## Wayne County Schools Get \$47,457.56 Apportionment

### \$7,073 to City Schools

Wayne county schools receive a state apportionment amounting to \$47,457.56 this year, County Superintendent Marie Wright announced today.

This total, the highest ever, includes \$45,566.56 from the state and \$1,891 from fines and licenses.

This year's apportionment is nearly double last year's, when \$23,823.72 were distributed among the 80 odd schools in the district. Auctioning of school land leases attributed to the increase.

Distribution of the funds is made according to the number of students in the districts.

Districts having town schools receive the greatest amounts. Wayne City schools, district 17, receive \$7,073.44; Winside, district 39, \$2,129.88; Carroll, district 52, \$1,316.65, and Hoskins, district 9, \$870.79.

### Plans for Bloodmobile's Visit Here June 18 Are Made at Monday Meeting

Plans for the Red Cross bloodmobile's visit to Wayne at a meeting held at the Woman's club rooms Monday night.

Margaret Mackechnie, Columbia field worker for the Red Cross, met here with the staff and recruiters who will help at the bloodmobile June 18 at the auditorium.

The aim will be to collect 192 pints of blood for defense and for gamma globulin.

Mrs. Alfred Eddie is chairman and Mrs. Ismael Hughes, chairman of the staff to assist Red Cross officials. Mrs. Basil Osburn is head of the canteen. Dr. Gordon Shupe is in charge of the recruitment. The blood will be taken from 10 a. m. until 4 p. m.

Donors must register and appointments will be made for them. Donors must be between the ages of 18 and 59, and those between 18 and 21 and not married must have the written consent of parents.

Blood will not be taken from anyone under 110 pounds in weight. Any who have had jaundice are not permitted to give. Mothers of children under a year old are not taken and one who has had surgery within six months will not be registered. Recent tooth extractions must be healed.

Donors are not allowed to eat fat or fatty foods within four hours before blood is taken.

Recruiters will meet in the Lions club room the evening of June 4 at 7:30.

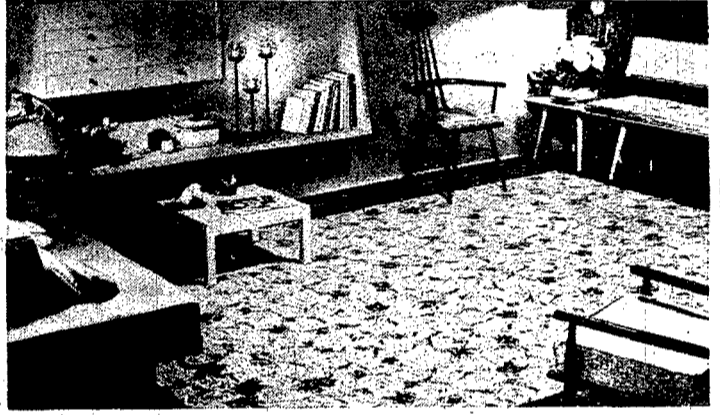

## Modernizing Our Federal Tax Laws

The tax-writing Ways and Means committee of the House of Representatives is presently making a comprehensive study of our federal tax laws with an eye to a general recodification of them this fall or early next year. This is a long overdue step in the right direction, since there has been no real codification of our tax laws since back in the nineteenth century.

Federal laws today are a maze of endless amendments, interpretations, court decisions and ambiguous and often meaningless statutes. So confused have they become that even the most able tax lawyers and experts have extreme difficulty in finding their way through the mass of legalistic snafu that has developed over a period of almost 75 years.

A complete review is needed to completely modernize our federal tax structure and it is hoped that the present action of the Ways and Means committee will result in the clarification of what today is an almost impossible situation.

One of the most unfair situations that has grown up with the years is the indefensible spread of corporate tax exemptions in the business economy.

These exemptions were originally granted to certain types of business—such as cooperative corporations and mutual companies—back in the days when the tax climate was completely different than it is today.

What might have been tolerable thirty or forty years ago in the granting of tax exemptions to these types of business is no longer acceptable in 1953. It is high time that all business corporations regardless of their form or their ownership be taxed on the same basis and required to contribute their fair share to the support of our government, our defense effort, our armies abroad, and our commitments to our allies.

The present effort to modernize our federal tax structure presents a golden opportunity to the congress to plug this most flagrant and vexing loophole.
