Region's Roads Are To Undergo Repair

Contractors will be asked to bid on adding about 150,000 tons of gravel to Nebraska State highways at a Department of Roads and Transportation letting Apr. 30. State Engineer L. N. Riss said Thursday. No construction projects will be included in the letting.

Bids are being asked on several road jobs in the Wayne region.

On the eight miles from Winside east to No. 15, about 15,000 cubic yards of gravel are to be distributed on No. 35.

Approximately 2,000 cubic yards of maintenance gravel are to be bid on the 18 miles of No. 16 in Bond and Wakefield.

In Dixon and Thurston counties about 2,400 cubic yards of gravel are to be added to the 11 miles No. 9 between Emerson and Bond and to the six miles of highway through Thurston.

In Cedar and Wayne counties approximately 2,065 cubic yards of gravel are to be bid on No. 11, north of Belden to No. 10, and south of Belden to No. 10.

The engineer said that trucks, each carrying 6,000 cubic yards, would be required to transport the 111,702 cubic yards of maintenance gravel at once.

He pointed out that there are about 5,000 miles of gravel-faceted State highways in Nebraska and that they are the most expensive kind to maintain.

"Because so much of state highways are gravel-faceted, it is little money left for construction of state highways," Riss said.

Weather Notes
We've been just about as wet this week as we were the preceding seven days. Rainfall this week stands at .89 of an inch — up to Wednesday flood.
Most of this moisture came Thursday when the weatherman pulled the zipper on the clouds for .77 of an inch of precipitation.
There were traces of moisture last Wednesday, .02 of an inch, Monday and Wednesday. A rain early Tuesday morning measured .1 of an inch.
So far, the weatherman has spaced the rains about a week apart just right. Farmers can get into the fields and then let the rain help along their efforts — and get into the fields again.
Most of the oats are in now and corn will be next.

On June 4 Mr. Taylor wrote: "We are now 90 miles up the Platte on the Loup Fork, in company with about 250 wagons, blocked up here, near what was called a ferry before it was flooded, waiting for the water to subside. We are in the heart of the territory of the Pawnees, the most skillful thieves that can be, and some are paying dearly for their misfortune. In this neighborhood, they have stolen about 50 head of oxen, and every morning we hear of from two to six oxen being run off. About 200 Pawnees came here three days ago and are lying here with us, but with what intention we know not. We are not afraid of our lives, but we find them very annoying; they will almost steal a horse from under his rider."

Nebraska roads, then as now, were the subject of much complaint. The spring of 1853 was a very wet one — "the wettest

known. Mr. Taylor warned that those who had been through in dry seasons could have no idea of the difficulties encountered in trying to journey across Nebraska during wet weather.
"Even the road along the Platte, except a few miles along the base of the highlands, is horrible. Last Wednesday we saw many wagons set on the Platte bottoms and I am sorry to say mine was one of them."
In dry weather, though, the Platte valley roads, Mr. Taylor opined, would be superb. In many sections he thought they would be superior even to a plank road. "There are places where 30,000 wagons have, within five years, passed along a track of not over seven feet in breadth, and there is no rut — no depression of one inch below its original level."
Like most of his fellow emigrants, Mr. Taylor took special note of Chimney Rock, surely one of the outstanding landmarks along the trail. Many are the descriptions of Chimney Rock to be found in the literature of the overland migration of the American people. Mr. Taylor's notes are as follows:
"Chimney Bluff is a tunnel shaped mass of clay, perhaps 100 feet high, of really fine shape, and its center being a shaft probably 60 feet high and seemingly no more than five feet in diameter. They are both entirely naked, vegetation and the rains are steadily washing them down."

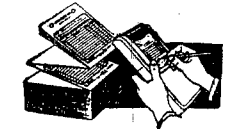

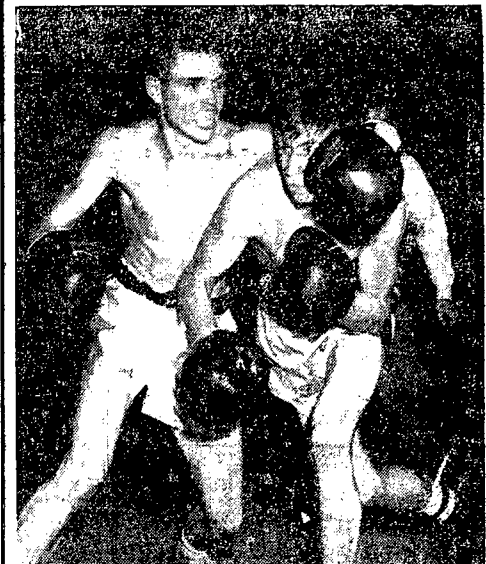



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Nebraska Lags Behind All States on Roads

With Nebraska being forced to channel most of its state highway revenue to maintenance of constantly deteriorating primary and secondary roads because of inability to keep up financially with the ever increasing needs for new and permanent construction, it is interesting to note what one state in the union has done about that very thing.

Official reports just released disclose that the state of Wisconsin has no road maintenance financial woes—at least statewide. For in that state the problem is handled by counties.

Details are lacking as to how Wisconsin counties perform in that respect, but the available statistics do show that from a percentage standpoint Nebraska lagged far behind all other states in estimated road construction obligations last year.

Nebraska had the dubious distinction of having a 23 per cent drop in road construction from 1951 to 1952. The only state approaching that percentage nationwide—and one, which unlike Nebraska, is blanketed already with hard-surface, permanent-type highways—was California, with a 25 per cent drop, three percentage points behind the Cornhusker state.

On the other hand, Arizona reported the biggest increase in new road construction of all the states for the two years—173 per cent—followed closely by Rhode Island with 169 per cent, Illinois with 121 per cent, and Oklahoma with 104 per cent.

And the payoff on the whole thing is that all of those states—as well as many others—are in the same category as California. All are quite extensively equipped with good roads, at the outset.

Not only does Nebraska have the greatest percentage decline in new road construction, but it also reports the least amount obligated to that phase of highway development of all states in this part of the nation.—Cliff Sandahl, chairman, Nebraska Editors Highway Conference.

Weekends Are Dangerous

Most of us think of weekends as a time for rest and pleasure. We can relax with the kids, or shoot a game of golf. It's a time for watching television, loafing through the newspaper, going to church, a visit with old friends.

But it is also a time of climactic violence on our roads. More than 15,000 persons were killed, and nearly 750,000 hurt in weekend accidents last year, according to figures compiled by insurance companies.

Forty per cent of the deaths and 36 per cent of the injuries were recorded on Saturdays and Sundays in 1952.

The most dangerous day of the week was Saturday, partly because more cars are in use Saturday than on any week day. Something else sets this day apart from the others.

Saturday night for too many people is a time when drinking and driving get together. No one knows exactly how many traffic accidents are caused by drinking drivers, but everyone knows it is a major problem. Everyone needs to know that even one drink before a drive is too many.

Soil Conservation Begins at Home

It has been said that soil conservation is good farm management, and results in additional income with a minimum of effort and expense. Soil conservation provides security not only for farmers and others of this generation, but also for generations to come.

Many people think of soil conservation solely in terms of huge regional projects which must be conducted at tremendous cost by government.

But the fact is that some of the most effective and productive soil and water conservation is that which is conducted individually and conservatively by the farmers themselves, including the owners of very small farms.

It is found in contour farming, in rotation grazing, in the construction of roads to catch and save water, in careful soil management, and in other proven practices which will prevent erosion and soil exhaustion and protect both crop and pastureland.
