### Four Youths Plead Guilty; Fined For Vandalism Acts

One of the worst outbreaks of vandalism in Wayne county in recent years was brought to a climax Friday when four youths pleaded guilty and were fined in county court.

Fines totaling \$220 and costs totaling \$37 were levied against the youths. Beside the fines and costs, payment for the repair of the damaged buildings is also their responsibility.

The vandalism carries back to April 26 when school houses at districts 8 and 27, St. Paul's Lutheran church, three miles east and three and one-half miles south, were shot up.

Those pleading guilty to the charges were: Dallas Matthews, Gilbert Thies, Gilbert Schmidt and Eldon Thies, all from Wisner. All are minors.

County Judge W. A. Crossland fined three of the youths \$20 each. Matthews was fined \$70, \$20 more than the others, for also shooting up some mailboxes. Costs of \$9.25 were paid by each youth.

The school house at district 8, three east and three south of here, was the hardest hit, having 15 panes of glass shot out.

County Sheriff Hans Tietgen investigated the shootings and made the arrests.

### Corn Higher; Cattle, Hogs Are Down

Assessed valuation of real estate and personal property in Wayne county is dropped over \$2 million during the year, according to assessment figures released today by County Assessor Henry Aip.

The assessment figure for 1952 was \$33,040,515. This year's total is \$30,450,440, or \$2,590,075 lower. State and county tax levies are made on this figure. Levies will be announced after budgets are made and approved.

Actually, the 1953 assessment figure is misleading, Assessor Aip explained, that this year's assessment figure is 50 per cent of the evaluation, where last year's total was 100 per cent. The 50 per cent evaluation is a new state law designed to put all counties in the state on an equal basis.

Most of the assessment totals did not show much change from last year, corn and motor vehicles being the exception.

Corn Figure is Higher

This year's assessment figure on corn in Wayne county jumped from 1952's \$36,445 to \$1,367,315 — an increase of \$780,870.

Last fall's bumper corn crop was the reason for the big increase. The 1952 low assessment figure resulted from the early fall and rainy summer season experienced that year when little corn reached maturity.

The motor vehicles assessment total showed a big drop. The 1953 figure is \$1,280,810 — 1952's was \$2,778,865, or \$1,498,055 higher.

Cattle and hogs showed a slight drop. Cattle went from \$4,440,640 in 1952 to \$4,293,720. Hogs stayed nearly the same, dropping from \$489,825 to \$476,032.

The business schedule heading showed a drop from \$890,275 to \$648,955.

Property Valuation Higher

Property valuation showed an increase, going from \$18 million to \$20 million. This is the result of new buildings and remodeling during the year.

Tractors and farm machinery and tools were lower this year. Tractors in 1952 were assessed at \$879,000, but this year, farm machinery and tools were assessed at \$648,955. See ASSESSMENT — Pg. 6

### Ray Dolph Rites Held in Laurel Church Sunday

Funeral services were held Sunday, June 28, at 2:30 in the Laurel Methodist church for Ray Dolph, 43. Rev. Merle Burres officiated. The American Legion post No. 54 provided the memorial service at the Laurel cemetery. Legionnaires served as pallbearers.

Raymond Wallace Dolph was born May 5, 1910 at Florence, S. D. At the age of 14 he came to Wayne, where he lived with his uncle, W. D. Dolph. After serving in World War II he started a machine shop in Laurel. He was mayor of Laurel from 1949 until 1951.

Mr. Dolph died at the Veterans hospital, Sioux Falls, S. D., Friday, June 26 after failing ill about one year ago.

He is survived by a brother, Dan Dolph, Wakefield; a sister, Mrs. C. G. Swanson, Seattle, Wash.; and an uncle, A. W. Dolph, Wayne. A brother and sister, Lloyd and Blanch, preceded him in death.

### Supreme Court Reverses Ruling on McGuire Case

The ruling by Wayne county's District court granting Lydia McGuire maintenance from her husband, Charles W. McGuire, was reversed by the State Supreme court Friday.

The case involving the Leslie precinct farm couple was tried here last August.

At that time, the district court decreed the plaintiff, Mrs. McGuire, was legally entitled to use the credit of the defendant and obligate him to pay for certain items in the future for improvements and repairs for the household.

Required the defendant to purchase a new automobile with an effective heater within 30 days; ordered him to pay travel expenses of her daughters at least once a year; awarded a personal allowance to the plaintiff in the sum of \$50 a month and awarded \$800 for services for the plaintiff's attorney; and as an alternative to part of the award, set certain items in permit in agreement with plaintiff, to purchase a modern home elsewhere.

The case was taken to the Supreme court when a motion for a new trial was overruled.

The majority decision stated "where the marriage relation is being carried out without the husband and wife being separated or living apart from each other, a wife may not successfully maintain a suit in equity against her husband for maintenance."

The majority decision also stated that there is no legal action basis for an action, and therefore — according to the practice in this state — "... an allowance of attorney's fees is erroneous and not authorized."

# NEBRASKA FARM OUTLOOK

(The MONTHLY FARM OUTLOOK is reprinted from Notes on Nebraska Farm Business, a monthly publication of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This authoritative report is reprinted each month by the State National Bank of Wayne as a service to our customers and friends.)

## What About Livestock Prices?

Hogs are up in price and cattle down compared with a year ago. The reason is wrapped up in the changed slaughter pattern. This is the main story of our three outlook charts this month.

No one expected cattle prices to stay as high as they were in early 1952. But few expected them to come down as fast as they have.

The Farm Science Outlook section repeatedly has pointed out that cattle numbers have been climbing at a very high rate—and that the high beef cattle prices of the last few years were fully as much (and probably more) the result of short beef slaughter as of high consumer incomes. We pointed out that prices would come down sharply as beef slaughter climbed. But, even then, the adjustment was more sudden than expected.

The price drop has come in successive waves. Cattle prices started to decline in June 1952. Breeding and feeding cattle fell first—slumping \$3 to \$6 by mid-July. Prices of slaughter steers and heifers of the middle grades skidded rapidly during the fall. Top grades of fed steers and heifers didn't hit the skids until after the first of this year. Prices for every grade now are 30 to 40 percent under those of last year.

The principal cause of the beef price drop is simply the larger total supply of beef. The supply has gone up faster than consumers were willing to absorb it—except at much lower prices.

Meanwhile, the pork supply has dwindled. Farmers have been sending 15 to 20 percent fewer hogs to market than a year ago. The big hog price recovery got underway late last December. That was about the time that the December USDA pig survey showed that farmers had raised 9 percent fewer fall pigs and were planning a 13 percent cut in 1953 spring litters.

Packers immediately raised their reservation prices—the prices at which a packing firm will keep pork products beyond needs for supplying regular customers. So more pork went into storage during late December and January.

In the meantime, farmers decided to hold back more gilts for breeding. Farrowings in June, July and August this year will be up sharply and at an all-time high. This holding back of gilts for breeding cut into the number of hogs going to market.

Packer optimism on summer pork price prospects continued to grow as hog marketings fell off during late March and early April. Each packer looked at his high overhead costs and, in view of the bright summer outlook for pork prices, bid up for hogs to keep his killing gangs going with no layoffs.

This sort of thing will work for one packer—but not if all packers try it. The net result merely is to drive hog prices up. For

every packer can't get a larger share of a smaller total hog market run. That's exactly what happened in mid-April. Prices were bid up to the point where each packer was suffering severe cutout losses.

By late April, packers had reconciled themselves to laying off part of their killing gangs. The result: Hog prices temporarily stopped their upward climb. The most likely prospect is for a choppy hog market the next few weeks, with hogs later working up toward a summer price peak of \$26 or even better. Summer hog kill will be 12 to 15 percent under last year.

Beef production in the United States rose from 8.8 billion pounds in 1951 to 9.6 billion pounds in 1952. And smaller military takings made a full extra billion pounds available to consumers. This allowed consumption per person to go up from 55 to 61 pounds. And most of this increase came in the last half of 1952.

Beef slaughter is continuing to rise. Kill for the first 3 months of this year under federal inspection was up 27 percent over a year ago. A boost this large in cattle slaughter would have depressed cattle prices even more had it not been for the sharply reduced hog kill. The pork decrease just about offset the beef increase—leaving the total supply of meat per person about the same.

LOOKING AHEAD  
... there is a possibility for some price recovery for the upper grades of fed cattle in late summer. The increase over last year will not be as great by then. And we'll have a short supply of hogs on the market at that time. But the recovery isn't likely to be the usual seasonal amount.

Meanwhile, we can look forward to heavy runs of grass cattle this fall. Prices of the lower grades this fall may repeat to some extent the price pattern of last year. We're likely to have more utility, commercial and good grade beef than the market will absorb—except at a sharp discount. Thin, shelly cows off the range may sell as low as 5 to 7 cents per pound at the bottom of the fall market. Prices of stocker and feeder cattle are likely to be much further below the price of fed cattle than they were in May.

The hog outlook for this summer and early fall looks bright. Marketings will be down sharply—because of the gilts held back for breeding and a smaller early spring pig crop. Less pork will be in storage than a year ago, also.

But we seem headed for a record farrowing of summer, and early fall pigs. By next January and February, hog marketings will be running well ahead of last year's. This will pull hog prices down next winter—and add more competition for beef.

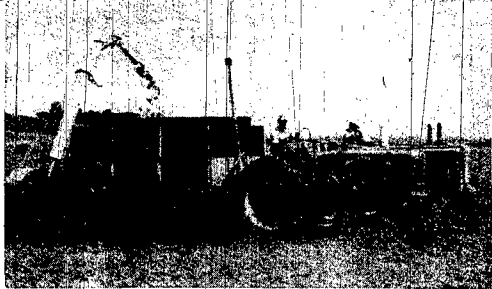
