

City Council Meets; Sets 1953 Mill Levy

The city council met Tuesday night and passed an ordinance setting 1953's mill levy at 14.40 — 16 mills less than last year's 16 mills.

The 1953 levy will be assessed on property valued at \$3,811,108. Last year's valuation was \$3,832,644.

The council met July 14 and passed a \$272,500 budget for the 1953-54 fiscal year.

Levies were lowered on the auditorium, aviation and intersection bonds.

Aviation bonds are now paid off and were assessed at .90 of a mill last year. The auditorium bond levy was lowered from .50 to .30 and the intersection bond levy was lowered from 2.00 to 1.50.

Rites for Dr. S. B. Shively Held at Laurel

Funeral services for Dr. S. B. Shively, formerly at Wayne State Teachers college, were held yesterday afternoon at Laurel's Presbyterian church.

Dr. Shively, 58, head of the biology department at Nebraska Wesleyan university, Lincoln, died of a heart attack Saturday while participating in a golf tournament in Lincoln.

Dr. Samuel Burdette Shively, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Shively, was born at Laurel May 19, 1895. He married Edna Tuttle at Waterbury May 19, 1917.

Upon completion of high school at Laurel in 1912, he continued his education at Wayne State and took graduate work at the University of Nebraska, earning his PhD there in 1939.

He was superintendent of schools at Lynch, Wausa and Plainview and was head of the biology department at Wayne State Teachers college from 1942 to 1946. Before going to Wesleyan in 1948, he was chairman of the botany department at Superior, Wisconsin, State Teachers college.

Dr. Shively was a member of the Methodist church and Masonic lodge in Lincoln.

Rev. O. B. Proett officiated at the services. Burial was in the Laurel cemetery. Graveside rites were conducted by Masons from Lincoln.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Edna Shively, Lincoln; one daughter, Mrs. Wanda Bedell, Moscow, Ida.; son, Lt. Robert Shively, Great Falls, Mont.; two grandchildren; four brothers, Clyde, Laurel; Clarence, Leeds, Ia.; William, Gig Harbor, Wash.; Elmer, Lincoln; two sisters, Mrs. Grace Guinn and Mrs. Olive Winquist, both of Laurel.

Speech Clinic, Camp Being Held at College

Registration for Wayne State's remedial speech clinic and camp was completed yesterday. James C. McCarthy, speech instructor, will be in charge of the camp.

The three phase program which is offered by the clinic includes special speech training for children with speech handicaps, training in fundamentals of speech correction for teachers and follow-up processes for parents and teachers of the children enrolled.

Among the specialists who will work with the children this year will be Alice Liljebrin, speech therapist of the Du Lord School for Handicapped Children in Omaha, and Dr. Hallan Adams, member of the speech pathology staff at the University of Nebraska.

In connection with the clinic, the college will operate a camp so children from other areas may live at the college and have daily 24-hour supervision.

Supervision of the recreational activities of the children during the hours in which they are not with the therapists will be handled by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Kane, Sioux City.

Recreational facilities for the children, includes the swimming pool, college play grounds and gymnasium.

'54 Quota Queries Are Answered

With the referendum on wheat quotas for the 1954 crop only 15 days away, many questions about quotas and allotments are being asked by Wayne county farmers of the 17th congressional district, Thomas P. Roberts, chairman, reported today.

Pointing up some of the highlights of answers to questions on the program, Roberts explained that the result of the referendum determines the amount and extent of price support the wheat farmer will receive on his 1954 crop.

All wheat farmers whose farms are subject to quotas are eligible to vote in the referendum. And a farm is subject to quotas if the acreage to be planted and classified as wheat acreage under the program in 1954 is more than 15 acres and if the normal production is 200 bushels or more.

It's up to the wheat farmers themselves to decide whether the quota is to be made effective or not.

Many of the questions coming into the office are on the effect of the referendum on price supports. Chairman Roberts gives this brief answer:

If more than one-third of the votes are against quotas, price supports of farmers who plant within their farm wheat acreage allotments will be only 50 per cent of parity. Support is not required for farmers who overplant their allotted acreage.

However, should two-thirds or more votes for quotas, those who plant within their wheat farm acreage allotment will be eligible for Commodity Credit corporation price supports at 90 per cent of parity. Those whose wheat acreage exceeds the wheat acreage allotment will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45 per cent of the wheat parity price as of May 1, 1954, for each bushel in excess wheat.

Questions on allotments are common ones, too, the PMA chairman reports.

All the Water They Want

Water is one commodity that Wayne folks have plenty of, according to City Clerk Walter Bressler.

"There seems to be an ocean of water down under our wells" he said yesterday. Our three wells are each 128 feet deep and the water comes up within 60 feet of the surface" he continued.

Many communities are not so fortunate on water supply and general use is often restricted, Wayne has no such problem.

The city's wells are located near the north edge of the city at 33th and Main (two pumps are there) and one is a block west on 13th. All three combined have a total capacity of 1,000 gallons per minute. Two of them produce 400 gallons, the third 200 gallons and "this one can be doubled."

Thus far in July pumping has been necessary for more hours than June, but the month's figures are not available yet. During June total gallons was 15,593,000, or only 250,000 above June of 1952 when 15,341,000 gallons were consumed. Previous to that year June water usage here has totaled about 10 million gallons.

For the last three years ending in April, total water usage has been:

1952	124,180,000
1951	120,429,000

Thus a steady increase in water consumption is recorded.

"Yes, we have probably been putting out more water during July," Bressler said, "but August is usually our heaviest month."

"When folks get their water bills it will drop off the ... it will be good."

Wayne's water supply is plentiful, but it is hard referred to as "28 grains." This means 28 parts of hardness per million. Caused mostly by lime, it is a type of hardness that is easily removed or softened.

Temperature of the water here is a real asset. It comes out of the wells at 56 degrees. Delivered downtown, water temperature is about 59 degrees. The cool temperature makes our water efficient for air conditioning use.

So, as Walt Bressler indicates, we can go on enjoying all the water we want ... until we get the bill.

amendment to the law at 62 million
acres.

The national acreage al-
lotment has been apportioned
among the states and counties on
the basis of acreage seeded to
wheat during the preceding 10
years with adjustments made for
weather factors and trends.

Finally the only acreage al-
lotment is assigned, as it was in
Wayne county during the past six
weeks, to all farmers that grew
wheat in any one of the years 1951,
1952, or 1953, and to eligible new
farmers.

Out of Old Nebraska

The good old summertime has al-
ways meant picnics, outings, and
excursions for the people of Ne-
braska. Though they couldn't go
quite as far and had to be content
with simpler pleasures, the pio-
neers of old Nebraska were just as
avid in their pursuit of new En-
gland present day Nebraskans. Files
of Nebraska's newspapers maintained
by the State Historical society are
replete with accounts of such out-
ings and excursions. Let's look to-
day at some of the summer fun of
territorial times.

The 4th of July was the big day
of the year in old Nebraska, and al-
most every community staged some
sort of celebration. These cele-
brations followed a fairly stand-
ard pattern. They opened with pa-
triotic exercises in the morning, in-
cluding the reading of the Declara-
tion of Independence and at least
one patriotic oration by a leading
citizen. The exercises usually had
a military flavor, and if the com-
munity boasted any artillery it was
brought into play, and fired in hon-
or of the occasion. Frequently the
home guards demonstrated their
progress in military maneuvers. At
noon everyone enjoyed a picnic din-
ner; the afternoon was given over
to games, and the evening to danc-
ing.

Occasionally the celebration ex-
tended beyond the fourth, as did
one early series of Independence
Day festivities in Nebraska City.
This was more than a local cele-
bration, and at least a thousand
persons were present, many of
them from other parts of Nebraska,
Missouri and Fremont County. A
good many Indians were present
to take part in the festivities. The

celebration began with dancing and eating "a grand old barbecue" about one o'clock on the 4th. Wind- ing up with a big Indian dance on the 6th. The chronicle of the event wrote, "and he said to the credit of the early settlers of Otoe Coun- ty, not a drunken man was seen nor were there any disturbances of any kind during the three days bar- becue."

The 4th was not the only occa-
sion that brought people together
for outdoor amusements. On June
17, 1858, the sons of New England
residing in Otoe county, held a
grand picnic in a grove near Kearny
City to celebrate the anniversary
of the battle of Bunker Hill.
These patriotic reunions provided
vacations as well as spiritual stim-

MANURE PILE OR GOLD MINE?



It can be just a manure pile, left to weather and lose value in the winter rains or —if properly handled to increase crop yields—it can be worth easily \$8 to \$10 a ton.

Protected from weathering, or scattered fresh in the fields, so that little is wasted, manure can be worth 40 per cent more than when it is piled in the open over winter. For example, packed manure loses only one-sixth of the amount of nitrogen that escapes from untrampled manure. Manure in covered lot or shed, or pen-type dairy barn, is packed enough by stock to prevent much loss. It will suffer much greater losses from exposure to rains.

WHAT'S MANURE WORTH? It varies with the prices of farm products, with soil types, and other conditions. On Miami silt loam in Ohio, a ton of shed-stored manure raised crop yields during a rotation by 18 bushels of corn, 5 bushels of wheat, and 500 pounds of clover hay per acre. In another trial, on Wooster silt loam, the comparable yield increases were 24 bushels of corn, 10 bushels of wheat, and 1,200 pounds of clover hay per acre.


Results might be much different under other conditions of soil type, weather, the crops grown, the kind of manure, and so on; but the fact remains—manure is valuable. A ton of average fresh manure contains around 500 pounds of organic matter, 10 pounds of nitrogen, 2 pounds of phosphorus, 8 pounds of potassium—all elements that cost money if you buy them in the bag.

Most of the vital elements in manure can be saved, and returned to the land, by proper manure-handling methods. Modern equipment turns this old unpleasant job into one that's fast and easy.

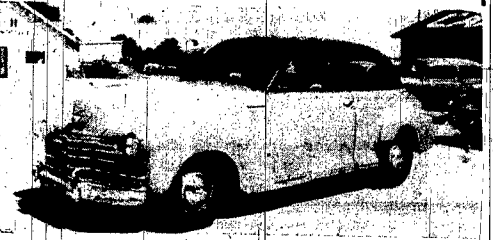
