



# Can You Increase Your Farm Income

During the forties, Nebraska farmers experienced favorable price relationships and farm incomes were high. Now, price relationships are becoming less favorable. This means less farm profit out of which to live and to retire indebtedness. For some of the less efficient farmers, it may even mean a threat to the continuation of operations unless changes can be made which will make their businesses more profitable. The pertinent question facing you as farmers is what changes should I make and how can I accomplish them?

We see and hear a great deal about this being a time when we should cut down on expenses But what you are really interested in doing is increasing your net farm income. In some instances, this may call for even greater cash expenditures than you have been making

### Less Expenses or More Net Income

As a rule, increasing the net farm income on any farm requires much careful thinking and planning. This cannot be completed at one sitting. All of the alternatives should be considered. Ideas must be shuffled and reshuffled as you ride the tractor, drive to town, or milk the cows.

In general, there are two types of changes which can be made to improve farm incomes. These are: (1) changes in combinations of crops grown and or livestock produced, and (2) changes in practices used within enterprises.

### Proper Enterprise Organization

Consider the first of these general methods for a moment. Asking yourself these questions in regard to your organization:

I. Am I making the best use of the land I have? Steep, badly eroded hillsides usually should be seeded to hay or pasture. Likewise, wet spots in fields might be handled more profitably if they were seeded down to grass. In some instances the use of mechanical conservation practices may enable you to continue using land for crop pro-


be controlled. The real objective of your cropping program is to adopt a combination of crops along with management practices which will give you the most satisfactory net income over a period

3. Am I keeping the right kind and number of livestock? The feed produced on a particular farm has an important bearing on the kind of livestock kept. Beef cattle can generally make better use of low-grade roughages than dairy tattle. Good market outlets for eggs or milk may influence your livestock programs. Likewise, the labor supply and the likes and dislikes of the operator must

4. Is the machinery, equipment, and building set-up which I have really well suited to the job at hand? Investments along these lines may be made with an eye toward (1) increasing net farm income (greater production or better quality production per unit of cost), (2) easier work, or (3) more leisure time. Wrong judgments on money spent for either buildings or machinery are not easily erased or corrected-not, at least, without financial loss. Well adapted labor-saving machinery, when fully employed, helps greatly in achieving efficient, low cost farm production. Investments in either machinery or buildings, as a rule, represent large capital outlays, the returns from which may be realized only over a period of years. Consequently, there is always considerable element of financial risk involved where such investments are made. This is especially true for the man who is hard pressed for cash or credit, and who goes in debt to get either new buildings or machinery.

### Improving Management Practices

For many, however, the opportunities for increasing farm incomes through reorganization seem rather intangible. For such people the solution may appear to be almost entirely within the realm of the second general type of change affecting farm income—improved management practices. Just what can we do along these lines which will improve our net farm incomes?

There are several sources from which farmers can obtain ideas for adoption on their farm. These include (1) observation of what their neighrs are doing, (2) trial and error process by which they try out new ideas on a small scale to see how well they work, (3) results of experiment station research which are recommended by the extension service, and (4) out-state test-ing results.

## Proper Use of Cash or Credit

In considering possible changes, farmers

should never lose sight of the various alternative uses which can be made of the resources at hand. For example, would a hundred dollars spent for fertilizer be as profitable as if used to buy more protein? You have to do some figuring in deciding which you are going to do if you are short of eash or credit. If you banker is wide awake and well informed on agriculture, he can help you think through this kind of a problem. Perhaps your county agent can help you decide which would give you the greatest returns. Sometimes there may not be a clear cut answer but your better judgment may tell you that one is a better

### Three Types of Management Practices

In general, managements practices can be divided into three categories: (1) those that may require more labor but little if any, additional cash output: (2) those that require relatively small cash outlays with the possibility of a quick return on the investment; and (3) those which may call for rather sizeable cash expenitures and which will pay off only over a period of years. Not everyone is in a position to carry out practices requiring increased cash expenditures. Many of the best practices, however, are ones which may call for increased expenditures.

Close attention to the selection of seeds and breeding stock combined with good soil fertility practices, careful feeding of balanced rations, and good care and full use of labor-saving machinery will go far toward making a well organized farm business successful.
