District Declamatory Contest Scheduled in Wayne March 21

High School Students Will Compete

High school student speakers and dramatists of northeastern Nebraska will meet on the Wayne State campus Saturday, Mar. 21, to participate in the Nebraska High School Activities association district declamatory and one-act play contest.

The student orators will compete in original oratory, extemporaneous speaking, dramatic reading, discussion and radio newscasting.

Each contestant will be rated according to his ability by one of the four judges who will take part in the meet.

The one-act plays will be performed in the college auditorium and will also be rated by the judges.

Judges for the contest are Dr. LeRoy Laase, Max Whittaker, John Tolch and John Wiley, all of the University of Nebraska speech department.

Lenore Ramsey, professor of speech at the college, is in charge of the production of the one-act plays, and George E. Criswell, director of public relations, is contest director.

He attended Sunday school at Salem in his early years and on Mar. 24, 1907 he was confirmed and joined the church. He attended the local grade school and later a short term at Luther college, Wakefield. He was Sunday school secretary for several years.

Lt. Addison Awarded Air Medal

By direction of the President, First Lt. John V. Addison, United States Air Force, has been awarded the Air medal in Korean action. He is the son of H. V. Addison, Wayne. The citation reads:

Lieutenant John V. Addison distinguished himself by meritorious achievement participating in aerial flight as a pilot of an F-84 aircraft, 311th Fighter-Bomber squadron, 38th Fighter Bomber wing, First Air Force, from 8 November 1952 to 25 December 1952.

While assigned to this Thunderbolt Fighter-Bomber unit Lt. Addison flew many missions deep into enemy held territory to attack vital supply areas, troop concentrations and transportation arteries.

Despite heavy defending anti-aircraft and automatic weapons from these targets, Lt. Addison aggressively continued his dive bombing and strating, contributing in a large degree to their ultimate devastation.

Lieutenant Addison also flew missions attacking enemy front line positions, in close support of United Nations forces, causing considerable damage and thereby critically hampering Communist offensives in these areas.

Through his courage, airmanship and devotion to duty, Lt. Addison has caused great credit to be reflected upon himself and the United States Air force.

'53 Baby Beef Feeding Contest Rules Announced

Rules for the 1953 Baby Beef Feeding contest were announced this week by County Agent Harold Ingalls.

The annual contest comes to a climax at Wayne county fair when a committee selects the winning entry. Merlin Sievers was awarded the trophy last fall.

County Agent Harold Ingalls reported that calves will be tagged at the request of the club leader. 4-H members are asked to keep their entries until the calves are tagged.

Rules for the 1953 feeding contest are:

1. This contest shall be limited to Wayne county 4-H and FFA members.
2. A member may enter more than one calf but each will be entered individually.
3. Entry cards for each calf must be in the Extension office by June 1, completely filled out.

Points for scoring are:

1. Ten points will be given for each 100 pounds gain. (Some adjustment will need to be made for variation in length of feeding period.)
2. Calves must be weighed at start and upon arriving at the Wayne County fair.
3. A possible 40 points for accuracy and completeness of feed records. This will be taken from the regular record book.
4. A possible 10 points for a story describing your feeding and handling methods.
5. A record book and story must be submitted on entry day of county fair.
6. The following points for ribbon awards in regular baby beef classes at Wayne County fair: purple ribbon, 25; blue ribbon, 20; red ribbon, 15; white ribbon, 10.

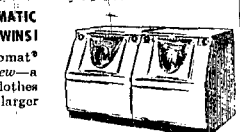

'Chop, Prune and Reorganize'

Time magazine recently summarized in capsule form the primary problems the Eisenhower administration faces. On the subject of governmental efficiency, it said: "Government probably is giving the taxpayer nowhere near his money's worth. Eisenhower's administration is going to have to chop, prune and reorganize."

That is about as good a two-sentence description of this allimportant issue as could be written. We have just ended a 20-year period in which the federal government grew to incredible proportions, in which it assumed the responsibility for all manner of activities, which used to be considered the province of the individual and local government, and, worst of all, in which millions of people were encouraged to look upon the federal treasury as the source of endless "free" handouts.

The Eisenhower administration is pledged to drastically change this suicidal trend. The President is opposed to the super-government philosophy which dominated the thinking of his immediate predecessors. Time and time again he has said that it is vitally necessary to decentralize government and return local problems to local hands. But no President and no administration, though it were blessed with the wisdom of Solomon and the resolution of Caesar, could accomplish this without the fullest public support and understanding.

That simply means that we must willingly accept government economy when it affects us—not just when it affects the other fellow. It means that special groups, including chambers of commerce, civic organizations, farm organizations, labor organizations and all the rest, must no longer demand economy as a general principle—and then go to Washington demanding bigger and better appropriations for their particular benefit. It means that we can and will have honest, efficient and economical government only if the people sincerely want that kind of government and accept the bitter with the sweet.

The only charge ever made to the patient will be a fee by the physician or hospital for professional services in administering the material.

Hot Brick Causes Fire In 1929

A summary listing the causes and, or, contributing factors shows the Wayne Volunteer Fire department answered 385 calls from 1929 to 1951.

The main categories and number of fires are as follows: Cars and trucks, 85; urban dwellings, 175; commercial buildings or material, 114; rural, 43; airplanes, 3; farm buildings, 62 and church and school, 3.

Probably the most unique of all the fires was the one caused by a hot brick bed warmer in the August Labaree home in 1929.

Bad wiring and cigarettes were the two main causes of car and truck fires. Fires originating in chimneys and heating plants are the most prevalent in the urban dwelling division.

Rubbish motors, heating plants and chimneys were the main fire offenders in the commercial category, and heating plants were again responsible for most of the farm building fires.

Lightning, cigarettes, firecrackers, sparks from farm equipment and uncontrolled on fires caused most of the rural fires.

County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.

Every person owning personal property is required to make out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered by the person to the county assessor on or before April 20.

Where any person fails, neglects, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the articles of property belonging to that person and shall add fifty per cent to the value returned.

Work sheets will be sent to persons in the county and should be completed and brought to the assessor's office at Wayne county courthouse or one of the other locations listed below. Personal property owners who do not receive such work sheets may obtain one by coming or writing to the assessor's office. Business establishments will be called on by the assessor or his assistants. The assessor asks for the conscientious cooperation of all persons in the county.

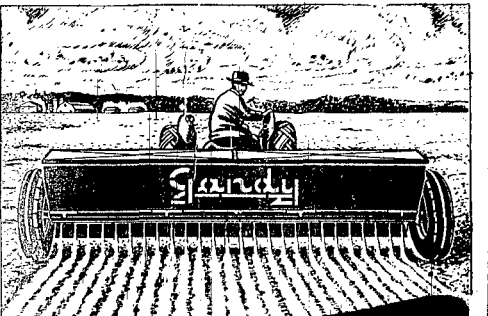

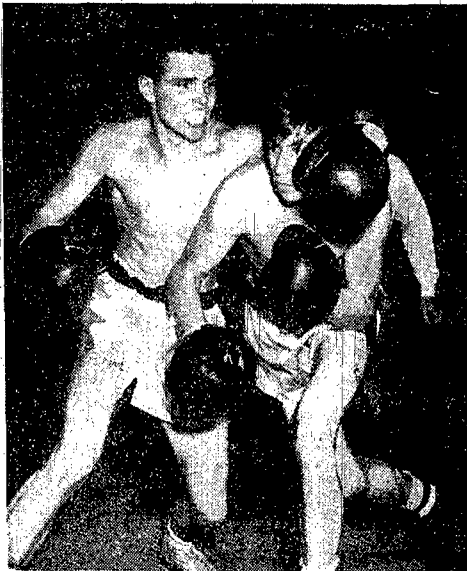

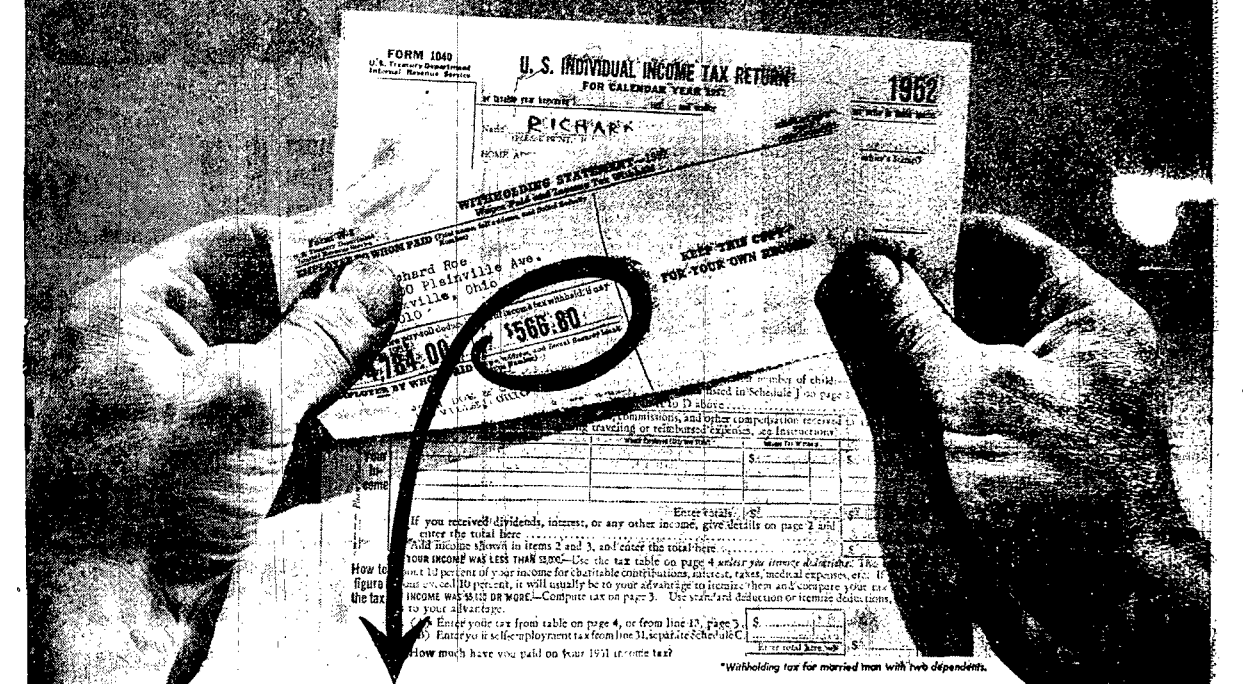
