Nearly one million bushels of 1952 corn sealed on farms in Wayne county last fall, are moving to storage bins of the Production and Marketing Administration. This corn represents a total of \$1,540,000 to county farmers, based on the \$1.55 bushel set up last fall. The amount of corn under seal represents approximately one-sixth of the 1952 crop. Government loans on this sealed corn were due July 31. The current price right now is about \$1.40 a bushel and the farmers are turning the corn over to the government for storage in PMA bins. 15 Days to Deliver County PMA Chairman T. P. Roberts said delivery notices are being sent to farmers with sealed corn now. A farmer has 15 days to deliver the corn to a specified site after receipt of the notice. Roberts said the delivered corn will not use up all available storage space in the various county locations, which have a capacity of over one million bushels. These bins are located at Wayne, Sholes, Winside and Wakefield. In addition several private elevators are storing corn under warehouse agreements. Many Re-Sealing Many farmers are re-sealing their corn on the farm, for which they will receive 13¢ per bushel if it is stored until July 31, 1954. Balance of the corn will be delivered to PMA depots before Oct. 1. It will be weighed and tested for moisture at Wayne or approved elevators throughout the county. Premium Payments Provision has been made for premium payments on corn grading better than No. 3. A farmer will receive one-half cent per bushel over the county loan rate if his corn grades No. 2 and one cent over the \$1.54 if it is No. 1. However, discounts are made for corn which has excessive moisture. These discounts vary from one to five cents per bushel, depending on the percentage of moisture. Corn can grade No. 2 and still have 13% moisture. The maximum calls for a one cent per bushel discount. No. 1 corn cannot be discounted for moisture since the maximum moisture content for this grade is 14 percent. Farmers also have the choice of redeeming their corn which some are doing because dry weather conditions have cut the expected yield of the 1953 crop. Interest of 3% per cent is charged if the corn is redeemed. None is charged if all the sealed corn is delivered to the PMA. Three new quonset storage units are now going up at Wayne and Sholes. Each of the units will have a capacity of 40,000 bushels.

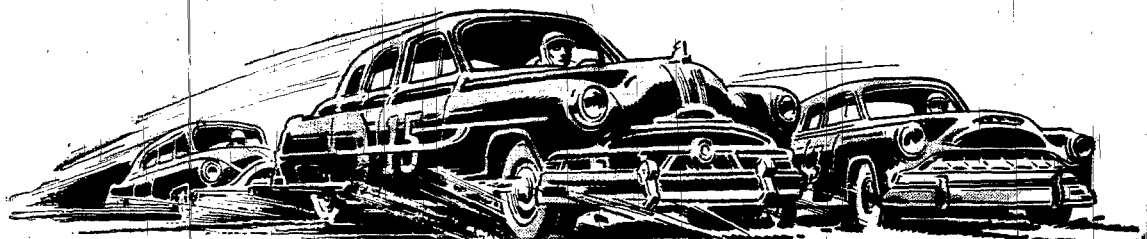

Furnish Own Labor

vate workmen high enough to handle cross-arm connections.

Tools for the project were loaned by Northwestern Bell Telephone company, who also furnished Martin Blake, Yankton, S. D., construction foreman who is supervising the job.

Materials used in the job include a carload of poles, 115 cross-arms and 2500 pounds of steel wire.

Delivery of Sealed Corn Is Underway; Set Oct. 1 Deadline

Nearly one million bushels of 1952 corn sealed on farms in Wayne county last fall, awaiting storage bins of the Production and Marketing Administration.

This corn represents a total of \$1,540,000 to county farmers, based on the \$1.54 loan price set up last fall. The amount of corn under seal represents approximately one-sixth of the 1952 crop.

Government loans on this sealed corn were due July 31. The current price right now is about \$1.40 a bushel and the farmers are turning the corn over to the government for storage in PMA bins.

15 Days to Deliver
County PMA Chairman T. P. Roberts said delivery notices are being sent to farmers with sealed corn now. A farmer has 15 days to deliver his corn to a specified site after receipt of the notice. Roberts said the delivered corn will not use up all available storage space in the various county locations, which have a capacity of over one million bushels. These bins are located at Wayne, Sholes, Wauson and Wakefield. In addition several private elevators are storing corn under warehouse agreements.

Many Re-Sealing
Many farmers are re-sealing their corn on the farm, for which they will receive 13¢ per bushel if it is stored until July 31, 1954. Balance of the corn will be delivered to PMA depots before Oct. 1. It will be weighed and tested for moisture at Wayne or approved elevators throughout the county.

Premium Payments
Premiums have been made for premium payments on corn grading better than No. 3. A farmer will receive one-half cent per bushel over the county loan rate if his corn grades No. 2 and one cent over the \$1.54 if it is No. 1.

However, discounts are made for corn which has excessive moisture. These discounts vary from one to five cents per bushel, depending on the percentage of moisture.

Corn can grade No. 2 and still have 15 percent moisture which calls for a one cent per bushel discount. No. 1 corn cannot be discounted for moisture since the maximum moisture content for this grade is 14 percent.

Farmers also have the choice of redeeming their corn, which some are doing because dry weather conditions have cut the expected yield of the 1953 crop. Interest at 2 1/2 per cent is charged if the corn is redeemed. None is charged if all the sealed corn is delivered to the PMA.

Three new quonset storage units are now going up at Wayne and Sholes. Each unit will have a capacity of 40,000 bushels.

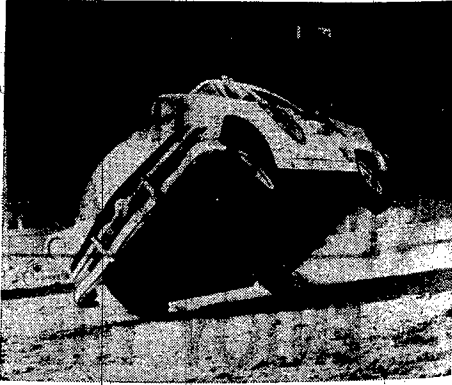
