

City's Spring Dance Festival Is Friday

Traditional and contemporary dances will be featured in the Wayne State annual Spring Dance festival which will be presented Friday morning at the Wayne city auditorium.

The festival, under the direction of Mrs. Esther Dewitz Carl, director of women's athletic activities on the campus, is in two episodes, the first dealing with traditional and folk dances, and the second made up of contemporary American dances.

Included in the folk dances will be typical dances from Norway, Holland, Switzerland, Finland, Germany, Sweden, France and England. Contemporary American dances include tap routines, barn dances, "Dunny Hop," "Snag," and quadrille.

One hundred persons from Tilden, Norfolk, Pilger and Wayne were present at the Sunday school conference of Baptist association held in Wayne Sunday.

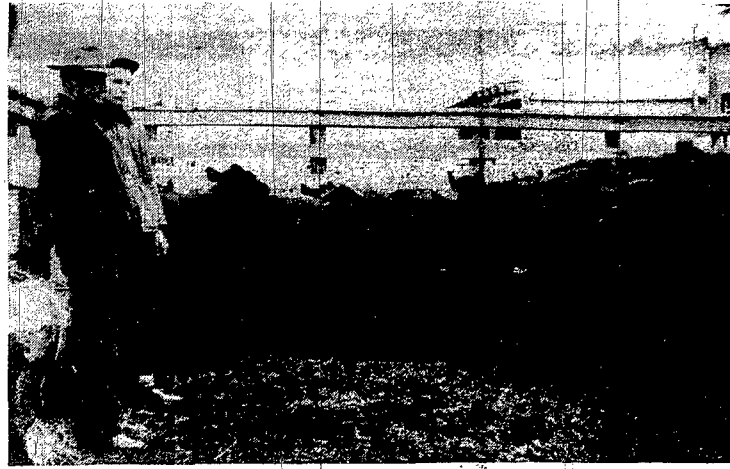
Sessions were held from 2:30 to 9 p. m. Fifty persons attended the pot luck supper.

Community Chest Expert Speaks Here

Twenty-two local people, many of them representing various charitable organizations and campaigns, got together at Hotel Morrison Monday evening to hear an explanation of the Community Chest plan.

This plan, explained to the group by Louis Horne, Lincoln, gets all local charitable organizations together in one solicitation per year. Or as he explained "puts all your eggs in one basket."

Mr. Horne is secretary of the Lincoln Community Chest, which has conducted 28 out of 31 successful campaigns.

"Our nation has always had the urge to help the lame and the blind, today we call it philanthropy," Horne said, but nowadays people are being led to death by a multitude of appeals.

The plan was started in 1917, according to the speaker, and there are now 1,600 chests. It united all creeds and beliefs in a common cause... prevents duplication, protects the public, spreads the giving.

"People should give in accordance with the need—rather than on the basis of emotional appeal," Horne told the group.

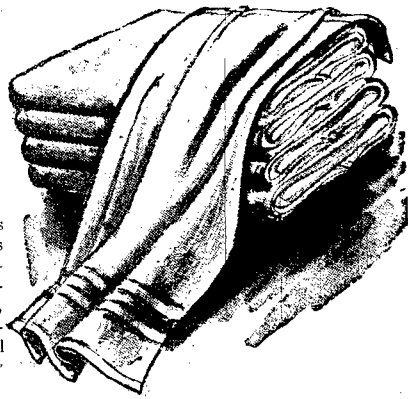

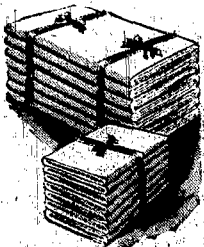

Community Chest

If it is a good thing . . . why not have it in Wayne?

At this point we reserve any opinion on the subject until a little study of the plan is made by folks here at home. But after hearing an explanation of the Community Chest plan, by an old hand, at a meeting here Monday evening . . .

It would seem to be a plausible answer to the multitude of appeals and solicitations that come along today.

Today this something called "Philanthropy" is the nation's tenth biggest business. . . . and so (to borrow a phrase from the speaker) may it be time to . . . "Put all our eggs in one ask-it."

It's Up to You

Only you can prevent traffic accidents. If this strikes you as an unreasonable charge, you need to read a booklet we just received from insurance companies. It is their annual publication of traffic accident data in which statisticians have dissected the anatomy of street and highway safety.

You would learn that 37,600 persons were killed and 2,090,000 injured by motor vehicle accidents last year. Turning the booklets's pages, you would find out why 1952 made tragic history as the most disastrous year for traffic casualties we have ever experienced.

It is clear from this report that most of last year's accidents could have been avoided. Most of them were caused by drivers and pedestrians in control of the circumstances which got them into trouble. The conclusion is inescapable: the accident problem can be solved only by those who do the driving and walking. Only you can prevent traffic accidents.

Subsidy Means Dependency

It is difficult to see how exception may be taken to Agriculture Secretary Benson's statements that price support programs should be avoided, except as insurance against disaster and to help stabilize food supplies. If the country had not been conditioned to dependency by years of living under a benevolent, tax-squandering government the fundamental rightness of the Secretary's position would be recognized by all.

The idea of looking upon perpetual prosperity as a natural right to be subsidized by government regardless of cost, should be repulsive to every American citizen. In the first place, it is inconsistent with the ideal of a self-reliant people, and secondly, as everyone should know by this time, it leads nowhere but to more bureaucracy and ultimate national bankruptcy.

Our national administration should seek to preserve the political and economic liberties of the individual, and protect the nation, from the communist menace. It should endeavor to halt a trend in domestic policies which destroy our freedom. It should strive to stop wasteful spending and depreciation of money caused by government promising too much to too many.

Men of Secretary Benson's caliber are trying to prevent our fifty-cent dollars from becoming two-hundred dollar or ten-cent dollars. They are opposed to the false security of the welfare state, in plainer words, the police state. They are proceeding on the assumption that the people agree with them and are worthy of the responsibilities as well as privileges bestowed upon them by our national republic.

In Bookland

They stare us in the face as we stand at the charging desk and we are glad to have something to remind us that our date stamp is correct. We stamp our books with the date stamp which is two weeks ahead of the date the book is taken out, so our date stamp reads May, but it is hard to believe when we look outside and see snow. CAVSULE COMMENTS ON NEW BOOKS: Only Fascist by Louise Dickinson Rich, author of

"We Took to the Woods" tells of her experiences since the sudden death of her husband. With typical humor, Mrs. Rich points out the odd aspects of only parenthood. "With Wings As Eagles" by Helen Wills is the experience of a mother who lost her son in the war. To all who have known sorrow this is a volume of comfort. "The Swan," by Marguerite Steen, author of "The Sun is My Undoing" is rather melodramatic and stilted in style. A throwback to an old-fashioned form of novel writing which will probably make a good movie but doesn't ring true in the printed form. "Two Came by Sea" by William S. "The Outsider" by Richard Wright, author of "Native Son" is another of his novels about the negro and the race problem.

State Engineer Ress Explains Relocation of Highway No. 35

(In response to an inquiry written to State Engineer L. N. Ress by M. R. Blaker, Emerson Tri-County Press; requesting information on the proposed relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield and Wakefield and Emerson, the following letter was received by the Emerson publisher.)

Engineer Ress, a busy and able new state official, recently appointed by Governor Robert Crosby, has taken time to explain in detail the reasons for the department's decision in the road location. We are reprinting the letter in full from Mr. Blaker's Tri-County Press.

Dear Mr. Blaker:

Your letter dated March 12, 1953 addressed to Governor Crosby, has been referred to this office for reply. Following a careful study and review of the information and data developed by this department, we are now in a position to substantiate the decision which has been reached relative to the location of Nebraska Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield.

The matter of highway location and relocation is assuming increasingly greater importance in view of the economic effect upon the communities involved and the highway users who will benefit by the highway improvement under consideration. The development of an adequate highway system is predicated upon the principles of providing the maximum of service to the traveling public with the minimum expenditure of public funds.

With these fundamental principles as a guide, the department has conducted a very thorough study of alternate locations of Nebraska Highway No. 35 between Wayne and Wakefield. The attached sketch indicates the routes which were considered and are identified as Route "A" and Route "B". Route "A" begins as the junction of Nebraska Highways 15, 98 and 35 in Wayne, and extends due east to junction with Nebraska Highway No. 16, two miles south of Wakefield. Route "B" is the present location of Nebraska Highway 35 from the junction with Nebraska Highway 15 two miles north of Wayne to the junction with Nebraska Highway No. 16 at the southeast corner of Wakefield.

Field surveys were conducted which furnished the necessary information for determination of the cost of improving the respective routes. Attached are estimated quantities and estimated unit prices which indicate that the cost of improving Route "A" would be total \$229,135 and the cost of improving Route "B" would total \$261,105.15. From the standpoint of cost of construction Route "A" would involve the expenditure of \$58,400 less of public funds than would Route "B".

Traffic studies have been conducted which indicate that the average daily traffic on Route "A" after improvement would be 810 vehicles, while Route "B" would serve only 715 vehicles per day. The maximum traffic service will, therefore, be provided by the improvement of Route "A".

logical since this is part of another highway route and must be considered for improvement on its own merits. In the event that the two miles on Nebraska Highway No. 15 were not improved to a dustless surface, this contention would not prevail. Nebraska Highway No. 15 was improved from Wayne to Laurel to provide a needed facility and not as a portion of Nebraska Highway No. 35. By the same token the two miles south of Wakefield must be improved as a portion of Nebraska Highway No. 16 and provide a needed traffic service. Our studies indicate that this two-mile section south of Wakefield will serve 1,025 vehicles per day after the Wayne east section of Highway No. 35 is improved. This volume of traffic most certainly justifies the improvement of this section and would reasonably be expected to pay for itself. The cost of improving these two miles is also attached and indicates the cost to be \$24,037.33. This amount deducted from the saving of \$58,400 in construction costs of Route "A" leaves a net saving of \$34,362.67 to be applied to the ultimate surface type on these two miles.

There are several other features which favor the selection of Route "A". The drainage course which crosses Route "B" at a point approximately three miles east of Highway No. 15 presents a very difficult problem on the present highway. The close proximity of the railroad crossing, the flat angle of crossing of the existing creek channel and the restricted capacity of the present channel will require a major revision of this drainage situation at a very substantial cost in order to correct the deficiencies which presently exist. The bridge at this location will also be of considerably greater length due to the larger area drained. The structure on Route "A" accommodates only one branch of a rather large area whereas the bridge on Route "B" will accommodate both branches of an area substantially larger than the single branch crossing Route "B".

Since the proposed location of Highway No. 35 will not miss either of the two communities of Wayne and Wakefield, the economic effect upon the business interests should not become a major factor. The residents along the present route of Highway No. 35 do not possess any inherent right which precludes the relocation to some other route which will better serve present day traffic desires and can be more economically constructed.

On the basis of detailed engineering and traffic data compiled, the department considers Route "A" as the more desirable location for Nebraska Highway No. 35, which will provide the maximum traffic service at a minimum of cost and without any undesirable effect upon the business economy of either community. Surveys and plans will be developed for the improvement of this route at such time as funds become available.

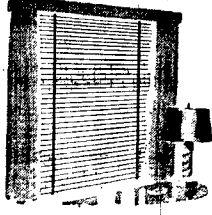

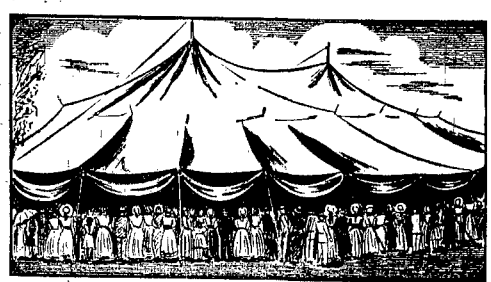
