





### 'Chop, Prune and Reorganize'

Time magazine recently summarized in capsule form the primary problems the Eisenhower administration faces. On the subject of governmental efficiency, it said; "Government probably is giving the taxpayer nowhere near his money's worth. Eisenhower's administration is going to have to chop, prune and reorganize."

That is about as good a two-sentence description of this all important issue as could be written. We have just ended a 20-year period in which the federal government grew to incredible proportions, in which it assumed the responsibility for all manner of activities, which used to be considered the province of the individual and decal government, and, worst of all, in which millions of people were encouraged to look upon the federal treasury as the source of endless "free" handouts.

source of endless "free" handouts.

The Eisenhower administration is pledged to drastically change this suicidal trend. The President is copposed to the super-government philipsophy which dominated the thinking of his immediate predecessors. Time and time-again he has said that it is vitally necessary to decentralize government and return local problems to local hands. But no President and no administration, though it were blessed with the wisdom of Solomon and the resolution of Caesar, could accomplish this without the fullest public support and understanding.

That simply means that we must willingly accept government economy when it affects us—not just when it affects; the other fellow. It means that special groups, including chambers of commerce; civic organizations, farm organizations, labor organizations and all the rest, must no longer demand economy as a general principle—and then go to Washington demanding bigger and better appropriations for their particular benefit. It means that we can and will have honest, efficient and economical government only if the people sincerely want that kind of government and accept the bitter with the sweet.

Blood, like miniole arrugs, has become vital to the saving of life. Unlike the miracle drugs it cannot be produced in a manufacturing process. It must come from people.

Demand for blood began to soar about 15 years ago when scientists found a way to store it. Prior to that all blood transfusions were emergency operations, direct from one person to another. Complicated equipment was essential. Now hospitals are able to keep a supply of blood on hand classified by type, ready for instant use.

Still another time-saving technique for using blood grew out of further research when plasma came into use. Plasma cam be stored for years. During World War II the Red Cross collected more than 13,000,000 pints of blood as the free gift of Americans to their fighting men.

their fighting men.

Because of the increasing demand for blood and because there is no manufactured substitute the Red Cross established a national blood program. Besides military requirements it is now taking care of civilian needs throughout the nation. The program when fully developed will furnish whole blood, plasma and other blood derivatives to all the people of this country irrespective of race, creed, color or financial status. The only charge ever made to the patient will be a fee by the physician or hospital for professional services in administering the material.







Nebraska/Revenue Laws:

77-409

County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.

77-1229

Every person owning personal property is required to make out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered by the person to the county assessor on or be-

77-1235

Where any person fails, neglects, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the articles of property belonging to that person and shall add fifty per cent to the value returned.

Work sheets will be sent to persons in the county and should be completed and brought to the assessor's office at Wayne county courthouse or one of the other locations listed below. Personal property owners who do not receive such work sheets may obtain one by coming or writing to the assessor's office. Business establishments will be called on by the assessor or his assistants. The assessor asks for the conscientious cooperation of all persons in the county. 


