Three Plead Guilty; Tried For Robberies Pulled Here

Three Sioux City men pleaded guilty in district court here Tuesday, closing the books on last weekend's crime wave in Wayne.

Ralph Dunham, 28, Milo Hollinger, 19, and Harry Molden, 17, pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering a four-way store and entering four Wayne firms last Saturday night.

District Judge F. H. Pollok sentenced Dunham to five years in the Nebraska State penitentiary, partly because of his past record.

Sentence on Hollinger was postponed until the March (1954) session of district court and Molden was given a two-year suspended sentence, being put on probation to Edward McKenna, Sioux City. Judge Pollok told Hollinger, his sentence would depend on his actions during the next seven months.

The case was broken when officers followed a tip by a Laurel police officer who took down the license plate of a "suspicious car."

Files Charges

County Attorney Charles McDermott filed charges Friday morning and County Sheriff Hans Tietgen and Police Chief William Eynon went to Sioux City and made arrangements for the arrests. Sheriff Tietgen and Police Officer W. H. Hansen returned to Wayne Friday afternoon and brought the trio back to Wayne.

Saturday morning in County court, the three men pleaded guilty at the preliminary hearing and were bound over to the district court.

County Clerk C. A. Bard acting judge in the absence of Judge W. A. Crossland who is hospitalized, set bond at \$2,000. None of the trio could furnish bond and were kept in the county jail until trial time Tuesday.

Firms involved in the robberies were B. J. Brandstetter and Son, Mechanical Oil company, Mau Plumbing and Heating and Meyer Oil company.

Small amounts of cash were taken from registers at Brandstetter's and Merchant's and cigarettes and candy were stolen from Mau's.

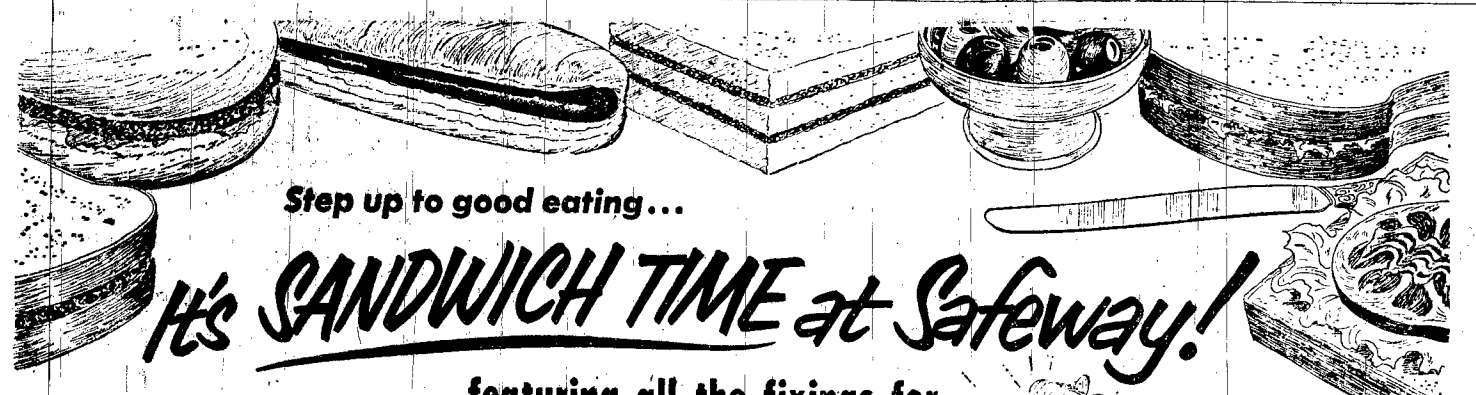

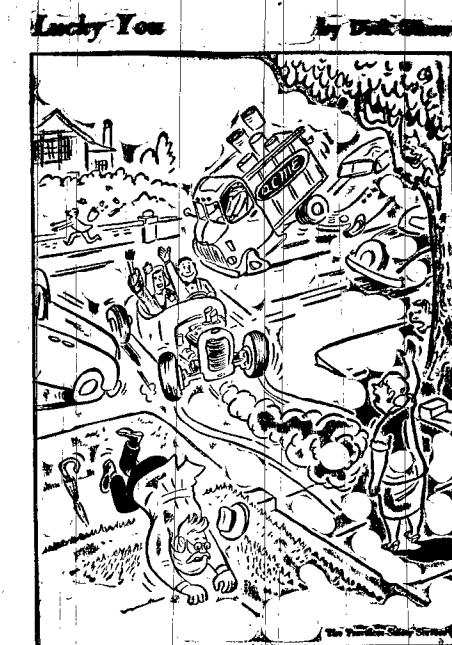

Out of Old Nebraska

Cherry county, Nebraska's largest, is larger than the states of Connecticut, Delaware and Rhode Island — or of any two of them combined. Its 5,982 square miles are an important part of Nebraska's ranch country — "God's Cow Country."

The early settlement of Cherry county dates from the summer of 1878, when ranchers began to bring large herds of Texas cattle into the Niobrara country to provide beef for the Sioux Indians located on the Rosebud reservation, just across the line in South Dakota. One of the cowboys who helped bring the initial herds in was A. J. Abbott, father of C. J. Abbott and LeRoy Abbott. Mr. Abbott was to remain in Nebraska to become one of the state's largest operators.

Mr. Abbott was followed by others and the hills of Cherry county soon developed into an active ranching area. The early days of settlement in Cherry county were the great days of the open range and all of the color and drama associated with the range cattle industry lives in the early history of Cherry county.

One of the most important factors in the early development of Cherry county was the establishment of Fort Niobrara, April 22,

ways remained, however, what it was originally — ranch country. And spread out over its hills today are the vast ranches from which many of the mid-west's best beef or cattle are shipped. The county's population in 1890, the first year a census return was filed, was 6,428. In 1950, the population was 8,397. The all-time high was in 1920 when the county returned a total of 11,753.

April 30 was a very important date in the history of the United States and of Nebraska. It marked the 150th anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase, that great feat of diplomacy and negotiation by

which America's heartland was added to the United States. The total purchase price was \$15,000,000 — about four cents an acre. When you consider the 17 great states, including Nebraska, which have been carved entirely or in part from the 800,000 square miles included in the deal, you can understand why those in charge of the 150th anniversary celebration have chosen as their slogan, "America's Best Buy."

It was not always thus. Francis J. Kelly, for example, tells a story in the Omaha World-Herald about a geographer of the time who wasn't much impressed with the bargain. He looked at the vast territory and about all he could see

was a waste land of swamp, desert and wilderness.

The story of the Louisiana Purchase is indeed a great one. 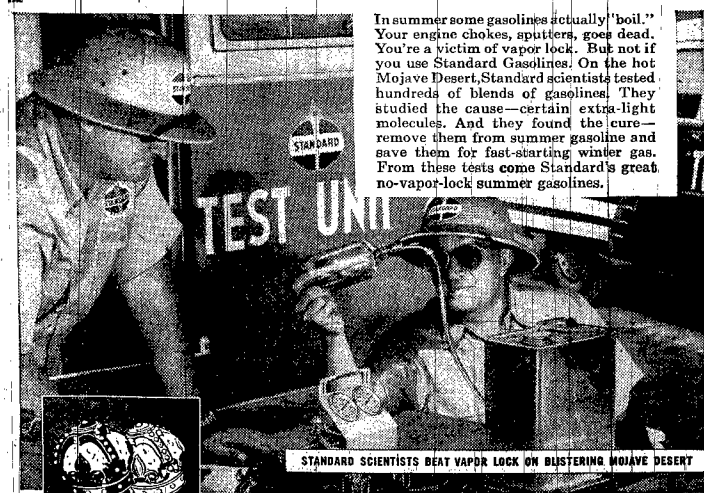

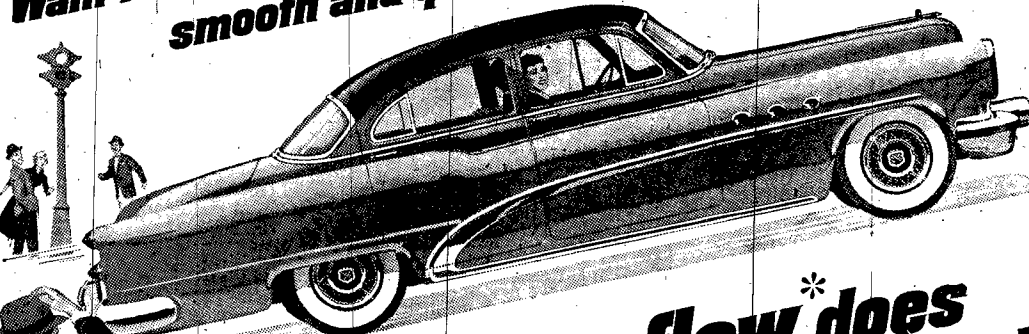

Meets 12-year-old Refugee

A former Wayne woman is making it possible for a 12-year-old Berlin girl to enjoy a four-week vacation with an American family in Heidelberg.

Mrs. B. Lane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mines, Wayne, is participating in a project sponsored by the German-American Women's club in Heidelberg, Germany.

The project enables Berlin children to spend a four-week vacation in the home of American occupation personnel. Mr. and Mrs. Lane are entertaining Heidi Kuchler.

Heidi, as the Lanes call their guest, is a refugee from East Germany. Her mother and the two children escaped to West Berlin about seven months ago, where the mother remarried. The family of four is now living in a single room in Berlin.

This week the Lanes and their guest were enjoying a trip to Vienna and the Bavarian Alps. They planned to visit Munich and Salzburg and enjoy the vacation facilities of Garmisch, the equivalent of our Sun Valley. They also were to visit Berchtesgarden, Hitler's famed retreat.

Mrs. Lane is the former Jean Mines. Her husband, Lt. Col. H. B. Lane, is now stationed with the administration section of U. S. Army headquarters in Europe. Mrs. Lane and her sons visited at her home in Wayne since last October and left for Germany early in June.

Considerable mention was made of the project in the German newspaper, Heidelberg-Stadt. A translation of an article which accompanied the photo shown above is printed below. The translation was made by Mrs. Paul Henschel, Wayne.

"In the Hotel Europaischer Hof yesterday afternoon, 20 American families waited for two hours for their vacation children from Berlin. They waited impatiently for their young guests, for the boys and girls for whom they would furnish a month of carefree vaca-

tion happiness in Heidelberg. "Not only was it a splendid idea for the welfare of the children, to take them into American homes, but one could also see from the faces of the sponsoring foster mothers that they would be happy in the experience of close association with the children of the long-suffering, war-divided city (Berlin)."

"When at last the bus arrived and the youngsters hesitatingly entered the hotel lobby, it was a great moment for them and for those who took charge of them. Among the Berlin children, at that moment, it was hard to find the usual spunkiness and self-sufficiency. Their spirits felt the chill of language trouble. However, that was over as soon as they had timidly joined the group of American mothers and children.

"In plain American a moppet called out 'How do you do to a Berlin boy and he, with a hearty handshake, answered the equally broad Berlin dialect. 'I'm fine, what else would you think? Such questions and answers which expressed true cordiality and deep joy now completely took over the scene.

"Good fellowship prevailed from the first moment in spite of the language barrier. Berlin children are famous optimists. They are not at all afraid of possible language difficulties. A 10-year-old boy from Neukoln thought that he would be able to get by with a little Eng-

lish he had picked up in the last few weeks. Our reporter got the impression that the youth would have preferred to express himself thus: 'Follow, I'm not from Dunctown and that's for sure.' "The official part of the welcome was as spontaneous and cordial as the first impression. Wives of commanding officers made speeches of welcome in German and in English, and then the children were taken to the homes of the members of the Women's clubs who sponsored the project.

Mrs. Lane described Heidi with long legs, short blonde hair like fine silk and a face "with expressions too old for 12 years, but when she is happy her blue eyes dance and she looks and acts like the child she still is."

She mentioned just a few items which had the child's eyes dancing . . . popcorn and Coke before bedtime . . . riding in the car . . . all the vanilla ice cream she could eat . . . very long shower baths every night.

But the biggest impression was made the day Heidi got a new pair of patent leather slippers. Mrs. Lane described it thus: "Heidi did not walk with those shoes, she floated on them. We went to many shops before we found them. She has very long feet and she knew exactly what she wanted. We were impractical in not buying heavy brogue but we wanted this little girl to have something she had dreamed about and this was it. Perhaps such a thing has helped erase so many unpleasant memories, the most recent a 4 m. flight on a December morning from Berlin's East sec-

County Assessor Henry Arrp is having a hard time closing the tax books this year. By the time his office makes all the adjustments ordered by the state last week, Henry is going to be ready for a long vacation.

Early returns from the state's counties, according to "Today's Taxes," showed a drop in the assessed valuation of personal property and an increase in farm and city real estate.

Because most counties were skeptical the state would make all 93 counties comply, most of the returns sent to Lincoln were not in line with recommendations of the state board—and assessed values were hiked.

Only a handful of counties showed an increase in the total valuation of all property. These were: Burt, 1 1/2%; Cheyenne, 7%; Dakota, 3%; Deuel, 36%; Dodge, 24%; Hamilton, 9%; Kimball, 30%; Logan, 6%; Madison, 7%; Saline, 1%; Sarpy, 6%; Washington, 7%; and York, 5%.

So far, only a couple of counties have indicated appeal action might be taken.

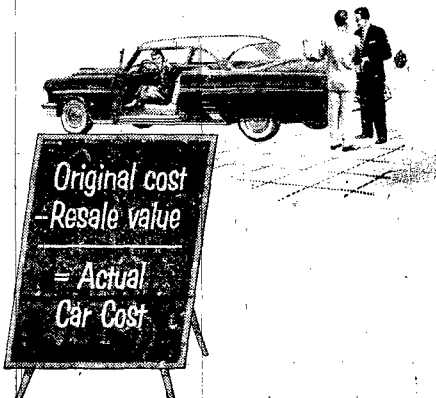

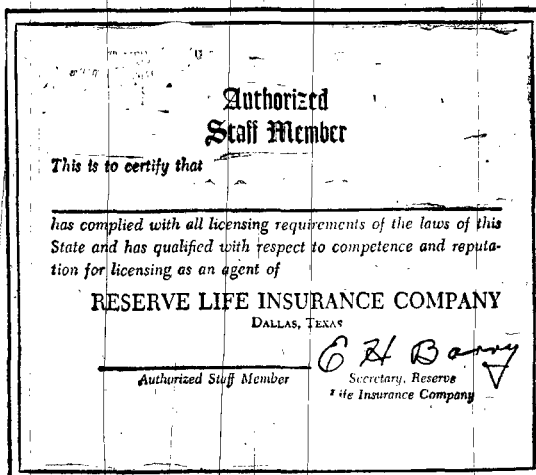


