Schoolmen's Meet At College April 13

Regional educators will meet at Wayne State Teachers college Monday, April 13 for the annual meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Schoolmen's association.

The meeting, which will be held in conjunction with the Nebraska regional conference on urgent educational problems, sponsored by the state department of public instruction, will consider such topics as a program for strengthening departmental studies in career and college days, proposals for guiding outstanding pupils into teaching, and legislative proposals of particular concern to education.

The session will open with a luncheon in the dining room of the Student Union building and close with a banquet Monday evening.

Featured speaker at the banquet will be Dr. Richard S. Hartman, associate professor of philosophy at Ohio State university. Dr. Hartman has had wide experience as a student of philosophy and political science both in America and abroad.

Milton J. Hassel, Wayne State director of placement and career services, is making arrangements for the Wayne meeting. Chairman of the group is Richard Johnson, public relations assistant of the Nebraska State Education association.

'Life with Father' Here April 9, 10

Wayne Players will present "Life With Father" at the city auditorium April 9 and 10 at 8 p.m.

The play is a comedy in three acts set in New York during the 1880's. Based on the humorous recollections of Clarence Day, Jr., it shows the fiery family life of the red-headed Days — father, mother and four sons.

John Kyl will play the tyrannical father, a successful Wall street broker. Winnie, the mother, who has a powerful personality, too, even if it is only based on the power of womanly tears, is played by Chere Houdersheldt.

The red-headed sons are Norman Ellis, David Ratzlaff, Stephen Tompero and David Schneider. Rosemary is the young girl, the chief interest of Clarence Day, Jr.

Other roles are as follows: the Rev. Dr. Lloyd, Dr. George Goblirsch; Margaret, the cook, Mrs. T. P. Roberts; and the maids, who last only a day or two under father's harsh orders, by Beedy Scholten, Patricia Wert and Emily Wait.

A new set has been built for the play by Henry Ley and H. E. Fisher. Costumes and properties of the horse and buggy days are under the supervision of Ruth Ross and Mrs. Dorothy Kabisch. Other assistants are Mrs. Benjamin Bernstein, Sally Schell, Mrs. Roy Carroll, Mrs. John Ratzlaff and Earl Boyce.

The play is directed by Mrs. William A. Selz, and sponsored by the Methodist church.

From the time of its opening in New York, "Life With Father" has been a favorite with all audiences. It holds the record as the longest-running Broadway hit of all times, and has been a popular production for amateur groups.

Oats' Corn Tests Given

Cooler weather the first part of the week slowed spring farming activity in the county.

However, County Agent Harold Ingalls reports many farmers already have their oats in. He estimates 10 per cent of this year's crop is already drilled.

Warm weather last weekend gave the farmers an opportunity to get some plowing and disking done. With seeding time here, Agent Ingalls increased the following crop variety and fertilizer test results made in 1952.

With no nitrogen, the oats yielded 29 bushels per acre. Ten pounds of nitrogen yielded 40 bushels per acre, an increase of 11 bushels and an increase of 1.1 bushel per pound of nitrogen.

Twenty pounds yielded 54 bushels per acre — an increase of 25 bushels per acre and an increase of 1.23 bushels per pound of nitrogen.

Thirty pounds of nitrogen yielded 62 bushels per acre, an increase of 33 bushels and an increase of 1.1 bushels per pound of nitrogen.

Forty pounds of nitrogen yielded 63 bushels per acre — an increase of 34 bushels and an increase of .85 bushels per pound of nitrogen.

Sixty pounds of nitrogen yielded 68 bushels per acre — an increase of 39 bushels and an increase of .63 bushels per pound of nitrogen.

Oats Variety Results

An oats variety test — samples taken from farmers' bins in Wayne county — no fertilizer used, showed the following:

Cherokee, 31 bushels per acre; Nemaha, 30; Marion, 28; Ames No. 2, 28; Beaver, 22; Andrew, 18; Bonda, 18; McCarthy, 18; Clinton, 14; and Denton, 12.

Corn Variety Results

Corn variety tests — Nebraska certified hybrids taken over a two-year period — showed the following results:

Dog Licenses Due May 1

Dog owners in Wayne were reminded that licenses for their pets are due on May 1.

Licenses become delinquent May 10.

Licenses cost \$1 for male and spayed female dogs and \$3 for unspayed female dogs. Fees are paid to the city clerk who will supply the owner with a metal tag for the dog's collar or harness.

City ordinances provide that no dog shall be permitted to run at large. All dogs, not known to police officers as having licenses, found running at large upon the streets and public grounds in Wayne without a collar or harness with metal tags or plate offered, are declared a public nuisance and as such may be destroyed.



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Out of Old Nebraska

Prepared by the Nebraska State Historical Society

Nebraska's admission to the union as the 37th state just 66 years ago this March 1 was accompanied by a great deal of controversy both nationally and locally. On the local scene one of the most heated controversies involved "the ballot box that went to dinner."

In 1886 Nebraska's voters were called upon to approve or reject a state constitution drawn up by the territorial legislature. If the constitution met approval it would be presented to congress as the basis for admitting the territory as a state. If rejected, statehood would be postponed.

Territorial Republicans strongly favored statehood and enthusiastically nominated a slate of candidates for state offices to take over when Nebraska was admitted. The Democrats, however, opposed the statehood, but decided they had better go ahead and nominate candidates for state offices, just in case.

David Butler of Pawnee City was the Republican nominee for governor. Opposing him on the Democratic ticket was J. Sterling Morton, one of the most ardent opponents of statehood for Nebraska. Butler and Morton conducted a vigorous campaign. Morton was one of the ablest stump speakers Nebraska has produced and he had the support of George Francis Train, brilliant and witty Omaha promoter and world traveler. Butler, though, was no mean debater, and he made the campaign a hot one.

This first state election was very close, and for a time, because of poor communications, the outcome was in doubt. It soon became evident, however, that the election was in the hands of the canvassing boards, rather than the voters, and particularly the Cass county board.

The action of this board gave Rock Bluff not only a ghost town—a degree of permanence in Nebraska's political history. The vote there was 107 for Morton to 103 for Butler. The Cass county canvassing board threw out the entire vote because the poll book and tally list had not been certified correctly. At the same time they allowed the vote of the strongly pro-Butler Plattsmouth precinct even though its returns were certified in the same way.


Rock Bluff was another element in the election, however. The objection judges had closed up shop during the noon hour, and in order to protect the ballot box one of them had taken it home to dinner with him. There were many charges as to what happened to its contents during the interim hour. Whether true or not the procedure was highly irregular.

The Cass county action was decisive in determining the results of the election. The voters approved statehood and David Butler became the first state governor. The Cass county vote also tipped the scales in the legislature in favor of the Republicans, and enabled that party to elect Nebraska's first two United States senators.

Cedar county, in northeastern Nebraska, by virtue of its location on the Missouri river was early traversed by fur traders, explorers, and others who went up the Muddy on their way west. Lewis and Clark were in the county in August, 1804. They noted an Omaha Indian village on Bow Creek, as well as great quantities of grapes and plums, "all well flavored."

Permanent settlement dates from 1857, three years after the organization of Nebraska territory, with the arrival of Henson Wiseman in the spring and nine other families had organized the county on Feb. 12, in advance of actual settlement, locating the seat of government at St. James. Because it was the county seat, St. James got off to a good start, although in the early days, as one pioneer settler wrote, "A postmaster carried St. James

in his pocket. When he moved St. James went with him."

In 882 St. James was reported as containing "two general stores, one drug store, one blacksmith, a schoolhouse, two doctors, two hotels, a Methodist church, the mill and about 100 inhabitants."

St. James was not destined for a long-time position of prominence in the county, however. The voters approved the relocation of the county seat from St. James to St. Helena, founded in 1859. St. Helena in 1862 contained about 250 inhabitants, was served by a flatboat ferry across the Missouri river and had a daily mail.

The town which ultimately rose to the position of greatest prominence in the county, however, was Hartington. Hartington was not established until 1883, but the new town possessed advantages against which the older communities could not compete. It was founded as a terminal of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railroad. A railroad connection was the magic key which unlocked economic developments and the promoters of Hartington knew it. They predicted that they would have the county seat in less than a year. They were a little optimistic, but not much.

In 1885 the county was made from St. Helena to Hartington.

Cedar county's pioneer settlers had their share of the difficulties that beset Nebraska's early residents. In addition, they had more than their share of Indian troubles. The most serious Indian outrage was the massacre of Henson Wiseman's five children in 1863 while the father was in Dakota with General Sully's command.

The breakup of ice in the Missouri river in March, 1867, brought a disastrous flood which completely destroyed the little settlement of Green Island.

In 1860 Cedar county had a population of 246. By 1870 it had jumped to 1,032, and by 1880 to 2,809. The period of greatest growth was the decade of the 1870's, when the population increased from 7,028 to 12,467. Since 1930, when the county

Surveys show that the average homemaker makes use of less than 10 per cent of the scores of available meat cuts. Since price per pound is affected by this demand for a comparatively few cuts, it is evident that she is overlooking many cuts that would help to stretch her meat dollar. Because meat is the center of the meal and is important in the food budget, it is of distinct advantage to be familiar with as many cuts as possible.

The above chart presents a graphic picture of less-demanded beef cuts and their origin. The shaded areas, representing 60 per cent of the carcass, are sources of these lesser-known cuts. Unshaded areas provide the cuts in most popular demand. In addition to their price advantage, the less-demanded cuts afford increased variety in the menu, and are at rich in nutritive value as the more demanded cuts.

Biggest Problem Of Small Business

We all know that from either a business or an individual standpoint, the payment of Federal income taxes is of first concern.

We must be aware that in any business the profits that can be used to retire debt, to finance inventory, to make replacements, or to provide for necessary expansion and increase desirable facilities of service, must come out of our business, "after taxes".

Of all the many problems facing businessmen, particularly small businessmen, the one that overshadows all others is the present inability to create satisfactory capital out of earnings, "after taxes", or to retire capital debt out of income, "after taxes".

Small business usually is started on borrowed or personally invested capital or a combination of the two. The proprietor hopes to retire these investments and borrowings out of the earnings of the business.

Up to now it has been possible to do this, and more, in a man's business lifetime. However, with today's income taxes, this has become increasingly difficult and in a great many cases, impossible.

As a result, a person wishing to go into business by buying out or establishing a going concern, even though his credit may be entirely satisfactory, many times cannot do so because his tax liability so reduces his net earnings that suppliers of capital will not loan him enough or he hesitates to risk his own money, plus borrowed money, because of the dissipation of his business earnings through high Federal income taxes.

But while the private enterpriser has this ever-present dilemma, there are other types of business that do have it. In other words, there are kinds of business that do not have to play the game by the same set of tax rules as apply to the private businessman.

These forms of business are known as cooperative corporations which are given an exemption from the payment of Federal income taxes on their business profits. They are able to finance inventories, provide for expansion of plant and facilities, liquidate debt, and even buy out other businesses with earnings that are wholly or mostly free from the payment of Federal income tax.

It is about this unfairness and discrimination that businessmen all over the nation are today complaining to their Congressmen and Senators in Washington. These complaints do not in any way prejudice the right of cooperatives to exist and do business. The sole issue is that businessmen and taxpayers, generally believe that cooperative corporations, like any others, should pay Federal income taxes on their corporate profits in the same way, and on the same basis as those with whom they compete.

Go to Sunday School

Beginning the second week following Easter, America will observe the ninth annual recognition of national Sunday school week (April 13 through 19). Lasting the entire week, this all-faiths drive is planned with an idea of stimulating the attendance of every adult and child at the Sunday school of his own choice on Sunday, April 19.

Sponsored by the Laymen's National committee, a non-profit, non-sectarian organization consisting of men and women from civic as well as business fields, this worthy project is year-long highlighted throughout the entire country.

Laying foundations of faith through the training in religion for our little ones is all important if we as a nation are to survive in today's world of paganism and constant conflict. Our Sunday schools are more than mere religious training institutions; they are a combination of the minister and lay workers, a happy team, united in their selfless dedication to the ideal of an ever closer relation between man and God.

The furniture was removed and stored in the city auditorium by firemen and helpers.

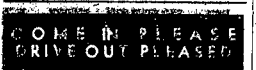
