Court Battle On \$50,000 Estate

Objections to probate of a will involving the estimated \$50,000 estate of Mrs. Sadie E. Mears were filed Friday in county court by Omaha grandchildren of Mrs. Mears.

The grandchildren, Don Mears, Lynette Thomas, June Irvin and Joyce Black, entered objections to a will filed by John A. Mears, Sioux City, executor, and to the latter's another grandson of Mrs. Mears.

Another will, said to have been drawn by Mrs. Mears in May, 1952 was filed for probate Saturday by Budd B. Bornhoft, attorney for the contestants.

The court battle centers around the bequests in the two wills. The first, dated May 4, 1952, divided the estate equally among the five grandchildren. The second, which is being objected to, is dated June 24, 1953 and leaves \$1,000 each to the Omaha grandchildren and the balance to John A. Mears, Sioux City.

Six Objections

The Omaha grandchildren offered six objections to the second will.

1. That the alleged will was not executed as provided by law.
2. That the alleged will was not attested properly.
3. That Mrs. Mears was not possessed of sufficient mental capacity at the time the alleged will was executed.
4. That the purported will was procured by fraud and undue influence.
5. That the said will was allegedly executed at a time when Mrs. Mears was both physically and mentally unable to understand or comprehend her acts, and
6. That the same was not her last will and testament.

A preliminary hearing on the estate was held in county court Saturday and Herman Lundberg was appointed special administrator.

Hearing Set Sept. 15

Final hearing will be held Tuesday, Sept. 15. H. D. Addison is the attorney for John A. Mears while Bornhoft represents the contestants with Hosford and Kanoff, Omaha lawyers.

Delivery of Sealed Corn Is Underway; Set Oct. 1 Deadline

Nearly one million bushels of 1952 corn sealed on farms in Wayne county last fall, are moving to storage bins of the Production and Marketing Administration.

This corn represents a total of \$1,540,000 to county farmers, based on the \$1.54 loan price set up last fall. The amount of corn under seal represents approximately one-sixth of the 1952 crop.

Government loans on this sealed corn were due July 31. The current price right now is about \$1.10 a bushel and the farmers are turning the corn over to the government for storage in PMA bins.

Stores Will Close For Labor Day

Wayne stores will be closed Labor Day, it was announced today by President John Edenburg of the Chamber of Commerce.

A meeting of the Chamber's retail committee was held Tuesday morning and the group recommended that an earlier board decision to remain open Labor Day be reversed. The recommendation was made following a survey which indicated a majority of Wayne stores wished to close.

Owner of a chain of eight lumberyards in Wayne, Hartington, Randolph, Bloomfield, Pierce, Neigh, Plainville and O'Neill, Mr. Carhart was a past president of the Nebraska Retail Lumber Merchants association. He was one of the first "Master Merchants of Nebraska" to be named by Sam McKelvie.

He was a past president of the Wayne school board and a former member of the city council. Carhart was a member of the Masons, Scottish and York Rites and the Tanager Shrine. He served as the first president of the Wayne Kiwanis club, of which he was a charter member.

'Wildcats Will Be An Improved Team' - - - Lewellyn

WSTC Mentor Optimistic As 43 Open Grid Drills

"We'll be an improved ball club, there's no question about that!" These were the words of Coach Barney Lewellyn Wednesday after putting his Wayne State Wildcats through their opening practice packs.

Lewellyn has 43 players working out twice daily in preparation for the Wildcats' opening home game Sept. 11 against Augustana's Vikings. Fourteen of the squad members are returning lettermen and only one is a freshman.

Freshmen will hold the key to Wildcat success this fall, Lewellyn said. The WSTC mentor has three weak spots which are giving him trouble at the present time... fullback, ends and center. The Wildcats lost Duane Luebe, Gene Metz and Ed Wallick through graduation last spring and the gaps remain to be filled.

Better Balance
Lewellyn is optimistic over the possibilities of the squad, however. He called it "better balanced" than the team he started with a year ago. Several of the returning lettermen are only sophomores but have the experience of a full season behind them. Lack of college football experience was a major cause of some of last fall's disastrous defeats.

Lewellyn has 1952 lettermen returning at every position but fullback. However, Jim Anderson-Wakefield, a letterman in 1945 and 1947, is reentering school this fall and may be able to plug this gap. Lack of experienced centers and ends is bothering the coach. Ray Anderson, Spencer, Ia., is the only veteran returning. Dick Peterson, Elgin, a defensive halfback last fall, is being groomed for a flank spot.

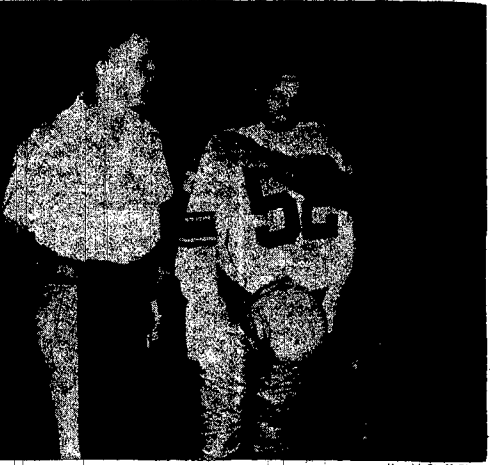
Another likely prospect is freshman Carl Steffens, another Spencer boy, who earned his number at Iowa State last fall. Three other frosh are vying for end spots... Jim Whitney, Hartington, Stan Hanson, Battle Creek and Darrel Troutman, Winside. May Be Drafted

The draft will play a big part in determining success at the tackles. Two lettermen are back - Roger Higgins, Wayne, and John Osbourne, Atkinson. Osbourne is now fearful that he will have to go with the draft before school opens. If this happens, Lewellyn will have to find a replacement among Dale Cooper, Albion, Gary O'Meara, Pender, and Paul Weichelman, Hartington, all freshmen. Weichelman is an ex-serviceman.
