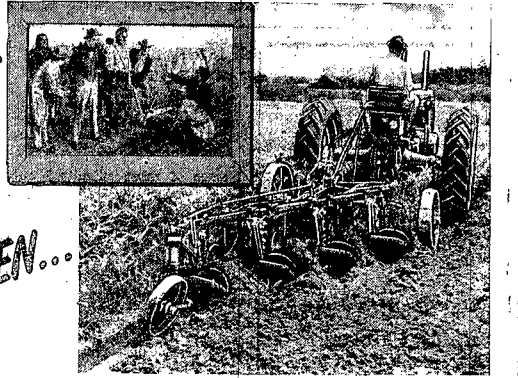

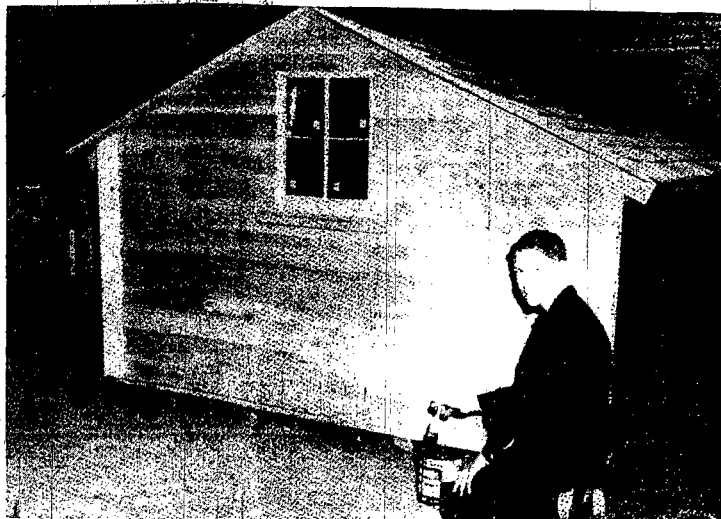

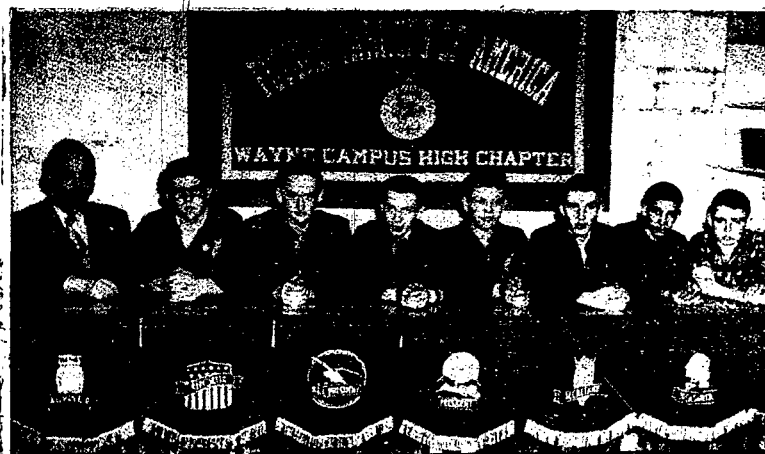

Among the conservation projects accomplished during 1952 were: contour farming, stubble mulching, seeding of pasture, tree planting, terracing, crop rotation, seeding of permanent hay, wildlife improvement and construction of outlets and waterways.
