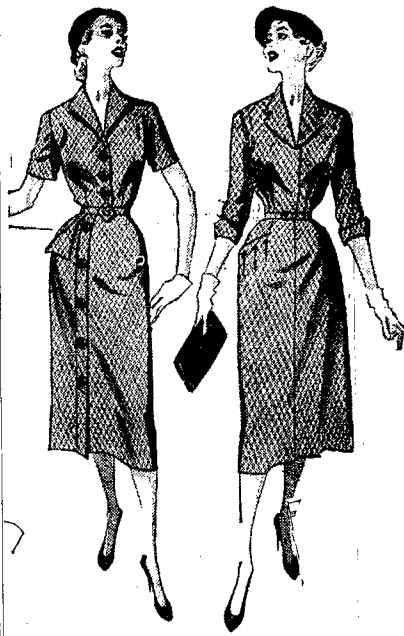
