

Wayne Pair Return from German Trip

The mayor of Bunde, Germany sends his greetings to Wayne Mayor Glen Houdenshield and the city of Wayne. Henry (Heine) Victor reported Tuesday when asked about his recent trip to Germany.

He and his wife returned Saturday night after a month's stay in Bunde, Germany where they visited his mother, Luise Victor, and four sisters.

When Street Commissioner Victor left for Germany he took with him a letter from Mayor Houdenshield extending best wishes and asking the mayor of Bunde to make sure he returned to Wayne when his vacation was up. "Heine" had a personal interview with Mayor Michels at Bunde and delivered the message.

Flight Takes 15 1/2 Hours
Mr. and Mrs. Victor left Wayne Nov. 2 for New York where they boarded a plane for Bremen, Germany, Nov. 4. They arrived in Bremen 15 1/2 hours later, including two 45-minute stops at Newfoundland and Scotland.

From Bremen they journeyed 180 miles to his mother's country home near Bunde where they stayed, except for a few side trips, one to Essen and the Ruhr valley, and one to Alhorn where they spent the

night with relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Karl Ote, Wayne. The weather did not favor the Victor's during their stay in Germany and "Heine" was ill with the flu most of the time. Cold rain, fog, mist and snow were the order of the day and the sun only shone about six hours during their stay.

When asked about Germany's economy "Heine" stated everything is practically back to normal.

Most goods are cheaper there than they are here, except cigarettes, coffee and gasoline. There is no rationing except for coal. **Coffee \$4.20 Pounds**

"Heine" said coffee sold for about \$4.20 and cigarettes were over three times as expensive as here. As in America, Germany is having a commercial building boom. "Heine" reported German citizens could not believe that we could have trees dug up and hauled away.

In Germany, wood sells for \$1 per hundred pounds while coal sells for \$1.25.

While there, the Wayne couple rented a two-cylinder car for an outing. However, "Heine" said he had to quit that because he was afraid he might run over someone. Because of heavy bicycle traffic and the unusually high number of pedestrians, driving is very difficult.

It seems German citizens are not impressed by President-elect Dwight Eisenhower. There is still resentment over the prisoner situation at the close of WWII. Most Germans do not think Russia will start another major conflict. Victor stated.

Mr. and Mrs. Victor left Thursday on the return trip. Because of head winds the flight back took 18 1/2 hours. They arrived in Wayne at 1:30 Saturday night.

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Young Observing 57th Anniversary Have Lived In Region 45 Years

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Young will celebrate their 57th wedding anniversary today at their home.

Mr. Young, 79, and Mrs. Young, 76, were married in Hancock, Ia., Dec. 11, 1895 and have lived in Wayne vicinity for 45 years. They moved to Wayne from the farm eight years ago this spring.

Their only living attendant to the wedding, Arthur Halliday, Dixon, is Mrs. Young's brother.

The Youngs' children include Arthur, who lives north of Laurel on the homestead to which the Youngs moved after coming here 45 years ago; and Alvin, who moved into Bolden this fall after retiring from the farm. Two children died in infancy.

Two of the Youngs' eight grandchildren live in Wayne with them. There are also seven great grandchildren. All the family lives in Bolden and Wayne vicinity.

The Youngs plan to celebrate quietly at home today, and all friends are invited to visit them.

Concert Held Here Sunday

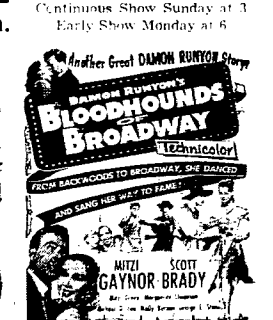

Grain Drying 'Here to Stay'
Lincoln—University of Nebraska Economics Professor Dr. Harvey C. Whitney believes artificial grain drying is here to stay — rain or shine.
The activity was introduced in Nebraska eight years ago, and Dr. Whitney said Nebraska farmers and grain men already have invested more than a million dollars in drying equipment, with the trend still upward. And, he said, this investment does not include that of terminal elevators in the state.
The expert says that even a dry fall such as Nebraska had this year will not remove the need for artificial drying.
He points out that many abandoned winter wheat fields always will be rdson to spring grains which at harvest time can be helped by drying to take out moisture and facilitate removal of weedy materials.
Dr. Whitney says that in 1950 country elevators dried about 88 per cent of the approximately 11 million bushels of grain dried in the state. This, he adds, indicates a new business opportunity for the state, provided commercial driers

are located in areas where at least 80 thousand bushels of grain are produced and three per cent of the total offered for drying.
Citing costs, Dr. Whitney says drying from one thousand to five thousand bushels with unheated air in a farm crib usually runs from 7.4 to 3.8 cents a bushel. With heat the cost is from 8.5 to about 3.6 cents for from one thousand to seven thousand bushels.
In country elevators, drying costs vary greatly. If not more than 20 thousand bushels were dried it might run 9.3 cents a bushel, but probably would drop to about 2.65 cents if the total dried was 100 thousand bushels, Dr. Whitney says.
"Taking everything into consideration, it is likely that the wheat harvest, during normal years, could be completed on the average five days earlier with the use of grain driers," he said. "Probably savings from hail losses alone during those five days approximates one cent per bushel of wheat in many areas of Western Nebraska. Other savings would be greater."

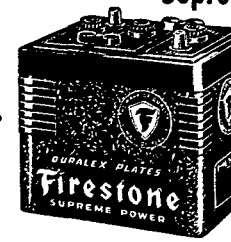

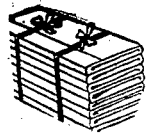

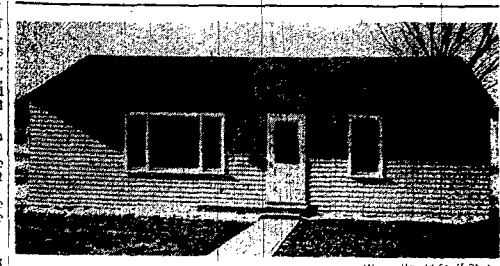

Pair chartrouse walls are the basis for the green and white color scheme in the master bedroom. Bradley, 9, has a room with light orchid walls and an ivory ceiling. The desk is painted yellow and chartrouse and there are other yellow accessories.
