## G. Rosdahl Rites Held Here Wednesday

Gottfrid Sigrid Rosdahl, longtime resident of Concord, died at the Omaha Nursing home July 19, 1953, following a year's illness with most of the time spent at the home. He died at the age of 73 years, two months and 20 days.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon in Concord at the Lutheran church, with Rev. Ernest Nelson officiating. Burial was in Concord cemetery.

Mr. Rosdahl was born in Skona Parish, Sweden, April 30, 1880. He came to America in March, 1911, his wife and three children followed in 1914. For many years he farmed in Laurel until he retired in Concord.
