The General **Economic Situation**

The national ecohomy is expected to continue relatively strong without any major interruptions for the next 12 months. Industrial production, employment and income are expected to continue strong. The primary stimulating force in the economy is expenditures for national defense. At present, annual governmental expenditures for defense are at the \$30 billion annual level. At this time next year, peak defense expenditures at the rate of \$55 to \$60 billion annually are expected to have been reached. The defense program calls for a leveling off of defense expenditures in the last half of 1953. It is hoped that within a few years defense, expenditures can be reduced to around \$10 billion or less annually. The rate of \$40 billion may be the size of our defense program for many years.

Less Defense Spending, Less Boom

If the nation is permitted to level off of even reduce its spending for defense, certain readjustments will be nicessary in our economy. When the stimulating foice of increasing governmental spending is withdrawn there will be at least tem-

porarily a feduction in employment. Reduced employment will cause a reduction in incomes which in turn reduces general demand. The effects of reduced demand do not affect all segments of the economy alike. Some segments are affected scarcely at all, while others may be rather severely affected for a time at least.

Readjustment To Be Short

Some defense stimulated industries are now con-cerned with prospects of a business collapse some-time in 1954 similar to the 1948-49 business reces-sion. Serious trouble is not expected, however, Re-covery should be underway by 1955. If one studies

the price level since the outbreak of fighting in Koros, it is fairly easy to realize that the price rise since the Korean outbreak was war stimulated and is due for a certain amount of readjustments downwards. The easing off of governmental expenditures will bring this adjustment about. For agriculture, the readjustment is at hand. Total national farm income for 1952 will be \$1 billion below 1951. Agricultural income in 1953 may be down by about the same amount.

Cattle production in 1953 will be the most important factor in the meat animal situation. Cattle slaughter in 1953 is expected to increase even more than it did in 1952 and continued increase in the

Nambers of cattle on farms indicates still more slaughter in 1953 is expected to increase even more cattle in 1953 will probably be sufficient to continue the general decline in prices of cattle and will probably also prevent any marked improvement in the price of hogs. Prices of lambs in 1953 may be somewhat lower than in 1952. This does not necessarily mean that livestock production will be unprofitable in 1953 but it does indicate a reduction in profit margins. Livestock farmers in Nebraska, as elsewhere, will find it advantageous to keep in close touch with seasonal developments throughout the coming year.

Meat Production Near Record

Meat Production Near Record

Although slaughter of hogs is expected to be a little lower than in 1952 and slaughter of sheep and lambs about the same, the increase in cattle slaughter may push total meat production in 1958 moderately above 1952 and perhaps to a record level. Production of red meats rose moderately in 1952 and will continue to rise in 1953. Production in 1952 is expected to be 3° higher than it was in 1951 and the forecast indicates a further increase of a like amount in 1953. While the anticipated production in 1953 approximately equals the peacetime high of 1947, the production per capita will be 10 pounds less since the population has increased appreciably in the meantime. Imports of meat, thus far in 1952, are less than last year. Imports of lower prices on South American imports, the shipments of Mexican cattle, and repeal of the embargo on Canadian cattle.

Cattle Prices Depend on Income

Cattle Prices Depend on Income

How much prices of red meats decline in 1953 will depend in large measure on employment and incomes of consumers. Continued high employment and incomes would cushion price declines considerably but a business recession would magnify them. Thus far, most price changes for meats have been due to increased supplies. Demands for

meats has apparently remained strong, as indicated by the fact that the retail value of meat consumption in 1952 is as high relative to incomes as it was in 1950 and 1951.

Retail Prices are Slightly Down

Sustained by high incomes of consumers the retail price of steer beef cuts at New York in August was only 4% less than last August and the prices of pork and lamb this August were slightly higher than a year earlier. However, many meat prices in August a year ago were limited by ceilings. Without ceilings, prices of meat probably

10-15% More Meat in 1953

Slaughter of cattle and calves in 1952 will probably total around 27.5 million head, about 6% above 1951. A further increase of 10115% is expected in 1953. In spite of increased slaughter approximately 5 million head are being added to cattle inventories this year. Cattle numbers on farms are expected to continue to increase possibly reaching a record high of 100 million by 1955. Such events as a widespread drouth or an extremely sharp break in prices would doubtless result in greatly increased slaughter, but-a grad-

ual increase scems more likely. During the first 8 months of this year 10% more steers were slaughtered as compared with the same period in 1951. Steers have been slaughtered

Low Grades, Hit Hardest

Low Grades, Hit Hardest
Prices of beef cattle have declined during 1952, with fed cattle showing the least decline. Prices of cows, feeder and stocker cattle, and lower grade slaughter steers have declined most. The price of choice slaughter steers at the Omaha market September 1952 was \$4.82 per cwt. below the price in September 1951. Between October 6, 1951 and October 4, 1952 the decrease in price amounted to \$9.40 for commercial cows and \$5.28 for commercial/steers. And grade "good" feeder cattle prices averaged \$8.25 below the same date. Though increased slaughter has had the 'greatest influence on prices, lower prices for hides and other byproducts have: also had some depressing effects.


Lower Prices to Continue

A further reduction in prices of cattle will likely accompany the increase in slaughter in 1953. High income of consumers and a growing population will help to prevent sharp price breaks. The relatively smaller supply of pork will be a favorable influence, also, Returns from cattle feeding in 1953 may be about average in spite of the record volume of cattle now on feed.

Hog Prospects Discouraging

Fewer hogs will be slaughtered during the first
7 or 8 months of 1953, compared with the same
period in 1952, the largest reduction being expected at mid-winter. The magnitude of hog
slaughter in the later months of 1953 will be determined by the number of pigs farrowed next

reduction in that crop. Furthermore, the hog-corn
ratio this fall is averaging a little below normal
for the season and outbreaks of hog diseases in the

It appeared that a sustained uptrend was beginning. But throughout 1952, sheep and lamb slaughter has been continuously larger than in 1951. to 21%. Most of the gain was in lambs and yearlings. Slaughter of "sheep" (which are mostly ewes) under Federal inspection did not run ahead of last year until August, and for the first 8 months totaled only 14% over a year before. This does not indicate a large-scale selling of breeding herds of sheep. However, fewer lambs are being added to breeding herds this year than last year. Although lambs will receive increased competition from beef next year, no large price reduction is expected. Prices of wool are likely to be about as high as in 1952, since a price support program will continue to hold a floor under prices. The price trends in prospect for lambs and wool are generally more favorable to producers than are those expected for prices of cattle, because of relatively larger increases expected in cattle slaughter.

The Feed Situation for 1953

Total feed supplies for the 1952-53 feeding season should be ample. This is especially true for the Midwest and West. The South is faced with a shortage of feed in some areas and will have to ship in feed. The prolonged drouth has left some areas with a serious shortage of feed supplies.

Record Nebraska Corn Crop

Nebraska's corn crop is estimated at 255 million bushels, one of the largest on record and the quali-ty is good. Nationally, a 31/4 billion bushel crop is forecast. This is well above the 10-year average.

Barley and Oats Poor

Oats and barley production in Nebraska was far below average and the quality is generally light. The United States crop was slightly below the 10-year average. Grain sorghum production is low

Wheat . . .
