New Tax Valuation Figures Announced

The state tax commissioner's office had bad news for Henry Ard, Wayne county assessor, Thursday.

Assessor Ard was notified tax value of city lots and improvements, business schedules and household goods and personal equipment would have to be increased sharply.

Specifically, the changes ordered by the state board of equalization were:

1. City lots and improvements increased 48 per cent
2. Business schedules increased 30 per cent
3. Household goods and personal equipment increased 100 per cent.

Tax value of farm land and improvements was not changed from the total sent in by the county assessor.

The state office ordered these changes so valuations would conform to the law passed at this session of legislature.

The law was passed for the purpose of equalizing the assessment of real and personal property for taxation in the 93 counties in the state.

Over the state, an increase of about 17 per cent was made in the assessment figures submitted by county assessors.

Blanket Increases

Assessor Ard reported his office is making the blanket increases ordered by the state.

Because of this increase in valuations, the state-wide levy will be decreased from last year's \$6.99 per thousand dollars to \$5.75.

Revised valuations, assessed at 50 per cent, compared with valuations sent in by the assessor's office, are as follows:

1. City lots and improvements, up from \$5,484,090 to \$8,116,450.
2. Business schedules, up from \$1,291,475 to \$1,678,910.
3. Total household goods and personal equipment, up from \$119,830 to \$239,660.

Any tax payer who objects to the new tax assessment figures must appeal directly to the Nebraska Supreme court, county officials reported.

Mrs. Gust and Myron are both in the Wayne hospital where she is being treated for chest and back injuries. Both of the youngster's legs were fractured and he also received facial injuries.

The accident occurred at the intersection. Clarence Beck, Wayne, was driver of the truck with a coin sheller mounted on the back.

Beck, headed north was stopped, waiting for the eastbound car driven by Mrs. Gust to pass so he could make a left turn.

The crash car came over the knoll just west of the intersection, hit loose gravel and skidded into the truck. The impact of the collision bouncing the car backwards, Sheriff Tietgen said.

Left front of the car was demolished and left front of the truck was damaged.

Thieves Hit Four Stores Here Sunday

Four Wayne firms were broken into and raided late Sunday night or early Monday morning. County Sheriff Hans Tietgen reported. Little loss was indicated.

B. J. Brandstetter and Son, Merchant Oil company, Mau Plumbing and Heating and Mau Oil company were the business houses involved.

Small amounts of cash were taken from the registers at Brandstetter's and Merchant's. About 30 cartons of cigarettes and candy were stolen at Meyer's. Nothing was reported missing at Mau's.

Break Window

O. K. Brandstetter discovered the break-in at the implement store. Entry was made through a rear window which was broken and unatched. About \$145 was missing from the cash register, Sheriff Tietgen said.

At Merchant's, the prowlers apparently made entrance through a small amount of cash and a grease gun were taken from the service station.

Futile Attempt Made

A frame window on the south of Meyer's was broken to gain entry. A futile attempt to break into the safe was made at the service station.

The raiders used a drill on the safe but owner Louis Meyer reported it would have taken them "at least four days to get into the safe that way." And, that even if they had gotten into the safe, they would have found nothing worthwhile — only checks and records.

3. Fertilizer studies have shown that this loess soil can support heavier stands and produce heavier yields of corn than seemed possible before. For instance, in 1952 a heavy application of nitrogen and phosphate on a run-down field of Ida (about like Nebraska Clinton or Buckskin) soil resulted in an increase from 15 to 123 bushels of corn per acre.

4. Terraces spaced at 1 1/2, 1 1/4, 1 1/2, and 2 times (this has been standard in Wayne county), the standard spacings showed no substantial soil movement between terraces or silting in the terrace channels after five and six years in fields where corn was contoured. This indicates that terraces may be spaced at wider intervals and also that a shift may

be made to a rotation with a larger percentage of corn where corn is contoured.

Surface Planted—When corn was surface-planted up and down hill in these experiments, the average erosion loss was 31 tons of soil per acre per year, and water runoff amounted to four inches.

Surface Planted on Contour—When corn was surface-planted on contour the erosion loss was 11 tons of soil per acre per year, and water runoff 2.78 inches. This was better than the up-and-down hill planting but it was still not within allowable limits for soil conservation.

Listed on Contour—But the plots that were contoured listed lost only 3 1/2 tons of soil per acre per year and showed only 1.65 inches of runoff. These amounts are within allowable limits for conservation of soil and water.

These tests comparing surface planting with listing were conducted from 1948 through 1952 on plots with slopes of 14 per cent and slope lengths of 72.6 feet and with contours (sweet clover catch) rotation. On the same slopes erosion losses have been cut to two tons per acre per year with a corn-oats-meadow-meadow rotation.

Legislation by the Legislature

The sixty-fifth session of the Nebraska State Legislature is in the records. This year's session met for 113 days, making it the longest session in the state's history.

A total of 595 bills were introduced—369 of these were passed and 226 were vetoed. The most important actions taken at this session were on the subject of highways, tax assessment and the appropriations.

Several important changes in our tax laws have been enacted. Following is a brief run-down of the changes affecting this region:

1. A new state levy of one-half mill for school retirement has been created for two years. Levy will produce about \$1.5 millions a year.
2. A special state levy of one-fourth mill for the University hospital and Medical college building programs will be levied until \$6 million is raised. The revenue from the levy will probably run about \$750,000 a year.
3. Old age assistance ceiling has been increased from \$60 to \$65 a month.
4. Gas taxes for highway purposes will be increased about \$4½ million a year for the next two years due to the one-cent a gallon increase.
5. Motor vehicle registration fees have been hiked—should yield about \$3.1 million a year for highway revenue. Automobiles weighing less than 3,000 pounds will now pay \$6 instead of \$3 and automobiles weighing over 3,000 pounds will now pay \$8 instead of \$5.
6. Rural taxes will raise about \$1 million a year due to increase in the free high school tuition rate from \$7.50 to \$9 a week for each pupil.

already been suggested, but other details of the enterprise will be worked out before discussing the question.

Aug. 2, 1928—R. H. Jacques is making improvements this summer in his cleaning establishment in Wayne which will cost several thousands of dollars. Wayne band has been engaged to furnish music for the Boone county fair at Albion on Aug. 27 to 30. Wayne is one of the points on the newly approved North and South Transcontinental highway from Winnipeg, Canada, to Galveston, Tex. It was announced last week.

20 Years Ago

Aug. 3, 1933—Paving of about 1,000 feet of driveway in Greenwood cemetery is planned this summer by the association which meets Aug. 14. Graduates of the Nebraska Normal college plan their annual reunion in Wayne about the middle of August. Rural school district No. 88, recently organized when territory south and west of Wayne withdrew from the city district, is building a school. Cornhusker baseball team goes to Sioux City Sunday to enter a tournament.

15 Years Ago

Aug. 4, 1938—The Coast to Coast store is being rearranged and remodeled. K. Coghlan, field representative, has been here temporarily. Curbing of streets west of Bressler park is being done by WPA workers. Roy Langemeier is having a new porch built on the north of his residence at 7th and Main.
