Report only Third Have Made Claims

Taxpayers in Nebraska's rural grade school districts Saturday were reminded to claim their refunds from the 1951-52 tax year.

State Tax Commissioner Philip K. Johnson noted that the refund period is "slipping by" and many taxpayers apparently haven't yet applied for the money that is owing to them.

Reports from across the state indicate that in some counties as little as one-third of the refunds have been claimed.

Taxpayers are entitled to get back any money they paid between Nov. 1, 1951 and June 30, 1952 under the 1949 rural grade school blanket tax levy which was knocked out by the State Supreme court earlier this year.

The tax commissioner said the amount of money available for refund was estimated at from \$50 to six million dollars.

A special legislative session last summer set an eight-month time limit for rural grade school residents to file their refund claims with their county treasurer. The deadline comes early in April.

Warned Against Poisoning Hazards

Lincoln—Discarded storage batteries may be useless for starting motors, but they can still pack a lethal punch when it comes to killing livestock, the American Foundation for Animal Health warned farmers today.

"Batteries left lying around barnyards, feedlots, or pastures can be a deadly source of lead poisoning to farm animals," says the foundation.

"Lead poisoning can occur when an animal licks old batteries, eats orchard grass that has been treated with lead arsenate, or licks paints, ointments, or salves which contain lead."

Foundation authorities also recommended that farmers check against five additional livestock poisoning hazards:

- (1) Mercury poisoning from eating seed grain that has been treated with mercury.
- (2) Rat poisons, including warfarin, if sufficient amounts are consumed over a long period of time.
- (3) Chemical weed killers which may contain substances poisonous to stock.
- (4) Grasshopper poisons, such as arsenic-treated bran.
- (5) Highway spraying oil which rains wash into pastures.

Farmers who suspect a case of livestock poisoning were urged to get a veterinarian on the job as promptly as possible, as time is an important factor in saving the animal's life.

Farm Exhibits Now on Tour

Lincoln—Work has begun at the University of Nebraska college of agriculture on exhibits to be included in an agricultural road show which will take to the highways shortly after the first of the year to visit Nebraska counties.

The project, sponsored by the University's Agricultural Extension service and financed in large measure by Alt-Sar-Ben, will feature the latest developments in livestock production, soil conservation, youth activities, poultry breeding, and home-making.

A group of top-flight college of agriculture experts will accompany the exhibits to answer questions.

The Nebraska caravan is patterned after a similar project which has proved highly successful in South Dakota during the past three years. The main aim is to enable farmers and ranchers who are unable to visit the college to see and discuss innovations in agricultural production and conservation methods.

E. W. Janike, associate director of the Extension service, said the aid of county extension agents and civic groups is being enlisted to explain the purpose of the project locally.

If the first tour fulfills expectations, the caravan will be made an annual event, visiting different sections of the state.

W. D. Lane, president of Alt-Sar-Ben, said, "We believe great benefit can result from bringing agricultural college experts into direct contact with farmers and livestock producers and we hope the various local civic organizations will cooperate with us and the Extension service to make this traveling 'short course' available to every interested person."

Farmstead Water Loans Available

Loans to finance wells, pumps, pressure tanks, storage tanks, distributing pipes, etc., are available through the Farmers Home Administration. This announcement was made today by William L. Owens, county supervisor of the Dakota-Wayne county unit at Wayne.

Such loans are available to farm owners or to tenants who have adequate tenure arrangements. These loans draw three percent interest and may be made on either chattel or real estate security or both.

Farmers in need of such facilities may obtain further information at the FHLA office at the Court.

Do Not Cut Down on Fertilizer

It's false economy to cut down on fertilizer when farm prices drop. That's the opinion of Dr. M. D. Weldon, Extension Soils specialist at the University of Nebraska.

Even if farm prices were cut in half and fertilizer prices remained the same, the average Nebraska farmer would get \$1.50 to \$2.50 in increased crop value for each dollar spent for fertilizer, Dr. Weldon said.

Nebraska could use profitably 200 thousand tons of fertilizer a year, he believes. Present use is about 80 thousand tons a year. In 1940 only two thousand tons were used in this state.

All parcel post for either coast or other distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10.

Parcels mailed to intermediate points — (distances 300 to 1,000 miles) — should be mailed by Dec. 15, and the deadline for packages for closer points is Dec. 18.

While the above dates allow for approximately twice the time normally needed, residents are reminded that mail volume at this time increases by several hundred per cent. In addition the possibility of transportation becoming storm bound is ever present.
