

Council Passes \$272,500 Appropriation

Wayne County '52 Sales Top \$10 Million; 'Richer Market'

New York, July 7.—Wayne county stands out as a rich market with families earning more and spending more than those in most counties in the United States. This is revealed in a new, copyrighted study of taxing power, covering the entire nation, prepared by Sales Management.

Larger incomes made it possible for families in Wayne county to buy more and live better than those in most other places, as indicated by the volume of business done by the local retail stores during the past year.

The figures show that this retail activity reached the high mark of \$10,847,000, an increase over the 1951 record of \$9,865,000.

The large-scale buying, which meant more luxurious living, was made possible by better earnings. The data shows that the 2,900 families in Wayne county attained a net income, after deduction of personal taxes, of \$12,507,000.

Divided by the number of families in Wayne county, it represents an income per family of \$4,313. The figures, it is noted, are straight arithmetical averages.

Despite the good business in Wayne county retail stores in the year, much of the money available and investments and remained untapped.

A guide to each community's business activity is given through an index called "buying power quota," which is based on number of people, money available, sales and such factors.

It shows that Wayne county is producing 0.67 per cent of the nation's business, rather than the .0060 per cent called for by its population. The conclusion is that many people come into the county from outlying areas to do their buying.

Rains Brighten Corn Prospects; Harvesting of Oats Has Begun

Saturday and Sunday rains brightened prospects for another bumper corn crop in Wayne county this fall.

Weather Recorder Archie Wert reports 1.26 fell here Sunday and 1.13 fell Saturday, 1.39 in all.

The rains came in the nick of time, especially for the central and western part of the county, the southern and eastern sections getting a good rain two weeks ago that did not hit the rest of the county.

Local agriculture officials report harvesting of oats will get underway within the next few days, probably around the first of the week.

A few farmers have already cut and windrowed their oats but no straight combining has been reported.

There are not too many fields of oats in the county, boasting a thick stand. In most instances, the yield is not expected to be heavy.

Here are some of the remarks farmers made concerning their oats and corn:

LeRoy Grimm, four miles southeast of Wayne, 70 acres of Bondo oats and 125 acres of corn, moved around oats, plans to begin harvesting first part of week; says oats are "fair"; corn looks good.

Albert and Ralph Watson, five miles north of Wayne, 50 acres Nemaha oats and 90 acres of corn; plan to combine oats last of next week; corn starting to tassle.

James Hansen, seven miles west of Wayne, 40 acres of Nemaha and Deaver oats; 50 acres of corn; plan to start harvesting oats yesterday afternoon; oats "not so hot"; corn starting to tassle.

Carl Bichel, seven miles southeast of Wayne; 10 acres of oats and 120 acres of corn; oats "look good" — plan to start cutting Friday.

Is \$186,000 Lower Than Last Year's

The mayor and city council met Tuesday night and approved an ordinance appropriating money for an estimated budget of \$272,500 for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1953.

This budget is \$186,000 lower than last year's. However, all departments were designated an amount of the same amounts as in 1952 except for the light plant where a new diesel unit was installed last year — accounting for the \$186,000.

A total of \$106,000 is estimated for operating, maintaining, improving and extending the light plant. The sum of \$14,000 will be set aside for the city's water department.

Other sums estimated include: park fund, \$4,000; library fund, \$8,000; sinking fund (for payment of bonds issued by the city), \$20,000; sewer fund, \$50,000; insurance fund (for payment of claims and losses), \$40,000; fire department, \$2,000.

General fund (for maintaining, improving and repairing streets and alleys), \$25,000; auditorium fund, \$4,000; salaries and incidental expense, \$30,000; legal fund, \$10,000; airport fund, \$2,500; and amusement fund, \$2,000.

Other business transacted at Tuesday night's meeting included electing John Thiel to Wayne's Fire department.





An early historian of Nebraska reported that almost every person who could master a vehicle went into the freighting business, with equipment ranging from one to three teams of oxen or eight yoke teams down to a one-horse cart.

It is in these small operations that you can see America's enterprising frontiersmen at their best. Many of these small operators were businessmen of imagination who were willing to take a chance and work hard to make it pay out, and often they became big operators in the course of a few years.

Sombody seemed willing to take a chance with almost any kind of cargo, spurred on by the knowledge that there was a heavy demand for almost all types of goods in the mining camps and that the miners were willing to pay premium prices.

For example, in 1863 John Reed & Co., pioneer Nebraska City druggists, sent a wagon load of coal to Denver. They sold the oil for \$7 a gallon and realized a net profit of \$300 on the trip.

During the winter months hardy teams would freight perishables out to the mines. Whole wagon loads of eggs packed in oats went west from the Missouri River towns. At the mines, the eggs would bring a dollar a dozen. Similarly, many farmers hauled butter dressed county seat and though the community had to contend with several others for the privilege of retain-

months when work was slack at home.

Another unusual cargo was a wagon load of apples hauled from eastern Nebraska to Denver. They brought \$20 a bushel. At another time, a couple of Germans who could not speak English hauled a wagon load of fresh oysters westward from Omaha. They filled their wagon with cans of oysters, then poured water into the wagon bed, letting the whole freeze into a solid lump. West of Julesburg the oysters encountered selling oysters at \$10 a callon.

Again, in 1863 an enterprising man drove a flock of 500 turkeys across the plains to Denver. They took a wagon load of turkeys substituted mainly on grasshoppers along the way.

Out in the great wheat lands of western Nebraska, drained by the Frenchman and Stinking Water rivers, the Indian, the trapper, and the pioneer cattlemen chased Chase county.

The boundaries of Chase county were established in 1873. For several years, though, the only white occupants were an occasional trapper or cattlemen, and Chase county was attached to Hayes for judicial revenue and other purposes. In 1879, Fred H. Lytle filed the first pre-emption claim in the county; and in 1881 George W. Johnson made the first homestead entry. The early and middle '80's saw settlers arriving regularly, and by 1886 the population had grown sufficiently to justify the organization of the county.

Imperial was designated as the county seat and though the community had to contend with several others for the privilege of retain-

ing the title, it successfully weathered all onslaughts and remains the county seat today. It's principal opponent was Hamilton, later named Champion, in honor of Col. Chapman S. Chase, for whom the county itself was named. Hamilton was favored by being situated on the Frenchman River. Imperial, however, was approximately the county's center.

Imperial's early development was very closely associated with the Lincoln Land company, land development subsidiary of the Burlington railroad. The Lincoln Land company owned most of the Imperial township. To help develop its new town it gave the county a court house in 1889.

The arrival of the Burlington railroad at Imperial in 1892 further established that town's leadership among the communities of the county. Original plans called for building a line to Holt, Neb., to join the main line. When he decided to materialize, there was a great deal of disappointment among the residents of Imperial. The community continued to develop, nevertheless, as the shipping point for a rich agricultural region, and as the firmly established county seat.

Chase county was settled too late to feel the effects of the great depression of the 1890's. It did feel the full force of the drought and depression of the 1890's, however. Hundreds of settlers left the county during the hard times of the '90's, with the result that its population of 4,807 in 1890 had slunk to 2,559 in 1900.

Following the disaster of the '90's, the county experienced a

steady growth of population until the general state-wide decline of the 1930's set in. The county's population in 1910 was 3,613; in 1920, 4,939; and in 1930, 5,484. The decade of the 30's saw a reversal of the steady increase of the past 30 years and a slight decline in population, the return for 1940 being 5,310. This decline continued through the 40's and the return for 1950 was 5,176.

The overland freighting business, by which goods of all sorts were carried in wagons from the Missouri River steamboat landings to military posts out on the plains and mining camps in the mountains, was an important factor in the economy of Nebraska territory. Meet... C. J. "Collie" Boyce Station Manager

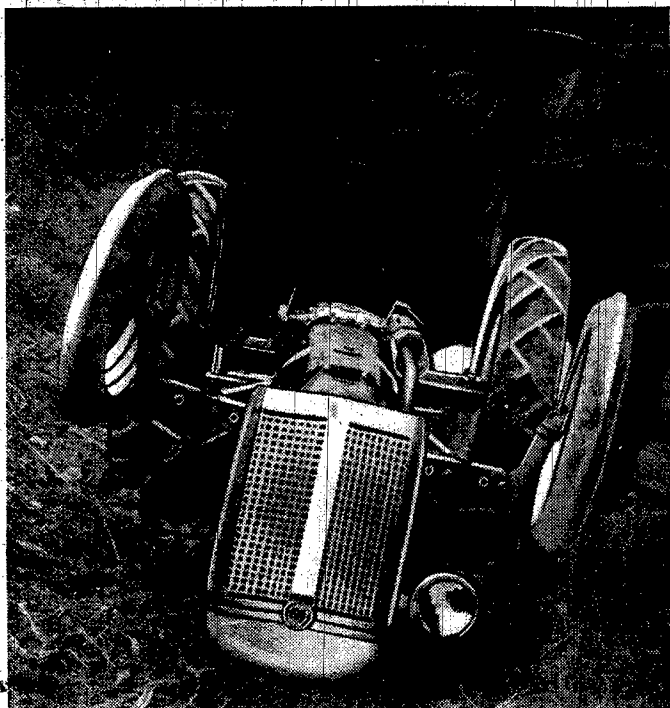

By the President of the United States of America

A Proclamation

WHEREAS needless accidents continue to kill thousands of farm people each year; and

WHEREAS accidents injured more than a million and a quarter farm residents last year; and

WHEREAS these tragic losses are reducing America's strength in a period of great crisis;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States of America, do hereby call upon the Nation to observe the week beginning July 14 as National Farm Safety Week, and I urgently request every farm resident to cooperate in an all-out effort to make 1953 an accident-free year as possible. To the end that American farm people may "Farm To Live and Live To Farm," I request all organizations and persons interested in farm life to join in a campaign to prevent accidents on the farm, on the highway, in the home, or wherever they may occur.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this twentieth day of April in the year of Our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-three, and of the independence of the United States of America one hundred and seventy-seven.

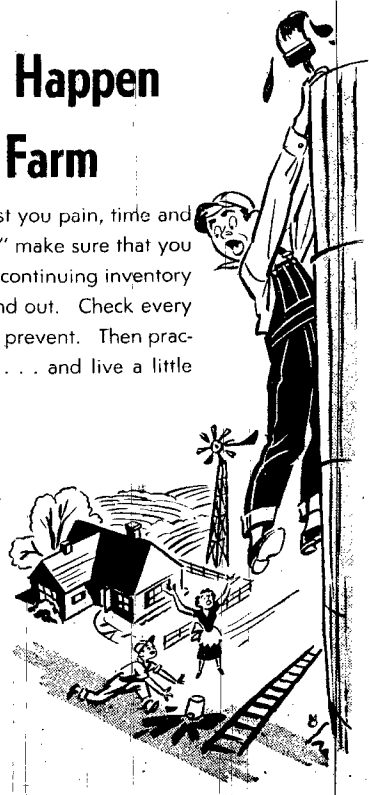

Adopt Right Attitudes To Foster Farm Safety

Adoption of the right attitudes for farm safety is one of the most important steps in the conservation of our country's farm manpower. If every farmer and his family adopts these attitudes, we will be well on the way to cutting down the farm accident toll.

Printed here are the 10 right attitudes for farm safety advocated by the National Safety Council:

1. **TAKE TIME TO TAKE CARE:** Realize that haste makes waste. Short cuts or failure to stop long enough to correct a hazard may result in a loss of time, money and health.

2. **BE OPEN-MINDED TO SAFETY SUGGESTIONS:** New machines and techniques mean new hazards. A wise farmer listens to the safety lessons his children bring home from school or farm group meetings. He profits from news items that bring him safety information or reminders.

3. **CHECK AND DOUBLE-CHECK:** Make sure your equipment is in safe operating condition. Don't take needless chances. Don't tangle with your life and happiness.

4. **TAKE SAFETY SERIOUSLY:** Don't be a traffic scofflaw. Know and obey common-sense safety rules. Be alert for danger at all times.

5. **KEEP YOUR FARM IN ORDER:** Have a place for everything and keep everything in its place. Be a good housekeeper in the home as well as on the farm.

6. **PLAN AHEAD:** Allowing adequate time reduces the temptation to hurry.

7. **BE FIRE-SIGHTED:** Don't smoke around the barn. Don't smoke in bed. Break matches in two before discarding them. Mark oil and gasoline cans in red. Get rid of fire hazards in basins, basements and attics.

8. **BE COURTEOUS ON THE HIGHWAY:** A courteous driver believes in living and letting live. Courtesy saves lives. Mind your motor manners.

9. **SUPPORT SAFETY EDUCATION:** Be a safety example to your children. Encourage safety instruction in schools. Take advantage of every opportunity to learn more about safety.

10. **FOLLOW SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS:** Replace that shield. Stop machinery before oiling and adjusting. Realize that printed instructions are "signs of life" wherever they occur.
