Kyl took over the chamber position in May, 1948 after serving as principal and coach at Wayne City schools.

He attended high school and college in Wayne and received his masters degree from the University of Nebraska.

As secretary, Kyl's special interests were agricultural developments and youth activities.

When asked what was his greatest satisfaction as chamber secretary, he replied, "Working with people who work unselfishly and continually for community betterment and the wide acquaintance with folks in northeast Nebraska."

Officials Urge Spraying of Weeds

Many Nebraska weeds are now in an ideal stage of growth for excellent control with the application of chemicals sprays.

John D. Furrer, assistant extension agronomist at the University of Nebraska, says that pennygrass, mustard, docks, hoarycrass, and others can be controlled now by the application of 2-4-D.

All of the named weeds but hoarycrass and the docks can be controlled with an application of one pint of 40 to 44 percent ester, or one pint of 40 percent amine salt form of 2-4-D.

The docks and hoarycrass require a heavier application, usually 2 to 4 times this amount, to get effective control.

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

Legislators Kept Their Promises on Roads

Nebraska's 1953 Legislature is deserving of a real pat on the back for making possible a highway construction program for the next two years that will be a big step toward solution of one of the state's knottiest problems.

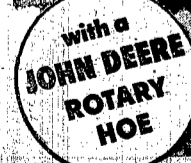
The fact that 32 of the 43 legislators—three more than necessary to enact a bill with the emergency clause—voted on final passage of the penny increase in gasoline tax was especially commendatory. For now the State Highway department can proceed immediately with the much-needed construction projects and be that much ahead.

The heart of the program put forth by better road advocates this past year has been the one-cent additional gasoline tax. Thus definite progress in the next two years is assured.

Significantly, the final vote on the gasoline tax bill showed that the legislators who made pre-election commitments generally stuck by their promises and voted the way they said they would.

The record now discloses that of the 32 who voted "yes" on final passage of the gas tax bill, 18 had given a "flat yes" answer to the question during the campaign, seven had given a "qualified yes" answer but gave strong indication they would vote "yes," and seven had not answered or had declined to commit themselves in their answers.—Cliff Sandahl, Chairman, Nebraska Editors Highway Conference.

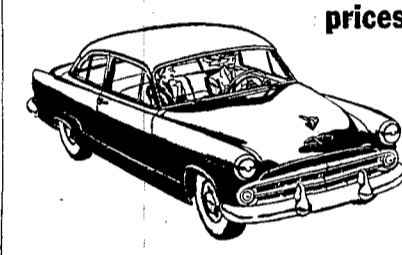

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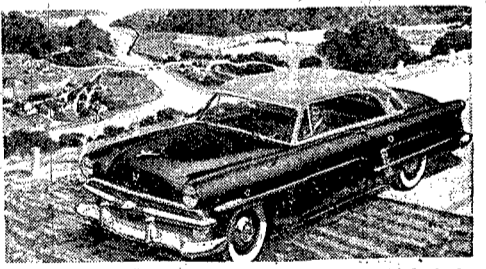
