Duane, 6½, son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Lutt, Wayne, exhibited the reserve champion of the steer show, an Angus. Larry Topp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Topp, Winslow, had the grand champion heifer honors went to Donald Wayne Meyer's Angus, a Hereford daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hemerich, Winslow, was the 4-H baby beef champion contest. Points in the contest are awarded for gain, the calf's economy of gain and records.

Prize money topped 4-H club competition on groups of five steers. BPM Wayne was second and Pleasant Valley, third.

Showmanship awards went to Jack Langemeier, beef; Henry Thompson, Swine, and Leon Niemann, dairy.

James Ingalls won the Chamber of Commerce award for exhibiting the best dairy animal while Bob Menden took the Kiwanis award for the top 4-H market steer of the fair.

Marvin Pankina took first with Marvin Willers' best yearling cow, placing second Donald Meyer's yearling cow, third and fourth with Louis Willers' heifer. The animals had to be from Wayne county and weigh 1150 pounds or more. Judges were Robert Varnell, Al Ward and Richard Johnson, Sioux City.

## Fair Receipts Down 20% From 1952

Wayne county's 1953 fair receipts were off about 20 percent from last year's record total, fair officials announced Wednesday. Treasurer Henry Lee said that the general trend throughout the county has been toward reduced attendance this summer. Some fairs have had attendance losses as high as 80 percent, he said.

Dixon county's fair enjoyed one of the biggest years in its history. Secretary Roy E. Johnson told The Herald, "It was one of the best fairs and finest crowds we have ever had. Every department was outstanding and the 4-H baby beef, hog, machinery, 4-H girls and saddle horses were exceptional."

Gate and grandstand receipts at the 1953 fair totaled \$7,131.43, a drop of nearly \$1,800 from the receipts here set in 1952. Gate admissions brought \$2,781.75, while grandstand shows provided \$1,328.70.

**Biggest Loss Saturday**  
Thursday and Friday nights the state shows attracted 931 and 1,711 paid admissions. This represented a drop of 35 percent a year ago. Biggest gate attendance was at the Saturday night thrill show. Only 1,224 admissions were sold this year compared with 2,216 a year ago.

## Wayne State Opens Fall Semester Monday; 14 New Instructors Added

Fall semester will get underway at Wayne State next Monday, Sept. 14, when new students come to the campus for orientation tests. Upperclass registration will be held on Tuesday. Freshmen will register Wednesday. Classes will meet Thursday.

The H. H. Hahn Campus school will register students Monday and classes will begin Tuesday. Semester plans and activities will be discussed when the Wayne State faculty meet Saturday morning. Dr. John D. Rice, president, has called a meeting of the college administrative council at 9 o'clock and a general faculty meeting at 10 o'clock.

**Expect Increase**  
An increase in the enrollment over that of last year is expected. Dr. Arthur H. Price, dean of students, said: "The number of residence hall reservations is well ahead of last year, which indicates that the total enrollment will be higher."

A week of orientation and recreation activities is planned for new students, including a Big-Little Sister picnic for the women and a "book feed" for the men Tuesday afternoon, followed by an informal dance Tuesday evening, residence hall parties Wednesday, the faculty reception Thursday and an all-school dance following the Wayne State-Doane football game Friday.

Parents Day, which had been scheduled for Friday, Sept. 11, has been changed to Friday, Sept. 25. Dr. Price announced. The parents will be guests of the college at the Wayne State-Doane football game that evening.

Two new faculty appointments announced by President John D. Rice complete the list of 14 instructors who will join the staff at the opening of the college.

The new appointees are Mrs. Paula Markley Mize, instructor in home economics, and C. Loyd Slagel, instructor in speech. Shubert replaces James C. McCarthy, who joined the speech staff at Marquette university. Mrs. Mize was added to the home economics staff to teach in the new four-year vocational home economics program.

## 444 Enroll Monday at City School

Wayne public schools opened the 1953-54 school year with enrollment and regular classes Monday morning. A total of 444 students were enrolled. Superintendent E. W. Wilbert announced Tuesday.

Monday was spent filling out enrollment cards and issuing books. Classes were held but assignments were generally delayed until Tuesday.

## New Catholic School Opens Tuesday

Wayne's new St. Mary's parochial school will open for students Tuesday. Rev. William C. Kleffman announced this week.

About 30 students are expected to enroll for the first year at the school. Classes will be limited to grades one through eight. The new school, built at a cost of over \$50,000, is the first Catholic school ever held in Wayne.

The new building, pictured above, has four classrooms and nurse and principal's headquarters. A modern kitchen is included in the basement, which will be available for church banquets.

A lot of the work on the school, the interior finishing and equipment was done through volunteer labor by church members. Women of the church refurnished old school desks by hand in a modern blonde finish. Men of the church have been busy this week with last minute details and cleaning before school opens Tuesday.

Four Benedictine Sisters from Norfolk will teach at the school. They will be housed in a remodeled tenants housing unit at the school site.

**Dedication Later**  
Dedication of the school building is planned for later in the year. A playground is planned for the west side of the building. Tentative plans call for erection of a new church and rectory at the school site, which covers about two blocks.

late plot doing exceptionally well." William Vahikamp, five south and two west. "Our yield loss will average about 30 percent. A rain now is too late to help the yield, but it would keep the corn from getting too chaffy."

Otto Heishold, two north and three east. "Our corn is driving up a little too fast. Rain now would slow the drying and give the corn a chance to mature more. Some planted on alfalfa ground we'll have to cut for silage this week. We don't have near the crop we had last year."

We've been getting by on the skin of our teeth on the moisture problem all summer. Some corn will be good but we will have a lot that won't amount to anything. I'm afraid rain now would be too late to help any."

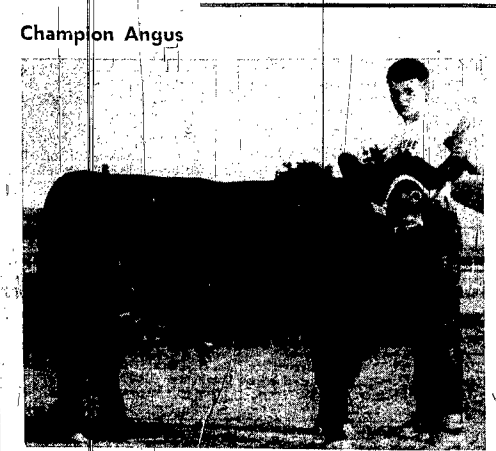

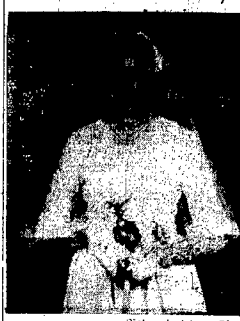

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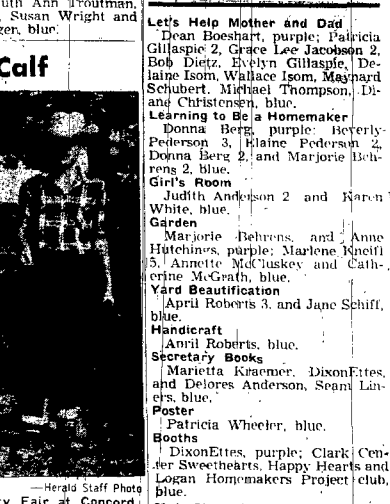

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# THE Nebraska Farm Outlook



## FARM NEWS REVIEW AND FORECAST

"Our Roots Are In This Land"

### Commodity Briefs

#### CATTLE

Slaughter prices the past month have lost about one-half the sharp gains made the first two weeks in July. Numbers slaughtered are continuing to run ahead of a year ago. Feeder cattle prices have not come back down from the July rise as much proportionately as slaughter prices. Movement of feeders out of the Sand Hills is very slow.

#### HOGS

Butcher prices are showing strength again after two weeks of declining prices — declined by about \$4. The price break was freakish in that it wasn't expected until a month later, the time heavy marketings from Spring farrowings.

#### POULTRY

Prices of top quality eggs are expected to continue their seasonal increase during late summer and early fall. Although the amount of the rise from spring to fall may not be as large as last year, fall egg prices should be as high or higher than in 1952.

#### WHEAT

The August 11 forecast indicates that Nebraska's wheat crop will be its fourth largest on record — about 88 million bushels, despite weather conditions.

#### CORN

Current estimates indicate that dry weather is cutting into Nebraska's corn crop. The August estimate was down 22 million bushels from the July estimate.



## 1954 HOG OUTLOOK

The time to plan the hog enterprise for 1954 is at hand. Gilts should be selected from the spring pig crop. Breeding dates of course will depend on how early you want your pigs next spring.

It is a good idea to consider the present situation before making decisions regarding 1953 hogs. Hog prices are the highest in several years and the corn-hog ratio is about 17 or 18. Hog numbers are down for the second consecutive year — the 1953 spring pig crop is 10% smaller than last year — the total number raised is 50.7 million. The average of 6.81 pigs saved per litter is the highest on record. Storage stocks of pork are far below a year ago. Hog prices should be good through August and, although they will drop seasonably, prices should be considerably higher this fall than last year.

Nebraska the corn has been severely damaged by drought, Nebraska may still have a good crop if more rain comes soon. Nationally, the forecast is for a larger crop than last year. The July 1 estimate is 3,336 million bushels. No doubt if we have a good corn crop, hog production will increase next year. A good feed supply and a high hog-corn ratio would induce many to keep more sows for spring pigs. Under such conditions it is likely that hog prices will continue favorably until the heavy hog runs begin in the fall. Early pigs are likely to sell considerably better than late pigs in 1954.

One other factor is important. Lard supplies are still large and the price is below the price of live hogs. Although the premium paid for meat-type hogs may not be as high as it should be, hog buyers are becoming more critical of the type of hogs marketed. The trend is definitely in the direction of wider margins between meat-type and lard-type hogs.

### Farrowing To Decrease

Fall pig numbers will be about the same in the Cornbelt as last year, but for the U. S. a decrease of 5% is expected, according to the June 1 survey. There is a possibility that the fall pig crop will actually be as large as a year ago. There may have been some shifting to fall pigs after the June 1 survey was made. However, unless business conditions deteriorate materially, 1953 fall pigs should sell better than the 1952 fall crop.

The big question is — How long will the favorable situation for hogs continue? It is difficult to predict how profitable it may be to raise hogs that go to market a year from now. Important factors are business conditions, wage earners' income and competition from beef and other meats. Although the Korean Armistice has been signed, defense spending and the national income are expected to continue at a high level. Beef and poultry supplies will probably be heavy next year, although if the drought continues in some of the major cattle areas the heavy supply of beef may reach the market before next fall.

### Corn Prospects Good

The feed supply determines the supply of pork to a very large extent. The corn crop is now at the critical state. Although in some areas in

### Suggested Program For 1954 Hog Production

1. Plan to produce all the hogs for which feed, shelter and proper care will be available.
2. Breed for early farrowing — January and February — provided you have good shelter and can avoid heavy losses in case of cold weather at farrowing time.
3. Provide ample pasture to reduce feed costs.
4. Keep hogs thrifty and full-feed for an early market.
5. Breed for meat-type hogs and market at 200-225 pounds. Do not produce excess lard.
6. Late spring pigs may be profitable only to the efficient producer who raises large litters and market with a minimum feed cost.

### Agriculture In Our Economy

Many of us who are active in agriculture sometimes fail to fully appreciate the importance of full industrial activity to agricultural prosperity or to understand the relative position of agriculture to the entire economy.

The size of the net farm income is greatly influenced by 1) industrial prosperity, 2) the degree of competition in agriculture, and 3) the relationship of the amount of food consumed to fluctuating income.

#### Industrial Prosperity Important

1) Industrial prosperity directly affects the prosperity of agriculture because 84 out of every 100 persons in the nation do not live on farms, decreasing from 25% in 1933 to 16% in 1952. As a result, non-farm people are the buyers of most of what agriculture produces. Farm people buy only a small part of what they produce themselves or of what the nation as a whole produces.

When industry is booming, city people have the money to buy farm products. In 1952, net farm income was about 14 1/3 billion dollars compared to about 270 billion dollars of total net personal income, including net farm income. This means that all farm people had 14 1/3 billion dollars to spend for goods and services that they wanted, while non-farm people had 255 billion to spend for things they wanted. Most of the movement of farm people to the city takes place because many jobs are available and these people can earn a higher level of living by working in industry than by working on the farm.

#### Agriculture "Too" Competitive

2) The competitive position of agriculture in the national economy denies farmers a strong economic and bargaining position in the market place. Farmers do not have access to as much information about prices as do the people who buy and sell to farmers. Competition is never completely free anywhere at any time, but it is more effective where there are many buyers and sellers. In agriculture some 5 million farmers sell their products to only a few buyers.

The processors and distributors set the price they will pay in view of their competitive price — what they must pay to get the product — and they take into consideration the forces that may affect the supply and demand condition in the future.

This is where the argument for government action comes in. It is argued that because farming is done by a large number of independent farmers who sell into an organized market, farmers cannot control their prices and income as well as producers of other products that operate on contracts, orders and fair trade laws. If farmers do not have a position in determining prices does this imply that they do not get their fair share of the national income? Price support programs have been helpful in increasing farm incomes. Up until the time of government price support programs, if farmers needed cash immediately after harvest to pay debts or to live on, they were forced to accept whatever price they were offered. Now, if that farm product is supported, he may take the price offered on the open market, or he may get a loan and store it with the aid of the government loan and storage program and then sell whenever he feels that market conditions are most favorable for him.

#### Food Consumption Stable

3) Relationship of Food Consumption to Income. The amount of food eaten does not increase proportionately with rising income. With rising incomes people do not eat more and more pounds of food. As income rises our tastes and desires for food also change and may be satisfied in a variety of ways. It is possible for us to satisfy our nutritional need at one-fourth the average cost if we did not want variety. And if we demand extreme variety, we may pay four times as much as other people who do have an adequate diet. Actually, there is a limit

to the capacity of the human stomach. People living in U. S. eat only about 1,600 pounds of food annually. But the type, variety and composition of that food and the conditions under which it is eaten are practically unlimited. It may be supplied very cheaply or it may be very expensive.

When it comes to non-food items that we buy, such as clothes, autos, radios, homes, etc., there is practically no limit to our wants. Not only do many of us want larger and better things that we already have, but we are constantly wanting new things. With modern advertising it is little wonder that the consuming public doesn't spend more for foods — there are too many other things competing for the consumer's dollar. During World War II when so many non-food items were unavailable, people did spend more on food. Part of this increase was for more expensive foods prepared in the home, part of it was spent for more pounds of food. In addition, foods were relatively cheap compared to other things because of an abundant supply of food and scarcity of other goods.

#### Agricultural Decline

What has been the net result of agriculture's relatively declining position in the national economy? How has this affected the farmers share of the total net income? Between the years 1940 and 1947, the farmers' share of total net personal income greatly increased because of a general upswing in both U. S. total net income and net farm income, and because of declining farm population. Since 1937, the farm share of total net income has fallen about 30% — from 163 to 114 in 1952.

### What's Ahead For This Year?

What are the economic forces that will affect agriculture in the near future? Listed below are some of the important economic forces that are relevant to a prosperous economy.

#### INDUSTRIAL

- \*Total population is growing at 3 to 4 million persons annually.
- \*Farm population's long-run trend is downward.
- \*Employment at all-time record, and will continue strong.
- \*National net personal income is at an all-time high, and will continue to rise if current government policies continue.
- \*Taxes will level off or may decrease somewhat beginning January 1, 1954.
- \*Investment in new construction continued to advance.
- \*Industrial production at an all-time peak, and will continue upwards the coming year.

#### AGRICULTURAL

- \*Agricultural exports to continue to decline — off about one-third from the 1951-52 level.
- \*Agricultural production at a record high in 1952, but may be slightly lower in 1953 because of drought conditions in the Southwest.
- \*Net farm income in 1953 may be 10% below 1952. The sum of these economic forces indicate that industrial employment and production will continue high — resulting in a strong demand for agricultural products. Record agricultural production during the past few years, continued high production costs, and reduced exports — all of which are causing farm prices to drop, will cause farm income to be down in 1953. The quantity of foods and fibers produced by agriculture has been increasing faster than the nation has been willing to use them at going prices.

### The Use of Nonfat Dry Milk Solids

Milk production in recent months has set new records for this time of year. However, consumption of fluid milk has remained about the same. Excess milk is usually channeled into several manufactured products, such as butter, cheese, and nonfat dry milk solids.

There are many advantages in retailing skim milk as a dry product.

Nonfat dried milk adds much to the diet of people of all ages. It contains many substances necessary for good nutrition. It is one of the finest and most widely accepted sources of protein. No other food compares with milk as a source of calcium and it is an outstanding source of riboflavin — one of the B vitamins. With the exception of fat and vitamins associated with fat, the nutritive value of nonfat dry milk compares favorably with that of fluid whole milk.

#### Calcium Usually Deficient

The level of calcium intake of the American people is least satisfactory of any of the major nutrients. This was shown by a summary of the

"Nutritive Content of City Diets". This report, compiled by the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, was based on surveys made in four major American cities in 1948 and 1949. Only about 6 out of 10 urban families had diets providing recommended amounts of calcium.

#### Good Economical Supplement

Greater use of nonfat dry milk would greatly improve the diets of the American people. The milk may be used in the dry form or reliquified. In foods such as soups, beverages, gravies, and bakery products dry milk may be used in combination with fluid milk to give extra food value. The food value of dishes containing little or no milk can be stepped-up by adding extra milk in the dry form. One-pound packages of nonfat dry milk cost from 39 to 41 cents\*. Skim milk made from nonfat powder costs about 8 cents a quart, as compared to 21 cents\* for fluid whole milk. The homemaker who wants to feed her family adequately, will find that nonfat dry milk is economical and nutritionally profitable to use provided that extra amounts of green and yellow vegetables, and butter or fortified margarine are included in the diet.

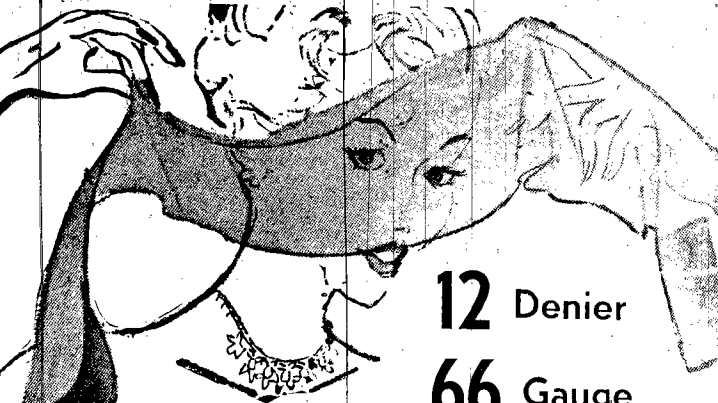

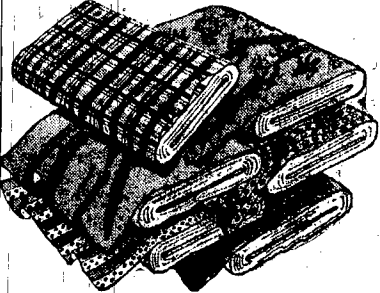
