Sheriff Offers \$50 For School Vandals

Twelve Windows Broken at South Brenna School

Wayne County Sheriff Hans Tielgen is offering a reward of \$50 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties responsible for malicious destruction of rural school property in Wayne county.

This action is the outcome of recent vandalism at South Brenna school, District 35. Twelve windows in the school were broken by persons armed with air rifles.

Residents of the area near the school reported four youths, armed with guns, leaving the scene toward Station county.

This is not the only case of vandalism in recent weeks. Earlier damage had been reported to the school, two churches and two mail boxes.

Polio Evaluation Clinic June 29

A special evaluation clinic open to all 1952 polio patients from a 12-county area in northeast Nebraska will be held at Benthack hospital, Wayne, Monday, June 29. It was announced today by Clifford Belknap, Lincoln, east Nebraska representative for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Purpose of the clinic is to provide all 1952 polio patients from the designated area, regardless of age, an opportunity to have their current condition evaluated by a certified orthopedist. There will be no charge.

Counties included in the clinic area are Antelope, Boone, Burt, Cedar, Cuming, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Madison, Pierce Thurston and Wayne.

Nydahl Rites Held Here Wednesday

Funeral services for Theodore Nydahl, Jr., Winside, were held Wednesday afternoon at St. Paul's Lutheran church, Wayne. Burial was in Pleasant View cemetery, Winside.

Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Nydahl, 36, committed suicide Monday morning in the basement of his farm home four miles northeast of Winside.

County Attorney Charles McDermott, acting as coroner, and Sheriff Hans Tielgen investigated the case and pronounced the death a suicide. They said there would be no inquest.

The body was found by Nydahl's father, with whom he lived alone. It was hanging from a steel cable. Officials said he had apparently slipped the cable over a pipe in the basement and jumped off a chair.

Dr. D. O. Craig, Winside, was called immediately after discovery of the body but efforts at revival were unsuccessful. McDermott placed the time of death at around 7:30 a.m.

Nydahl had been in poor health for many years. He had recently returned from a three week stay in a Sioux City hospital for treatment of rheumatism.

He is survived by his father, one brother, Melvin, and one sister, Mrs. Vera Jensen, Winside.

'Home from Korea... 100 Missions Completed'

Einung Awarded Seven Road Gravel Contracts

Seventeen contracts for maintenance gravel resurfacing of state highways in northeast Nebraska have been awarded State Engineer L. N. Ross today.

Bids totaling \$1,596,464.39 were placed three contracts in Lincoln, Thursday. The bids were about \$89,000 under the highway department's estimate. Included in the bids were \$851,333.95 for construction work and \$435,130.44 for maintenance work.

Eight contractors won the 17 contracts for work in the northeast area. Einung Sand and Gravel company, Wayne, received seven contracts totaling \$36,507.75. Platte Valley Construction company, Grand Island, has three contracts in the total amount of \$16,655.75. Gerhold company, Columbus, has two jobs at \$4,254.75. Five firms have one contract each.

Einung made his bids effective only if he were awarded all seven jobs. He was the only bidder on one of them. His bids on the other six were \$100 over the estimate. See ROAD CONTRACTS — Page 8

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Expect Over 100 Farmers To Attend

Inspection of outstanding farming operations in the Wayne area is scheduled Wednesday when the Wayne and Dixon County Feeders associations hold their annual farm tour.

County Agent Harold Ingalls said over 100 farmers and businessmen are expected to take part in the tour which will start at the Wayne courthouse at 9:30 a.m.

Six farms near Wayne and Wakefield will be visited during the tour with noon lunch scheduled at the Wakefield city park. Farms to be visited are those of John and Herman Heinemann, Roy Sundell, William Driscoll, Virgil Ekberg, Emil Muller and Gustav Swanson.

First stop will be at the Heinemann farms two miles south and five east of Wayne. Here the group will survey the feed lot arrangement and 400 cattle on dry lot and pasture. Work-saving feed handling and storage equipment will be inspected.

The Driscoll farm, a 160-acre farm is also noted for its excellent farm shop and machine shed. A handy improvement for the feeding operation is a cattle underpass which allows the cattle access to pasture across the road while they are in the feed lot.

Pasture will be the big feature of the visit to the Sundell farm, a mile south of Wakefield. Other items of note will be irrigated fields and fertilized soils. Lunch will be served following the tour for those from the Wakefield area.

A comparison of feeding methods will be made at the Driscoll farm, a mile north of Wakefield, where 125 head of cattle are on feed. Half of the animals are on dry lot and the others on pasture.

Feeding cattle on pasture will also be the big item at the Ekberg farm. See FARM TOUR — Page 8

New Parcel Post Limits Announced

New limits on parcel post packages will go into effect at the Wayne post office July 1. It was announced this week by Postmaster J. J. Steele.

The new limits were brought about when the Wayne office was converted to first class. The limits will affect only parcels going to other first class post offices.

Effective July 1, the weight limit will be 48 ounces for first class and second class. The weight for parcels to first class offices in third through eighth zones is 20 pounds. Size limits for all zones will be 72 inches length and girth combined.

These new restrictions do not affect parcels sent from the Wayne office to other first class offices. Limits for these will remain at 70 pounds and 100 inches.

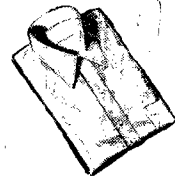

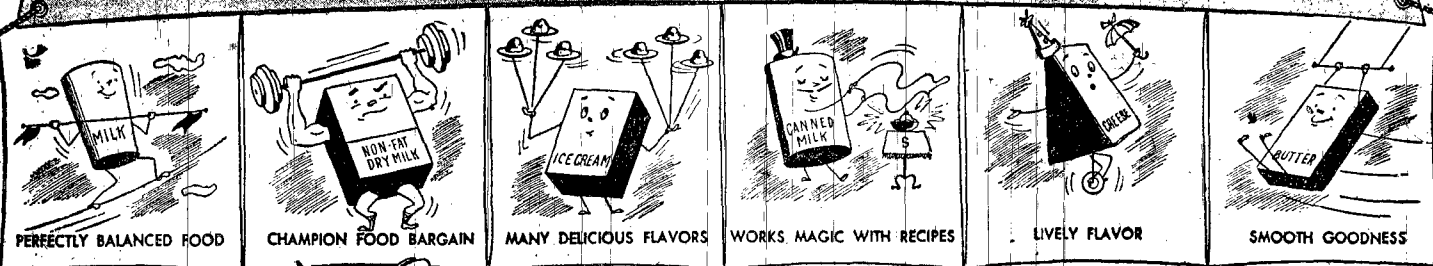

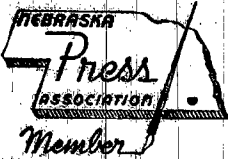

Parking Meter Fiasco . . . or WHO Gets Your Money?

A year ago the city council of Harlan, Ia., installed parking meters. Last month, after a year of trial and tribulation, the nickel-grabbers were taken out . . . by vote of the city council.

In that city, about the size of Wayne, 154 meters were installed by a council mesmerized by a glib parking meter salesman at the cost of approximately \$10,800.

By contract with the meter company, the city paid one-half the income or a minimum of \$2.50 per month on the cost.

And in year's time . . . from the pockets of the city's customers and visiting public, \$5,000 has been paid to the meter company. In addition the city collected clear, for its share, \$3,000 plus \$1,400 in traffic fines.

That \$1,400 in fines, we assume, came from such crimes as overtime parking assessments, that might be levied when a customer elected to stay and finish his shopping in a local store . . . rather than run out to his car and drive away.

Again today Harlan, Ia., can proudly tell the folks roundabout, as we can here at Wayne, "come to our city anytime . . . free parking, stay as long as you like, we welcome you."
