Fire Bell Tuesday Opens 'Mothers March on Polio'

"Contribute your dollars to the March of Dimes" will be the slogan of 30 mothers who will canvass Wayne Tuesday morning, Jan. 13 in the "Mothers March on Polio."

At 9:30 a. m. the fire bell will ring, announcing the beginning of the drive.
Every house in the city of Wayne will be canvassed for funds. And then the women will return to the woman's club rooms for an accounting of the funds.
Coffee will be served by those in charge of the drive: Mrs. E. Ley, Tietgen, city campaign director; Mrs. Harry G. Kay, southeast Wayne; Mrs. J. Echtenkamp, southwest Wayne; Mrs. Tom Williams, northeast Wayne and Mrs. William Owens, northwest Wayne.

Drivings Solid Backing
Solid backing of the 1953 March of Dimes was urged today by several prominent Wayne residents who stressed the huge amounts of money needed in carrying on the fight against the sharply rising threat of polio.

The fire bell, located on the tower behind the city hall, has not been rung for six years. Fire Chief Paul Rogge rang it at that time to try to stimulate attendance at the treatment meetings. Before the fire whistle was installed, the bell was used to sound fire alarms.

"I have been a supporter of the March of Dimes fight against polio for a long time," Harry E. Ley, Wayne county chapter chairman, said in making known his endorsement.

"The disastrous impact of the 1952 epidemic is still felt throughout Wayne county. Only by solid support of the March of Dimes campaign can we be assured that this fight against polio will be carried on to the fullest."

Martin Ringer stated: "That March of Dimes slogan 'You Can Help To' is a reminder that should not be necessary to the people of Wayne. Many boys and girls, our young men and women, have been stricken by polio. We owe it to them and to ourselves to help, and help again, by contributing to the March of Dimes."

Adon Jeffrey, in endorsing the 1953 drive, said: "Our nation has just experienced the worst polio epidemic in its history. It is ironic that just when science is making its greatest progress against the disease we are faced with an unprecedented number of cases. I urge all to join in making the March of Dimes equal to the task."

'52 Review Shows City Is Expanding

1952 was another good year for Wayne. Figures compiled by the Chamber of Commerce indicate a growth of the city and its facilities.

The community added \$200,000 in residential housing during the year. Schools and churches were issued permits with values of \$85,000 and commercial building hit \$150,000. All of these totals were secured from building permits issued by the city council.

The First Methodist church is constructing an annex on their present building and the St. Mary's Catholic church is building a parochial grade school building.
Commercial building includes the new business structure at Second and Main street, drive-in theatre and motel. The totals listed above do not include consideration of remodeling of buildings.
Construction on the campus during the year includes the remodeling of the administration building, the ag shop and cafeteria.

Blocks of Paving
Municipal construction jumped upward with the 18 blocks of paving being added at a cost of \$80,000. A similar effort for two more years would finish the job of paving every block in the city limits and on the edge of the city.

Municipal expansion during 1952 included the purchase of a \$190,000 dual-fuel diesel power unit and enlargement of the city light and power plant to develop 2,900 kilowatt power, or to serve over the anticipated top load.
Light and power generation was up six per cent and the city recorded the highest 15 minute peak and day output in history on Saturday, Dec. 13.

The 15-minute peak was 1,310 kilowatts and the record for the day was 17,500 kilowatts. Output for the year was 4,987,830 kilowatt hours and probably would have hit 5 million for the first time if the college had remained in session a few more days.

New Street Sweeper
During 1952, a street sweeper and a new truck were added to the city street department, total cost of the two running around \$12,000.

Another "first" was reported by the Northwestern Bell Telephone company when a record number of calls were handled during the Thanksgiving holidays.

Hard Surface Road Is On Docket

State Engineer Harold L. Atkin told a delegation from Wayne and Wakefield on Dec. 31 that state surveys indicate Highway 35 should be rebuilt two miles south of its location.
Highway 35 now runs eight miles west from Wakefield and just Highway 15 two miles north of Wayne.

County Board To Organize

The rebuilding of Highway 35 has long been under discussion. Plans call for a hard surface top road.

Wakefield representatives stated that their people want the surfaced road along the present route, but Atkin told the delegation that the proposed route would service more than 100 and cost \$30,000 to \$60,000 to build.

It is understood that this project is high on the list at the State Highway department.

The engineer did state, however, that additional cost for surfacing two miles south of Wakefield to join the proposed 35 route is considered a contribution on that road, which is Highway 16. He also added that no figures have been allowed in a cost estimate for constructing a necessary detour (for use during surfacing) in the hard-surface road were put on the present no. 35 location.

The new route for Highway 35 between Wayne and Norfolk has already been established.

Highway 35 will run west out of Wayne on Seventh street for nine miles, go straight south five miles beyond Winside, west into Hoskins and diagonally to Norfolk.

32 Stricken By Polio During '52

Approximately \$6,000 must be paid out by the Wayne County Polio chapter to meet patient care costs already incurred during 1952. Mrs. Chris Tietgen, county chapter treasurer, reported to the 1953 Campaign Director Clifford M. Dan.

About \$2,200 of this amount has already been paid from chapter funds, while payment of the remainder is awaiting audit of bills by national headquarters. This sum of money is in addition to approximately \$1,000 which must be paid for surgery and braces for rehabilitated cases from former years. And this estimated \$6,000 debt will continue to grow in 1953 as bills keep pouring in from those still hospitalized by the 1952 epidemic.

First Attack
On July 15, 1952, polio made its first attack of the year in Wayne county. The dreaded disease chose Kevin Miller, four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Miller, Wayne, for its victim.

He was hospitalized in Omaha at the Children's Memorial hospital... and Wayne county's most disastrous polio year was underway, not stopping until a total of 32 patients had been stricken.

None have completely recovered from its effects. Some of the light cases escaped without paralysis, many are still hospitalized, and a few will find braces or surgery neces-

ary. One patient died. List of Victims

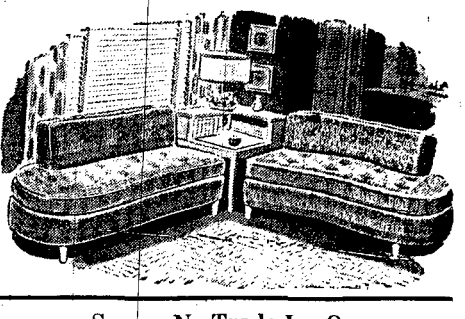

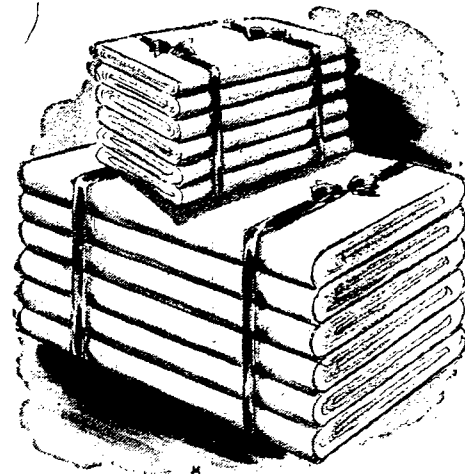

Raise for 4,725,000 Persons

The some 4,725,000 persons now receiving Old Age and Survivor's insurance checks under Social Security program received recent hikes in payment. Total monthly Social Security payments rose from \$168,400,000 to \$190,500,000.

This increase represents a 13 per cent increase to retired workers and their families and to dependent survivors of workers. The increase was automatically provided by a new law passed in the last session of Congress.

The social security laws are very strict and we feel unjust in some cases.

Under the program, you are entitled to earn \$50 a month. If you earn over that, you are "penalized" and probably have to forfeit payments. This may not sound unjust but let's investigate a little further.

If you buy an income policy from a private firm, you pay in so many dollars for so many years, after which you receive an income of a predetermined number of dollars every month as long as you live. It does not make any difference whether you retire or keep on working, you get your income.

You are not forced to buy an income policy. However, you have no choice on social security. You take it and pay for it every month whether you want it or not.

When it comes time for you to collect, you are not a free agent to decide what you want to do. You do exactly as the government says, or you won't collect a dime.

The Social Security program is a wonderful thing, but it needs overhauling.

One of the basic changes of the law should be that when anyone becomes eligible for the benefit he has paid for, he or his survivors will get that benefit irrespective of anything else. (Editors note: Portions of this editorial were taken from "Attempted Suicide Caused by Social Security," by DeWitt Emery.)

Ike's Female Appointees

It is interesting to note that President Dwight D. Eisenhower has appointed two women to top jobs already, and that he promises to recognize the capability of women in all fields.

It is also interesting to note that the first two female appointees were among a list of 17 names submitted to General Eisenhower by a committee of the American Association of University Women. The AAUW named a committee to recommend the list to Eisenhower and the committee sent in the names shortly before Ike named two to major posts.

The two chosen by Eisenhower were Mrs. Ivy Priest, Bountiful, Utah, and Mrs. Oveta C. Hobby, Houston, Tex. These appointments were pleasing to the Status of Women committee of the AAUW, since that committee had proposed both in the list sent to General Eisenhower.

General Eisenhower's recognition of women, in this respect, is not a new thing. The last two Democratic administrations have called on members of the fairer sex to perform top jobs in the government at various times. These jobs have included cabinet posts and, at present, there are several women filling top-level jobs in the Defense department and other major departments.

Perhaps one of the reasons why these women usually come through is the fact that few of them are picked for top posts, and the few chosen are naturally thought to be top candidates in the entire country. Whatever the reasons, most of the ladies who have been given top government jobs in the last two decades have made creditable showings and satisfied the men who appointed them. In so doing, they have paved the way for the appointment of other women to top governmental posts.

Views on Hiway 35

The following story concerning Hiway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield was submitted to The Wayne Herald this week by a committee whose spokesmen were Joe Beckenhauer and Fred Salmon. Beckenhauer resides approximately five miles east of Wakefield on present No. 35 and Salmon operates a business on the road near the west edge of that city.

The Road committee of the Wakefield Lions club reports that Dec. 21 they delivered to Harold Aitken, state highway engineer, signed resolutions from Laurel, Wayne, Dixon, Concord, South Sioux City, Dakota City, Hubbard, Emerson and Wakefield asking that highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield be rebuilt on its present location.

Aitken informed the delegation that the highway department was considering a relocation of this road two miles south of Wakefield. In a press release he stated that the relocation would save between \$50,000 and \$60,000. However, he has only figured the east and west part of this road and has ignored the north and south section. The cost of the relocation for the 10 miles, according to Aitken's figures, would be substantially more than rebuilding the present eight miles, the committee stated.

The road committee reports that a majority of the people in this part of northeast Nebraska are in favor of the present location, believe it will better serve the area and will be a saving to the taxpayers due to cheaper local construction cost.






