Easter Message for 1953



'EASTER DAWN'

St. Mark, in his Gospel, was simply describing the passage of time when he began his account of Easter day by using these words: "As it began to dawn . . ."

He could have used the same words to describe the opening of any other day, but when he used them to begin Easter, he was to tell of a day that was different.

The things which were revealed by the sun and the events that were to transpire in the grey dawn made this one the most important day in the world. For Easter has all the physical appearance of an ordinary spring day, but for the saints of God, it has a glory that outshines all others.

For "as it began to dawn," there was the dispelling of gloom that had hung upon the followers of Christ like a funeral pall. Their disillusionment is reflected in Peter's decision to go back to fishing. Or in the mood of the Emmaus travelers, who sighed, "We had hoped that he might be the Redeemer of Israel, but alas, it is three days already." Or even in Mary's tears that beclouded her vision until she mistook her dearest friend to be a gardener.

"Sorrow endureth for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." Peter thought, but and re-considered to his early love of the shepherding of men. The Emmaus disciples have their eyes opened by the Guest who shares their bread. Even Mary smiles through her tears when the Lord speaks her name. The Light of Easter day dispels the gloom. The dawn of Easter is the harbinger of hope.

"As it began to dawn," came also the realization that all Christ had said was true. They remembered that he said, "Yet three days and I will rise again!" but they had set it aside as hyperbole. Now, like sunlight chasing clouds, came the illumination of their minds as they recalled his earlier conversations. They began to see that, if the unlikely was possible, and the preposterous was true, then surely the lesser claims were all the more reasonable. Now there was a timelessness that transcended doubt. "Heaven and earth shall pass away . . . but my words shall not pass away." The disciples discovered then what David Livingstone learned much later, "This is the word of a gentleman."

Have you ever wondered what the disciples did following the resurrection of Christ? I am confident that a favorite pastime was recalling the words of Christ.

"Remember the words of the Lord Christ how he said . . ." was a by-line. The Lord, as revealed by the Easter dawn, now gave credence to faith and his words consolation of every waiting heart.

But "as it began to dawn," the light of that day drove away the clouds of mystery and fear of men who could not understand death. Death, as such, does not exist. It may be separation, but it does not mean extinction. Death may seem mysterious, but it is not meaningless. Soul and body may be parted, but they are not destroyed. Jesus "abolished death," as Paul said, as a radio abolishes time and space — the distance is there, but it is transcended, outsped.

Immortality, which defies definition, is gloriously illustrated. The sun rose upon the resurrection of one who was dead but now is alive forevermore.

Let us believe that there is hope for all hearts that grieve; that somewhere night drifts to a morning beautiful with light, and that the wrong that now it triumphs, yields no sceptre long. But right will reign, and where the waves of error beat in vain, — (Frank L. Stanton)

Participates In A-Bomb Skirmish

Army Pfc. Carroll E. Fredrickson, son of Mrs. Ethel L. Fredrickson, Wakefield, witnessed the second blast, and participated in the simulated ground attack in the current series of atomic tests at Camp Desert Rock, Nev., Tuesday, Mar. 24.

He occupied a forward foxhole during the atomic blast and immediately after the blast charged forward in skirmishes to mop up an imaginary enemy theoretically weakened by the A-bomb explosion.

The maneuver — "Desert Rock V" — is designed to demonstrate the effectiveness of atomic weapons in support of ground action.

Fredrickson is a chemical-biological-radiological specialist in the 9710th Technical Service unit at the Army Chemical center near Baltimore, Md.

A graduate of Wayne State Teachers college, he entered the army in July, 1951.

"There Must Be a System To Determine Road Work"

One thing that has come to the fore through presentation of facts by newspapers, radio and television news broadcasts with respect to Nebraska's highway problem is the need for some kind of a system to determine where and what kind of roads should be built.

It is well known as to the history of Nebraska's highway system, first, that too many roads have been located and built because of political pressure put on the governor and the state engineer by so-called "influential" Nebraskans, and, secondly, that in an effort to meet such demands, plus the hue and cry to do something to get out of the mud and dust, too many surfaces consist of coatings much too thin—some only three inches thick—to carry the terrific loads and impacts of today.

Governor Robert Crosby has stated emphatically that "political roads" are out during his administration and former State Engineer Harold Aitken came up with a plan to follow through on that very promise—and that is what is called the sufficiency rating system.

But whether Nebraska builds roads on the basis of sufficiency rating or not, the fact remains that there must be some sort of system set up or the state will never get out of its highway muddle. And, furthermore, once that system is set up—whatever it may be—Nebraskans must agree to abide by it and not try to "bend it for this or that expediency."

What is meant by sufficiency rating? It is very simple, when broken down, for basically only three facts are involved: condition, economic elements and safety. A road that meets all requirements is given a rating. Here are the requirements, in terms of points.

Hard surfaced roads — Condition 35 points; economic factors: (a) remaining life 10, (b) maintenance cost 15, safety: (a) surface width 16, (b) sight distance 10, (c) passing opportunity 7, (d) consistency (such as sharp curve before a road suddenly narrows into a one-way bridge) 7; total 100.

Gravel roads — condition 35 points; economic factor: maintenance cost 20; safety: (a) sight distance, 10, (b) alignment (number of curves) 10, (c) surface adequacy 10, (d) consistency 5; total 100.

Thus a road rating lowest in sufficiency is one where the need for improvement is most urgent. Numerous examples of roads in this category were presented to the legislature by State Engineer Aitken in his recent all-day appearance before the lawmakers. Those examples and others were derived from actual on-the-spot surveys of every mile of road in Nebraska.

While Nebraska may have hard surfacing on quite a few of its main traveled routes, that does not mean that the state is in good shape roadwise for there is the factor of life expectancy to consider. As the life insurance actuary determines the average life span of men so the highway engineer determines the average life span of concrete pavement.

Based on actual Nebraska experience, the average useful, economic life of concrete pavements on Nebraska highways is 23 1/2 years. After that span of years, the road is excessively expensive to maintain and the traveling public is using a facility that is rough and actually hazardous.

Nearly 20 percent of the concrete, and other rigid type paving, on Nebraska state highways right this year, in 1953, will have served an average of 25 years without resurfacing.

During this year, more than half of about 1,600 miles of the state highway rigid type pavements will have served 18 or more years without resurfacing.

If no more concrete paving were resurfaced in the next five years, over half of the concrete paving on the state highways would be 23 or more years old.

Reconstructing and resurfacing of these concrete pavements will cost less money than building entirely new ones, but the restored facilities will not have as long a life expectancy as would entirely new paving. — Cliff Sandahl, Chairman, Nebraska Highway Conference.

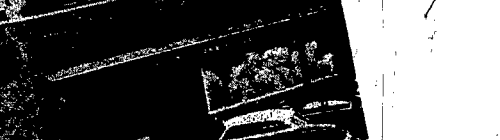
