
Thank You, Senator

One act of needed legislature to cor-rect an old error was passed by the state legislature and signed by the governor April 14. The bill, known as Legislative Bill 448, is designed to clear title on certain ity properties.

L.B. 448 was introduced in February our senator, L. M. Schulz of Ropers, Ifax county. It is all act designed to rect title on tax foreclosures (instituty our Colfax the city, any city) in the early City Librarian ed by hirties.

Wayne is not the only Nebraska city needing this legislation. Many fothers had bid in property some 20 years ago for the amount of back taxes then due.

Years later they were unable to clear the title after reselling the real estate— because of "a bobble" in method. Now, if the supreme court approves Senator Schulz' bill as passed, this 20-year-old error may be corrected at last.
