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# Vandalism Outbreak Reported; School Houses Shot Up Sunday

One of the worst outbreaks of vandalism in recent years took place in Wayne county during the past week.

Rural school houses were the victims of a series of raids beginning last Wednesday night at district 88, one mile west of Wayne.

When Mrs. Max Hendrickson, teacher at the school, opened the building Thursday morning, she found three windows had been broken out and a venetian blind damaged. Paint cans had been thrown through two of the windows. Entrance was gained through the storm cave.

Monday night the raiders again struck at district 88. This time they tore down the lattice work on the rest rooms.

School houses at districts 8 and 27 provided targets for the vandals Sunday.

Fifteen windows were shot out at district 8, three south and three east of Wayne. A total of 20 bullets were fired into the building.

The school house at district 27, five south and seven east, fared somewhat better. Three windows were shot out and six shots were fired into the building. The church across the road was also fired on.

Joyce Bichel is teacher at district 8. Betty Tyrrell teaches at district 27.

School houses weren't the only targets the vandals riddled out. Milo Meyer's maintainer also took a pasting.

The windshield, lights and a front tire were hit on the machine parked on the Levan Linkage farm in farming county.

Sheriff Hans Tietgen investigated the shootings Sunday. Although no arrests have been made, Sheriff Tietgen reports he and the Cuming county sheriff do have leads and expect to break the case within a few days.

# Oats Resealing Program Explained

Government extension of farm storage loans on oats for another year and the making of farm-storage loans on 1952 crop farm-storage loans under purchase agreement was approved by the Reseal Loan program Apr. 24. PMA Chairman Tom Roberts announced.

Reseal loans mature Apr. 30, 1954. Producers desiring to extend farm-storage loans must file application before final date for delivery specified in delivery instructions.

Producers who have purchase agreements must notify the county committee by Apr. 30, 1953 if they intend to deliver oats to CCC under regular program or obtain reseal loan.

The oats and storage structure will be inspected and must meet eligibility requirements under 1952 Oats price support program before reseal loan is approved.

Producers who keep oats in farm storage for period of reseal loan and deliver the oats to CCC after maturity will receive storage payment of 10 cents per bushel at maturity of reseal.

There is no additional service charge to extend farm-storage loan; however, producers must pay one-half cent per bushel additional service charge of \$1.50, whichever is greater on number of bushels placed under reseal loan from purchase agreement.

Interest rate for reseal loan remains the same as for 1952 program.

Reseal loan program for 1952 crop corn was also approved Apr. 24. Details of this program will be announced at a later date.

# Refused and Neglected' Action Says

An action filed in district court here Thursday, Apr. 23, by Robert C. Jeffrey, 620 West 2nd street, Wayne, asks for \$2,349.27 in overtime and vacation pay from the county Rural Public Power District.

Jeffrey has been employed by the local REA corporation for some eight years. Robert O. Haas is manager for the county electric cooperative here.

According to his petition, Plaintiff claims the power district owes him overtime pay for various periods of time from June 1944 to October 1952, regular salary for the first half of October, 1952, and for certain vacation periods. The latter includes two vacations of two weeks each in 1948 and 1949, and 10 days prorated vacation in 1952.

The petition, as filed last Thursday, states:

"That the plaintiff was employed by defendant at regular monthly wages based on 44 hours per week or 192 hours a month; that plaintiff could accumulate all overtime in excess of 192 hours; that plaintiff should have two weeks vacation each year with pay.

"That from June, 1944 to on or about Oct. 1, 1952, defendant paid plaintiff only the regular monthly salary but refused and neglected to pay plaintiff any overtime and neglected and refused to give plaintiff his vacations in 1948 and 1949; that from Oct. 1, 1952 to on or about Oct. 16, 1952, defendant has refused and neglected to pay plaintiff his regular rate of pay overtime and vacation for 1952 unless plaintiff relinquished all of his claims to accumulated overtime and vacation."

Also included in the petition is an itemized list of 12 employment periods or vacations, each showing amounts due. The items vary from as low as \$10.63 to \$605.72, and the "Total amount due plaintiff" is listed at \$2,349.27.

"The petition asks a judgment against the Wayne County Rural Public Power District for the above amount together with interest at six per cent from date of judgment, and costs.

"Summons prepared and dated Tuesday, is being served on the REA directors by Sheriff Hans Tietgen. They will then have 30 days in which to file an answer with the district court, clerk.

"No court action will probably be taken until the fall session, Dave Hamer, clerk of district court, stated.

Attorney Budd Bornhoff is representing Jeffrey. K. N. Olds is attorney for the power district.





He graduated from high school at Colby, received his MD at Cotner U. 1904, did graduate work with Dr. O. J. Osner, Chicago, was at Mayo clinic in 1907 and later at the University of Nebraska. From 1908-10, he practiced with Dr. C. A. Lutgen, Auburn.

On Jan. 27, 1910, he married Grace Welch. They came to Wayne

that year. Dr. Lutgen is survived by his wife and a son, Joe, Stockton, Calif.

## Seven Danger Signals

This is Cancer control month. According to statistics, cancer kills more children from 3 to 15 years of age than any other disease. Last year some 3,200 children and 216,800 adults died of cancer.

By early diagnosis and prompt treatment, it is now possible to save half of those who develop cancer.

For many years the American Cancer Society has been teaching the public cancer's seven danger signals and persuading men and women to have regular physical examinations.

For those who don't or can't remember the seven danger signals, here they are:

1. Any sore that does not heal.
2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
3. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
4. Any change in a wart or mole.
5. Persistent indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
6. Persistent hoarseness or cough.
7. Any change in normal bowel habits.

If they don't always mean cancer, but if one of them develops, go at once to your doctor.

Millions of dollars are spent yearly for cancer research. Since the war, scientists have found some 300 different chemicals that will damage cancer cells.

This research has made it possible for persons developing cancer to have an even chance of being saved if treated early.

Funds are needed to help continue this research program. Give to your local cancer drive.

## 'Litterbugs' and 'Vandalbugs'

Because no plinking, no hunting, no fishing and no trespassing signs are becoming more frequent and reducing areas for recreation, a nation-wide campaign is being organized against "litterbugs" and "vandalbugs" by civic organizations.

The twin menace to outdoor America has been well known for years but nobody has yet done enough about it. The litterbug, wherever he stops or travels by car, still leaves his trail of eggshells, watermelon rinds, worn-out Kleenex, beer cans, broken pop bottles, or even unmentionables.

The vandalbug is still at large in great numbers. The hunting vandal still aims his rifle anywhere for fun, shoots holes in farmers' milks cans, makes signs unreadable, shatters power line insulators, and spreads wreckage across the country from broken windows to dead prize bulls.

Other vandals still set forests on fire with a flip of a cigarette or with a deliberate match. Many families still go wild once they get out-of-doors. They cut down wild flowers and shrubs, and write initials happily on the walls of rest rooms and public grounds. Highways and roadsides have become the wastebaskets of the highway users.

It has been suggested that automobile manufacturers, the automobile accessory industry and petroleum companies can well consider selling low-priced waste containers for cars which can be emptied at approved places along highways, in public parks, and at gasoline stations.

This is an idea that deserves the support and cooperation of everyone who is interested in preserving the beauties and attractions of the American outdoors.

## Still Need Improvement

A question often raised in discussions pertaining to Nebraska's road problem is: Just where are the 603 miles of Nebraska highways which the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, as of June 30, 1952, said were "under construction"?

The inference behind the question as to location of these projects, of course, is two-fold: (1) That there is no need for further new construction of roads in Nebraska; and (2) that Nebraska citizens are being "left in the dark."

As has been pointed out officially, those 603 miles "under construction" constitute in the main improved roads that have been traveled on for a year or more but on last June 30, for this or that reason, had not come up to the point of being 95 per cent completed in accordance with rigid specifications set by the Federal bureau.

Therefore, it is obvious that the many additional new construction projects demanded by the people in all parts of the state are not included in those 603 miles.

In other words, there are still many miles of Nebraska roads that need improvement and need it badly. Cliff Sandahl, Nebraska Editors Highway conference

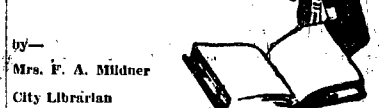
### 15 Years Ago

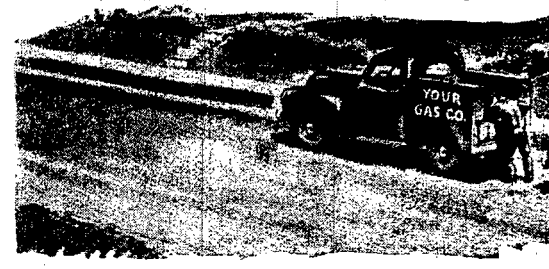

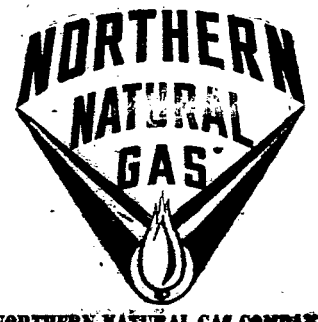

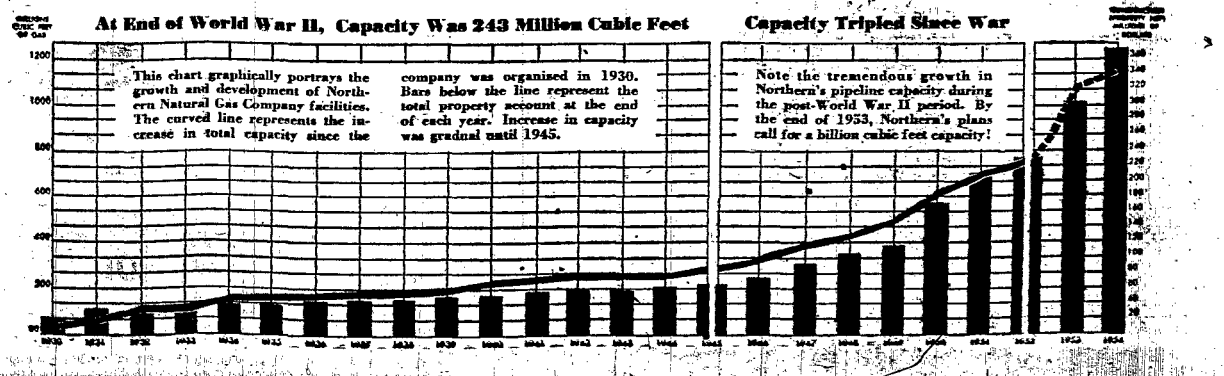

**Results of Fertilizer, Corn Tests Given**

The following observations by G. W. Lowrey and P. L. Ehlers, staff members of the University Agronomy department in charge of outstate testing are taken from "Outstate Testing Circular 27," copies of which are available at Wayne County Extension office, County Agent Harold Ingalls stated.

In a comparison of ammonium nitrate and anhydrous ammonia, they say in eight experiments conducted in 1952, yields indicated no significant difference between ammonium nitrate and anhydrous ammonia when applied as a side-dressing at either the 40 or 80-pound rate of nitrogen when the corn was 10 to 18 inches tall.

It is interesting to note that the yield increase from the first 40-pound increment of nitrogen was three times as great as that produced by the second increment.

On the basis of these results, there does not appear to be any appreciable difference between the yields obtained from ammonium nitrate and anhydrous ammonia.

How do ammonium nitrate and anhydrous ammonia applied prior to planting compare with their application as a side-dressing when corn is 10 to 18 inches tall?

The results obtained during the last three years are somewhat conflicting. In three of five experiments, 1950 to 1952, yields indicate that the application of anhydrous ammonia as a side-dressing when corn was 10 to 18 inches tall was superior to an application prior to planting.

One experiment in 1952 showed no difference in the time of application, whereas in 1950, one experiment showed that anhydrous ammonia applied prior to planting was somewhat superior to side-dressing.



**More Classes Added At Livestock Show**

Several additional classes have been added to the 1953 Ak-Sar-Ben 4-H Livestock show. County Agent Harold Ingalls announced.  
The 4-H beef show will include a classification for purebred breeding heifers. There will be two classes each for Herefords, Angus and Shorthorns: (a) heifers calved between Jan. 1 and June 30, 1952, and (b) heifers calved between July 1 and Dec. 31, 1952.
