Annual Husker Conference Career Day Will Be at College Campus Wednesday

E. W. Willert Is Director

Husker conference Career day will be held at Wayne State Teachers college Wednesday, Apr. 22. E. W. Willert, superintendent at Wayne City schools, is in charge of arrangements.

Around 400 students from the 10 high schools — Wayne High, Wayne Prep, Wakefield, Lyons, Wisner, Stanton, Oakland, West Point, Madison and Battle Creek — are expected to attend.

This year's program gets underway with an introductory period from 9:30 to 10:25 a. m. at the college auditorium.

Dr. John D. Rice, president of Wayne State, will welcome the students and Dr. G. W. Rosenloff,



Dr. G. W. Rosenloff, dean of admissions and inter-institutional relationships, University of Nebraska, will give the main address.

Director Willert announced consultants for 30 vocations have been contacted to meet with the students.

Will Discuss Five Points

Each consultant has been asked to discuss five points concerning the vocation he is presenting. They are: qualifications, advantages and disadvantages, duties and nature of work, opportunities for service and contribution to community and society and financial remuneration.

Each student will be able to meet with three vocational consultants plus a meeting with a college representative of his preference.

Representatives from the University of Nebraska, Wayne State, Norfolk college, Midland college will be among those on hand to talk to the students.

Vocations included at Career day are: Armed services, bookkeeping and business administration, commercial art, electrician, engineer and electrical engineer, home economics, homemaker, journalism, teaching, telephone operator, truck driver, coaching, farming, lab technician, doctor and pharmacist, nursing, office receptionist, stenographer, vocational agriculture, beauty operator, construction, mechanic, musician, sales person, veterinarian, and miscellaneous.

Horne was recently honored by Lincoln citizens for his contribution to the community, with the Lincoln Journal and Star reporting that "Louis Horne has had his hand in the pocket of Lincoln for the past 30 years — and no one has complained."

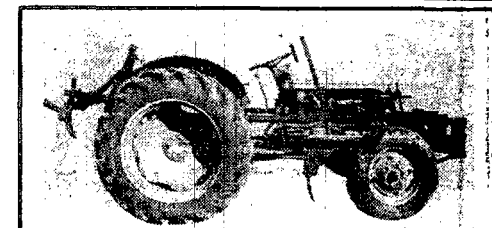
Wayne State Cops Triangular Tuesday

ORDINANCE NO. 484

An Ordinance to vacate the alley running east and west in Block One (1), Skeen & Sewell's Addition to the City of Wayne, Nebraska, and to repeal all ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA: Section 1. WHEREAS, Fred Elis and others, owners of land and lots in Block One (1), Skeen & Sewell's Addition to the City of Wayne, Nebraska, filed a request asking that the alley running east and west in said block be vacated, and it appearing that said alley has never been used by the citizens of the City or that it is suitable for use and that it is advantageous and for the best interest of the City to vacate said alley, now therefore:

Section 2. The 16-foot alley running east and west as platted, in Block One (1), Skeen & Sewell's Addition to the City of Wayne, Wayne County, Nebraska, is hereby wholly and entirely vacated and shall no longer be or constitute any part of the roadway, alleys, or other public grounds of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, and said alley and ground shall revert to the owners of the adjacent real estate as provided by law.

Section 3. All damages, if any there be sustained by the citizens of the City of Wayne or by the owners of the property therein shall be ascertained by the Mayor and Council upon claims being filed therefor in the manner as other claims are filed against said City.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith shall be and the same hereby are repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

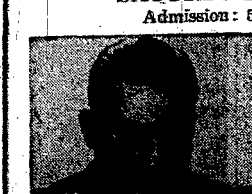

"Farm Clean-up Week"

The state's annual "Farm Clean-up Week," planned to reduce livestock and poultry losses from disease, injury and parasites, was set today.

The American Foundation for Animal Health said farmers can increase this year's livestock profits and reduce needless loss of animals by joining this clean-up drive. Livestock and farm organizations throughout the nation were invited to cooperate in observing the special week.

The Foundation outlined a seven-point program for the drive:

1. Clean and disinfect buildings and pens, especially those used for birth or housing of young animals and birds.
2. Clean up barnyards and lots to eliminate old piles of refuse and manure which might be infested with germs and parasites.
3. Get rid of old strawstacks. Plow under or scatter the straw, which often harbors germs and parasites.
4. Drain or fence off low spots in barn lots. Stagnant pools and mud are breeding places for infection.
5. Pick up nails, glass and other sharp objects which could cause wounds or could be swallowed by livestock.
6. Check for protruding nails, broken stalls or other defects which could injure livestock, paving the way for infection.
7. Move young animals to fresh, clean ground as soon as possible. Have pigs vaccinated against cholera, and against erysipelas in areas where it is authorized by state officials and recommended by the local veterinarian.

The Foundation said a successful Farm Clean-up week could substantially reduce the annual half-billion dollar livestock loss caused by disease and parasites.

Two Million Casualties

We have just received authentic details of a calamity that struck our nation last year. It was a calamity in every shocking sense of the word, and yet you probably didn't even realize it was happening to us.

The insurance companies reports show that traffic accidents took a casualty toll of more than two million Americans in 1952. It was the worst year in history for motor deaths and injuries.

Unfortunately, traffic accidents usually are a awesome only when they happen to you or someone you know. This, ironically, is an underlying cause of our traffic troubles. If drivers and pedestrians respected the dangers inherent in driving and walking, they would follow the rules of the road and avoid the accidents that add up to calamity.

Too many politicians' idea of freedom is to make everybody else do as they say.

Crime Doesn't Pay

Shoplifting is the oldest of problems to merchants. It became more acute with the spread of the self-service system of selling goods on what amounts to an honor basis.

The vast majority of customers are honest, but the crooked few must always be combated. In late years merchants have intensified their efforts in this regard—with marked success.

Teen-agers, women and men use all sorts of devices and stratagems to hide their loot—hats, handbags, double socks, inside pockets, large sleeves, heavy socks with elastic tops, hollowed out books, musical instrument cases, umbrellas, handbag arms, rolls of toilet paper, baby carriages, waist bands of trousers, rubberized panel inserts for sweaters, flowing coats, maternity gowns, and many others. Teen-agers often work in groups.

In spite of all this ingenuity, the shoplifter is almost invariably caught, sooner or later. However, it is the stolen goods, the steal merchandise, others steal nations. But crooks finally wind up in deep trouble—as witness history.
