Walfred Carlson, sr. Rites Held Here Sunday Afternoon

Funeral services for Walfred Carlson, sr., 68, were held at St. Paul's Lutheran church, Wayne, Sunday afternoon, May 10, at 2 p. m. Rev. S. K. deReese officiated. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery.

Walfred Elmer Carlson was born Sept. 9, 1884, in Orsja, Kalmarian, Sweden. He died of a heart ailment May 7, 1953 at the Bentback hospital, Wayne.

He was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran faith in Sweden. In 1903, he came to America and settled in Wayne county where he resided for 45 years, 38 of which were spent on the same farm before he retired and moved to Wayne five years ago.

On Sept. 21, 1910, he was united in marriage to Esther Nelson at

Wayne. Eight children were born to the couple. Survivors include: his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Russell Pryor, Wayne; Mrs. Gilbert Dangberg, Winside; and Mrs. Henry Langenberg, Hoskins; four sons, Donald Carlson, Wayne; Walfred Carlson, Jr., Wayne; Alvin Carlson, Madison; and Clarence Carlson, Wayne; two sisters, Mrs. Charles Nelson, Winside; and Anna Carlson, Sweden; two brothers, Gustav and Herman, Sweden; and 16 grandchildren.

His parents, four sisters, a brother and a son, Carl Edgar, who died in infancy, preceded him in death.

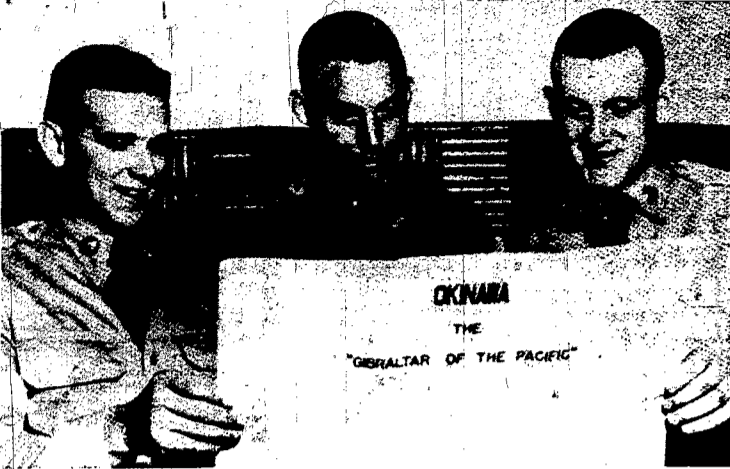
