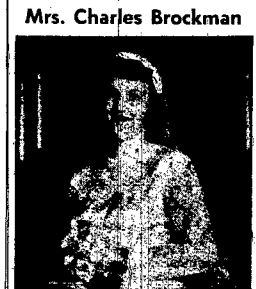

Out of Old Nebraska

An important point of entry into Nebraska 100 years ago was Council Bluffs, or Kanawville, as it was sometimes called. This one-time Mormon settlement had in a few short years developed into one of the most important shipping-off places in the west, and by the spring of 1853 its merchants were anticipating a banner year.

Many of the travelers were unfavorably impressed with the Missouri River town. During the peak of the season there simply were too many people for the town's meager facilities. One man enroute from Watertown, Wis., to Oregon, wrote:

"Ten thousand strangers have been here in a month, and are gone again, and the town begins to be desolated and still. It is built on a sandy, one story high, on both sides of a street running about 60 rods down the bottom of a ravine, between high, dirty clay hills, where a train of pack mules can be seen. There are perhaps a half dozen two-story buildings in the place, all devoted to gaming, the only business that can afford to live in them. I know not whether there is a frame building in the city. Their stores and offices are all in little log buildings, that would be a disgrace to almost any Wisconsin farm, and would not be allowed to stand a week in any Wisconsin village, have not seen a school house, nor a church, in the town."

Another wrote: "A majority of the citizens appear to be only temporary residents, who assemble here during the egress of emigration, for speculative purposes and erect temporary buildings accordingly. . . . Came very near upsetting on the main and only street, on account of rattles and sidling places in the street. The whole length of the street today filled with wagons and teams, taking in their outfit, render it almost impassable."

A source of great irritation to the ferry service, it was wholly unable to handle the large emigration and everyone experienced a delay of several days before getting across to Nebraska — and then the crossing was had only at what the emigrants invariably considered exorbitant rates.

Not all travelers were unfavorably impressed with Council Bluffs, however. One wrote that he got provisions so cheaply there that it didn't pay to haul them from home. This was in 1853. Another year
