Ballots Are Mailed To Farmers by PMA

Ballots are being mailed from the Wayne county PMA office to eligible owners and operators to vote for their choice of community trustees and delegates to the county convention for the 1954 program year.

Stressing the importance of getting out a big vote for PMA farmer committees this week, Thomas P. Roberts, chairman, said Tuesday when delegates to county and community committees are responsible for the administration of price support programs and for determination of acreage allotments on any crops for which allotments are in effect.

Secretary Benson has already warned that acreage allotments are likely for wheat and cotton. He announced July 9, 1953, that there will be a referendum held for setting the marketing quotas for the 1954 crop of wheat. Roberts reported the date for the referendum has not as yet been set.

Those who have their 1953 contract under a CCC loan may continue in several ways:

1. They may buy back the corn or any part of it by paying the amount of the loan on such contract, three and a half per cent interest.
2. They may re-seal their corn for another year providing the quality of the grain, and the storage structure qualifies. Re-sealing must be done during August and September. A storage payment of 12 cents per bushel for the year's storage will be paid the production delivery of the corn after July 31, 1954.
3. They may deliver the corn in satisfaction of the loan after receiving permission from the county committee as to date and place.

Purchase agreement corn may be put under seal for 1954 with the CCC, if done during the month of July, 1953.

Deliveries of corn held under purchase agreement will be made the same as corn sealed under loan, only that corn graded below No. 3 will not be accepted. Another will be made for No. 3 grade of corn than was indicated on the purchase agreement contract.

The sealing price for 1953 harvested wheat in this county will be \$2.32 per bushel for No. 3 grade. The sealing price for 1953 harvested oats will be \$1.15 for No. 3 grade.

Those who wish may obtain a loan on grain stored in warehouses by submitting the warehouse receipt as security for the loan.

Pre Kindergarten Tests Will Be Held July 20-21

Examinations for youngsters not of age who desire to enter kindergarten at Wayne City schools will be given during the afternoons July 20 and 21 at the student union building at the campus, Supt. E. W. Willert announced today.

These examinations will be for youngsters who will not be five years old by Oct. 15 and who will be five years of age before Jan. 1, 1954.

Application blanks may be obtained from Supt. Willert. A registration fee of \$5 is required by the state to be paid by parents to examine at the time of examination.
