RURAL School News

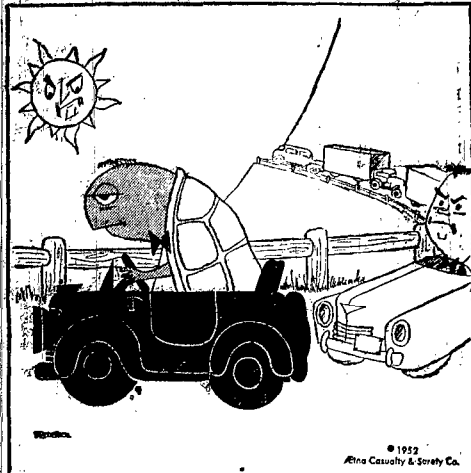
District 72

by those restless Americans whose eyes were ever turned to the west and as early as 1857 an effort was made to settle the area. This effort, by the Waverly Town company of Plattsmouth, looked to the establishment of a settlement near the present site of Linwood. Though it brought the construction of the first house in what is now Butler county, the project was unsuccessful. The promoters apparently rushed off to the gold fields of Colorado.

It wasn't long, though, before permanent settlers began moving into the county, and the year 1859 saw a number of ranches established. Until after the Civil War, however, settlement was slow, and the census returns for 1860 show only 27 persons living in Butler county. Nevertheless, a county had been established and "Maha's City" had been designated as the county seat. George L. Brown, the county's first historian, wrote of it in 1876: "What vaulting ambitions and prospective features were found up in this little parchment city may never be known as I cannot ascertain that it was ever actually located."

In Old Nebraska

Butler County, located in the northeast Platte Valley, comprises the name of a man who might have played an important part in Nebraska's history had he chosen to do so. Within 10 days of Butler, Kentucky soldier, congressman and lawyer and an unsuccessful vice presidential candidate who developed an offer of the governorship of Nebraska rejected in 1855 by President Franklin Pierce. Because of its Platte Valley location, the land this is now Butler County was visited frequently

whelming majority for David City was ruled out because the judges of the election there left the ballot box unguarded while they ran to watch a dog fight. That these county seat fights were important is attested to by the fact that after the loss of the county seat Savannah died out completely.

About one-fourth of Butler county was granted to the Union Pacific railroad and later the Burlington got a small grant in the county. Most of the early settlers either built out homesteads or bought their land from the railroad. The population grew steadily and by 1890 very little land was available.

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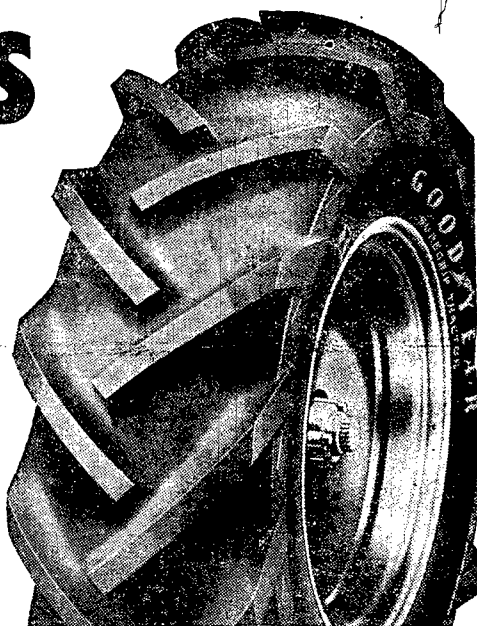
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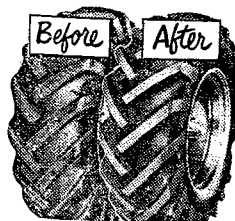

Hazel Reeve Smith Has 375 Pitcher Collection

Every pitcher in Hazel Reeve Smith's 375-piece collection means "people and places" to her. The pitchers have been given her by children, past students, parents and teacher friends ever since 1940 when her collection was begun.

Mrs. Smith's aunt, Lula Reeve, Long Beach, Calif., encouraged her to choose the hobby because pitchers are small and easy to move. It also gave Mrs. Smith an opportunity to have a remembrance from each place she has visited.

Her first piece was in the shape of half an ear of corn, purchased in California. Each of Warren Price's six children has given Mrs. Smith a pitcher for the collection. Many fellows and girls whom she taught were conscientious in sending her additions while they were in the service. A WAC gave her one from each place she was stationed and a friend in the USO sent her several from foreign countries. Her collection is nearly complete with every state represented but Tennessee, Rhode Island and Vermont. Mrs. Smith's travels, an area spanning from California to Canada to Ohio and southwest, have added to the hobby.

The smallest pitcher, a quarter-inch yellow one, comes from Chinatown, Los Angeles, Calif. The most valuable one is an antique Chinese pitcher somewhat in the shape of a fish's head. It was unearthed some years ago and is authentic from an early Chinese dynasty.

The largest pitcher is white china, brought from the 1904 St. Louis Exposition, Los Angeles, Calif. Many of the prized ones have come from little girls' tea sets; one especially from Jean Tobias, a former Wayne resident, is white with dainty gold flowers scattered over it.

Many of them are antiques, as is the German ruby glass pitcher given Mrs. Smith by her USO friend. The Wayne instructor has a genuine Bennington with the figure of an antelope on its side. In her antique turquoise glass tea set is an especially dainty pitcher. Another antique piece is in a dull finish pottery.

Probably the daintiest piece is of handblown pale chartreuse glass with pink and lavender shell flowers on its side. Mildred Clark, a former Wayneite, gave this tall and narrow pitcher to Mrs. Smith. Other blown glass pieces are those she saw at the World's Fair in 1940 and several blown around another tiny pitcher.

The French ruby glass is tiny as is that one made like a dice, coming from Boston. The former DeLoros McNatt sent her several, one of green glass in the shape of a violin. Another is made from the same materials as neon signs and others are of milk glass and Mexican bubble glass.

Russell Widow, brother-in-law of Mrs. Don Wright, hand-carved an ebony and teak wood pitcher in the shape of a sword fish. C. L. Pickett carved for Mrs. Smith a tiny pitcher from a walnut. Others have been crafted from a pecan nut, from a corn cob and from redwood.

A friend in the Red Cross during World War I brought Mrs. Smith several pieces of Holland pottery. They are mostly white with fine blue designs, not at all resembling the Italian pottery with vari-colored flowers sprinkled over them.

After Mrs. J. G. Mines' death, the family gave Mrs. Smith many of her pitchers. These include fine old china and some pottery.

Mrs. Smith has 30 Toby pitchers and eight from Torquay England with a slogan painted on each. Mrs. C. L. Pickett brought her a modern-looking "totum" pitcher from Oklahoma and other unique ones resemble cows, pigs, turkeys, ducks, elephants and human faces

Painted in gold.

Many are made of glass with tiny shell flowers for decoration, some are of brass and copper and others are made of shells and other articles. One made by the Mexican Indians is an especially fine shade of coral and another is made of yellow-green and turquoise woven glass.

The shape of the cloisonne piece from Greenbrier, W. Va. is quite graceful. It is rust, lemon yellow and turquoise. One from the Alamo has hand-painted figures, on its side, and the Rosemeade pottery from North Dakota is typical.

From Mexico came the six-inch tall breakfront filled with fourth-inch glass wares. Also from Mexico came the silver and turquoise earrings formed in the shape of a pitcher.

The picture accompanying this article shows just a little over half of Mrs. Smith's collection. Even with her duties as housewife and grade instructor at Wayne High School, Mrs. Smith finds time to add to her pitcher collection monthly.
