Mayor Buys First Ticket

Mrs. Tietgen became interested in the fight against polio in 1943 when she stood beside the bedside of her nephew, Donald Kirsch, and watched helplessly while he gasped for breath in a Norfolk hospital. Donald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kirsch, now of Allison, died just 24 hours after he was stricken with polio.

Since then Mrs. Tietgen has devoted much of her time helping raise funds to combat polio. She organized the Wayne County Polio chapter in 1943, becoming the chapter treasurer, an office which she still holds. She saw Wayne county's share of the March of Dimes grow from \$53.02 in 1943

before the chapter was organized to \$2,316 in 1950. She directed the yearly campaign for funds in the county from 1944 to 1953.

Besides buying these funds for the treasury by directing numerous volunteer workers in their house-to-house canvass, Mrs. Tietgen has personally visited every 1953 polio case, and at the peak of the epidemic last year spent five hours at St. Joseph's hospital in Sioux City, getting acquainted with the forms to be used in connection with her work.

She has kept in touch with previous cases in Wayne county, often furnishing them with transportation to the hospital, to see that the required braces, therapy or surgery is secured.

All of her services are performed with no financial reward. This is also true of all the people who are helping in the 1953 March of Dimes. There are no paid polo workers in Wayne county.

WSTC Staff Changes Are Announced

Appointment of Virginia Linn, associate dean of students at Pacific university, Forest Grove, Ore. as associate dean at Wayne State Teachers college, and naming of Homer C. Kelley, Fairbury, as building principal of the Hahn Campus school were among the actions taken by the State Normal board at their monthly meeting in Lincoln Saturday. Dr. John Rice, president of Wayne State, announced.

The board also approved the transfer of Milton Hassel, former principal of the campus school to the position of director of placement and special activities at the college, and appointed Mrs. Rozella Wacker, Wayne, as part-time instructor in the campus high school to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. Joan Clement.

Three visiting faculty members were named to the 1953 summer school staff by the board. They are: Elja McCullough, Dana college, and Mrs. Maetha Watson, Green Grand Island public schools, who will instruct in general education; Robert T. Farnley, Denver, Colo. public schools, who will teach art courses.

Miss Linn will be returning to the Wayne State campus where she was associate dean of student from 1947 to 1949, when she resigned to attend to her husband's affairs in Kearney. She received her degrees from Hastings college, and Northwestern university.

Kelley came to Wayne from Fairbury, where he was superintendent of schools for three years. Before that time he had held superintendentcies at Battle Creek, Waco and Wiggie Creek. He received his degrees from the University of Nebraska. He is married and has two children.

Hassel will fill the vacancy in the placement bureau left by Miss Mildred Thompson, who resigned last fall to return to teaching. His duties will include directing the placement and extension work at the colleges and coordinating the college extra-campus activities. Dr. Rice said.

New Building Program Is Scheduled at College

Initial steps were taken Saturday toward a new library and auditorium for Wayne State Teachers college when the State Normal board authorized the hiring of an architect to draft plans and estimate costs.

John Latenser and Sons, Omaha, architects who have designed several of the campus buildings, have been engaged to start work immediately on plans for the library and auditorium, considering both a combination structure or separate buildings. Dr. John Rice, president of Wayne State, said.

The present library, which is located on the ground floor of the library-science building, has been inadequate from the standpoint of space for a number of years. A new structure will allow more material to be made available to students, as well as providing larger, better study and research areas.

The present auditorium on the second floor of the administration building has limited seating and changing facilities which have handicapped many programs scheduled there.

The site of the new building, will depend largely upon the architect's plans and whether one or two buildings will be built.

Rural Phone Line Will Be Rebuilt

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Views on Highway Commission

With the Nebraska Legislature scheduled to act soon on LB4, the bill to set up a State Highway Commission, views expressed by member of Nebraska Editors Highway Improvement committee at their final session in Fremont several months ago are particularly pertinent at this time.

The question of a highway commission was not specifically assigned to the committee by the Nebraska Editors Highway conference but it did enter into the discussions of the overall road problem.

The committee consisted of Sen. Dwight Burney, Hartington; Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings; H. G. Greenamyre, the Better Nebraska Association, representing the "pro" side; and H. H. Hahn of the Nebraska Highway Users Conference, representing the opposition with Cliff Sandahl, editor of the North Platte Telegraph-Bulletin, serving as chairman.

Here are salient excerpts from the committee transcript: SEN. MARVEL (directing remarks to Mr. Hahn) — I understand that certain of your groups question the efficiency of the Highway department and the fact that some improvements that have been made haven't been made as economically as have been perhaps made in other states. Is that a fair statement? Is that one of the reasons why this particular group thinks a highway commission would solve part of our problems?

MR. HAHN — I think I can answer you to that. SEN. MARVEL — Do you have definite facts to back up the matter of lack of efficiency in the department? How did you arrive at that opinion?

MR. HAHN — I don't like to use the term "lack of efficiency." I would like to say that it is a lack of laws under which our Highway department has to operate. In Iowa they have different laws and in Kansas and in South Dakota and in all three of those states they have made so much more progress on the secondary road system than we have made in Nebraska.

SEN. MARVEL — Do you mean the efficiency is a matter of legislative action rather than reorganization of the department? Do you have definite comparisons to back up those statements? I think we as a committee or the Legislature as a whole ought to have this information.

MR. HAHN — We do have information from Kansas, Iowa and South Dakota; whether it is up to date, I don't know. I know that in South Dakota 56 out of 68 counties have local funds to improve their secondary roads in connection with federal funds and in the state of Nebraska there are only 13 out of 93.

SEN. MARVEL — I think to be very frank that your group should take a stand. If they have some definite ideas on this thing and to keep away from further criticism from your group or further conflict which we are always going to have or disagreement, shouldn't you come up with some definite ideas? The Legislature sits down in Lincoln with a lot of bills and most of us can't sit down and absorb all the figures or all these problems, and those outside interest groups should come in with some kind of a program somewhere along that line.

MR. HAHN — That is the thing that has concerned us a great deal. I will speak for my own organization (Petroleum Marketers) because I know it much better. We do collect a lot of information but the whole staff of our organization consists of one girl and myself. When you start to disseminate information on that basis, you are up against a pretty big job. Some of the other organizations have larger staffs.

MR. GREENAMYRE — My association has no objection to an advisory commission. I want to say here and if evidence is shown that a highway commission is needed, let's have the highway commission at that time. But let's not let the highway commission hold us up. We are ready to go today with a highway commission.

SEN. MARVEL — Just how would the highway commission as such provide money to build roads that we eventually think are needed?

SEN. BURNEY — As a member of the Legislature, I can't vote for a highway commission unless they prove that it is going to improve conditions.

SEN. MARVEL — Does this (Highway Users) group in recommending a highway commission have definite facts to show as a point of argument, ample evidence how the department would be better off than under the present plan or have something else to work on?

Legislative Report...

NEW METHOD OF TAXING MOTOR VEHICLES Senators Marvel, Lee, Vogel and Cramer have introduced L. B. 165 which would amend the constitutional amendment recently passed by the voters.

The 1952 motor vehicle property taxes are being paid this month and are delinquent Feb. 1, 1953. This year, motor vehicles will be assessed on March 10 as a customary, but will become delinquent Dec. 1, 1953 instead of Feb. 1, 1954. In order to make the shift to a pay-in-advance basis, L. B. 165 provides that vehicles will be taxed on Jan. 1, 1954, after one month from the delinquent date of your 1953 taxes.

The tax a vehicle owner would pay on Jan. 1, 1954, would be a "license tax" in lieu of any property tax for 1954 in each year after 1953, motor vehicle "license taxes" will be payable on Jan. 1. The so-called "license tax" would be levied at the same rate as is applied to other tangible property. This year, motor vehicles will be assessed in the same way as it is currently. The assessed valuation would also be arrived at about the same as at present. The values would be prepared by the State Tax Commissioner, but instead of being forwarded directly to the county assessors, they will be submitted to the State Board of Equalization. The State Board of Equalization would then set the values to which the tax levies would be applied. The board would accept protests for ten days.

On Nov. 1 of each year, the county assessor would levy a tax on motor vehicles at the tangible rate which is applied to all other property. The county assessor would use the assessed values set by the State Board.

Tax Avoidance Eliminated If a vehicle is registered after Jan. 1 because it was not owned in Nebraska on that date, then the tax would be scaled down one-twelfth for each month that has elapsed since Jan. 1.

Motor vehicles owned by dealers as stock-in-trade, would be subject to a tangible personal tax at the same rate as other merchant stock. When the dealer sells a motor vehicle from stock which has already been taxed, he would receive a refund prorated according to the number of months he had it on his inventory after Jan. 1.

L. B. 165 is not a great deal different from the in lieu tax suggested by Nebraska Citizens Council. However, an important element in our proposal has been left out of this bill. Under our suggestion, motor vehicle assessed values would be equalized at the same level of assessment as all other tangible personal property before the values were certified to the county assessor. At present motor vehicles are assessed at 67 per cent of market value according to a report by the State Tax Commissioner. On the other hand, it is estimated that all the other personal property is assessed at 42 per cent on the average.

Wayne Couple to Leave Monday on 15,000 Mile Trip

Felbers Will Visit Three Continents

Mr. and Mrs. Walden Felber will travel approximately 15,000 miles on their journey to three continents and nine countries next month. They will leave Wayne Feb. 2 for Ireland and will return March 9 from Switzerland, France and Ireland.

Continents covered will include Europe, Asia and Africa, and countries are France, Italy, Greece, Turkey, Lebanon, Syria, Israel, Trans-Jordan and Egypt.

Their itinerary will put them in Paris, France from Feb. 5 until Feb. 10 and on to Rome, Italy for four days. While there they will stay at Hotel Grand, where Charlie Chaplin has been. In Athens, Greece, Feb. 15-16 they will visit many famous ancient artistic structures.

After four days in Istanbul, Turkey, they will be in Beirut, Lebanon and on to Damascus, Syria for two days. They will tour several mosques there and will journey to Amman, Trans-Jordan and to Jericho. They plan to visit the Dead Sea which is 1,300 feet below sea level, and will continue to Jerusalem, passing by the Good Samaritan Inn and Apostle's Fountain.

To Visit Holy City
The Felbers will be in Jerusalem from Feb. 24-26 to see the Holy City in complete. They will visit St. Anne Ecce Homo, Pilate's Judgment Hall, the Holy Sepulchre Calvary, Mount of Olives and the Church of Peter Noster. They will continue to Gethsemane and visit the Garden Tomb, the Church of All Nations, the tomb of Virgin Mary and in Bethany the tomb of Lazarus and several other prominent points before returning to Jerusalem.

They are scheduled to be in Cairo, Egypt Feb. 27 and 28 to take a tour to the Egyptian museums and the treasures of Tut-Ank-Amon. At Memphis they will visit the colossal statues of Ramses II and the Alabaster Sphinx.

In Luxor their excursions will take them to Karnak, the avenue of Sphinxes, the Temple of Amon, Mut and Khons and the obelisks of Queen Hatsheut. They plan to cross the Nile by boat and visit the Valley of Kings (including Tut-Ank-Amon's tomb), the temple of Deir el-Bahari and the Temple of Ramessesum, also the Colossus of Memnon.

The Wayne travelers will leave Cairo Mar. 6. After taking a trek through Switzerland, France and Ireland once more, they will return March 9.

Tourists are allowed 44 pounds apiece and this will be the equivalent of two bags and a suitcase. Mr. Felber plans to take a variety of wool and denim and Mr. Felber will be obligated to take heavy and tropical suits, both types because of the variety of weather they will encounter during the entire journey.

The Felbers plan to take 36 films with them to be used on the trip. These will be added to their already extensive film library.

Army Officer's Wife Offers Hints to Wives Going Abroad

Been in Japan; Going To Germany

Mrs. Harry Bert Lane and her two sons, Douglas and Tom, are quite adapted to customs of the Oriental countries and will leave this spring to join Lt. Col Lane in Europe for a 42-month stint.

The former Wayne resident lived with her family in Japan for three years, returning in 1950. Col. Lane was recently assigned to overseas duty again and left Jan. 18 for Bremerhaven, Germany for further assignment.

Mrs. Lane has consented to giving several hints to soldiers, their wives and families who will be traveling on foreign soil during the present American emergency.

Mrs. Lane upholds art by the Far East in people; she feels their pictures, mostly woodblock prints, are always effective and useable. These oriental pictures blend with any type of decor and they are not expensive. Another Oriental art type is silk screen painting.

Mrs. Lane advises visitors to those countries to have the pictures packed there to be shipped to the United States; Orientals perform tasks slowly but efficiently. They pack everything breakable in soft screen painting.

Mrs. Lane has some clothes made while in Japan and she warns other women not to be disappointed with theirs. "American styles have a zip and American women have a sense of style other countries cannot copy."

"The United States features casual living," she said, and stated that definitely formal living has little place in the lives of most of us. That is the reason for her decision not to overdo bringing more formal art objects from other countries.

Mrs. Lane therefore states the necessity of being sensible about bringing silver and brass and linens to this country. Many are impractical and the average woman doesn't want to spend all day polishing silver and laundering linens; such items take much care and the right kind of care or they are spoiled.

The army wife is so impressed with American appliances she determinedly chooses them to maid service although her Japanese maids did an excellent job. "Good sturdy American products outlast them all," she stated.

The Lanes were in Japan from 1947 to 1950, and Mrs. Lane pointed out that conditions might have changed greatly since the war in Korea. There the three years they were there, however, the Japanese had made great improvement.

Articles they brought back from the Orient include a few clothes, brass, silver, rugs, linens and vases. They also brought a set of burr-to furniture—something which a large percentage of families there brought back.

Mrs. Lane stored her most precious items in Wayne for safe-keeping at the home of her parents, the Paul Mines'. The two large rugs and two small ones in the Mines home belong to them. The inch-thick Chinese rugs were made in Tientsin. This is one of the three famous brands and the only one which resumed production after the war. The North China factory has now been abandoned however, and Mr. Nickols, the rugmaker, now lives in Hawaii.

In order to buy the four rugs, the Lanes ordered them through a rug dealer in Seattle, Wash, thus making them duty-free. They were ordered in 1948 and 1949 and delivered after the fall of Tientsin to the Communists.

The other two rugmakers were Fetti and Karagushen. Modern Chinese rugs are characterized by the raised design called the camel cut. They are usually solid colors. One of the rugs is deep rose, one dark green. The small rugs have a pale neutral background and are decorated in soft tones of rose green and turquoise. All have neutral fringes.

In the Japanese temples were yard-stall-sandals, two of which the Lanes converted into attractive lamps. Following the fall of Japan, many brass piles, their scrap metal, were seen everywhere. Many Americans thus became interested in collecting the brass in which the Japanese had apparently lost interest. Mrs. Lane brought her mother, Mrs. Mines, an incense burner, a brass boat flower container and two seven-branch can-

delabra, the sections which turn at any angle.

Their bamboo furniture came from the Philippines and is heavier than that made in Japan.

Post-war Oriental linens are inferior to pre-war varieties. Mrs. Lane stated, because postwar materials were not as good. She has two banquet cloths of lace and cutwork. The "Army-Navy cloth," so-called because of its panel lace and panel cutwork design, is especially beautiful as is the ecru point de Venice patterned cloth. There is also a luncheon cloth in cutwork very fine in design.

These cloths, explained the officer's wife, are made in Chinese nunneries and sold to support the convents. Chinese women do the work and the nuns sell the cloths.

Mrs. Lane wished to stress that she assumes the same factors she

has featured in this article are present in most countries to which American soldiers will be sent.
