Wayne State Enrollment May Top 650 Students

Enrollment at Wayne State for the fall term is expected to top 650, by more than 50 students according to Registrar Milton E. Childs.

Total enrollment is expected to reach 650, compared with 605 last fall. Childs said 266 former students were registered Tuesday, an increase of 25 over 1952. New student enrollment was running well ahead of last year at noon Wednesday. More than 300 freshmen are expected before registration is completed.

The number of students at the largest of several schools according to Childs reflects the decreased drain on colleges caused by reduction of selective service calls.

Classes Thursday

Classes were scheduled to get underway at the college today. A 30-minute sister picnic for women and "men picnic" for men were held Tuesday, followed by an afternoon dance in the evening. Refreshment parties were held Wednesday and the annual faculty picnic is planned today.

An all-school dance will follow the Wayne-Arkansas football game Friday night.

Wayne Needs New Well; Hot Spell Saps Reserve

Wayne is going to need another well to meet the ever-growing water needs of its population, the city council learned Tuesday night.

City Clerk Walter Bressler explained to the city fathers how the recent hot spell sapped reserve water supplies and increased the hazard to property in case of a serious fire.

15 Million Gallons

Bressler said consumption on several days during the torrid week reached 750,000 gallons. Normal average consumption is about 350,000 gallons daily. The clerk added that 15 million gallons were pumped during August, an average of 500,000 gallons a day. This does not include college consumption, which is fed by their own private pumps.

Wayne now has three wells in operation with a total pumping capacity of 1,000 gallons per minute. The last well was put down in the fall of 1946.

\$50,000 Estate Will Contest Slated Tuesday

Hearing on the contested probate of the estimated \$50,000 estate of Mrs. Sadie E. Mears, Wayne, is slated for county court Tuesday.

The court battle centers around the two alleged wills of Mrs. Mears. Four Omaha grandchildren of Mrs. Mears are contesting a will filed by a fifth grandchild, John A. Mears, Sioux City, which leaves the bulk of the estate to the Sioux City. This will is dated June 24, 1953.

The contestants have filed a second will, dated May 6, 1952, which divides the estate equally among the grandchildren. They objected to the 1953 will on the grounds that it was improperly executed and attested, and that Mrs. Mears was not possessed of sufficient mental capacity at the time it was executed. They also charged the will was procured by fraud and undue influence which was prejudicial to the contestants.

'Really Wonderful', Wife Says After POW Husband's Release



"It's really wonderful. We've been waiting anxiously for the news all month. It was a great relief when it finally came."

That was the statement of Mrs. Irene Manto Saturday after learning her husband, Capt. Joseph V. Manto, was one of the American prisoners of war released by the Communists Friday night.

Capt. Manto had been a prisoner 23 months, since Nov. 28, 1950. Mrs. Manto last heard from him in a letter dated May 12. It arrived at Concord in July. She received six letters from her husband in June and July.

An official telegram followed Friday's phone call to confirm the first report and then followed an incessant ringing of Mrs. Manto's phone. Many long distance and local calls of congratulations and messages from family and friends everywhere.

Capt. Manto was in the thick of the Korean fighting from the time he landed at Hsuan beachhead with a combat team of the Second division in August, 1950.

He was the first officer of his division decorated after volunteering for an observation patrol behind enemy lines at the Nak-ton river sector. Later in the battle he was struck by shrapnel but refused evacuation to remain with his men.

munists launched their counter-offensive, Manto with his task-force company, was spearheading the drive of the second division and he became known as "Task Force Manto."

Nov. 28, 1950 he wrote his wife describing the ensuing action as "nightmarish with heavy losses of men." His remaining company was ambushed by a Chinese "bazooka team and surrounded at Singhung-dong. Press dispatches in the New York Herald Tribune, describing his actions from the field, said Manto fought his way out of the trap and brought back 40 wounded men. He then recrossed the river

and rescued a considerable amount of vital equipment.

Mrs. Manto received her first official defense department telegram Dec. 27, 1950 reporting her husband "missing in action" since Nov. 28, 1950. For her, however, there was always hope and faith. At Letterman hospital, San Francisco, in July, 1951, Capt. Manto's commander, Earl Barberis, informed her that "her husband had been placed in a thousand of coming out of that battle alive."

The following day word reached her in San Francisco... a letter from her husband had just arrived. "He was healthy." A limited number of letters followed during his imprisonment to let her know he was in good health and awaiting the day he could come home.

Seaweed Soup

He informed her the time was spent in active sports programs during good weather. Unpleasant surroundings besides the work and "studies." In the winter months he taught and played chess "as well as engaging in every card game conceivable to man and reading everything he could get his hands on." At one time they existed on a diet of seaweed soup and a form of cake made from flour and vinegar.

Capt. Manto's letters in April and May of 1953, informed his wife that the sick and wounded exchange in April bolstered prisoner morale. He added that the Communists had just installed bunk beds in their compound making him most happy to sleep off the dirt floor for the first time in over 2 1/2 years. His last letter, dated May 12, said "he was in good health and hopeful."

Manto was officially listed as a POW at compound No. 2 in Dec. 1951, when the Communists hand-

ed over a list of prisoners to the United Nations.

Awarded Silver Star

Mrs. Manto received a Silver Star medal and third Oak Leaf cluster to the Bronze Star medal for her husband in ceremonies at Wayne State in May, 1952.

He was awarded decorations for gallantry in action in the Nakdong river salient in August, 1950 and in action near Singyang, Korea in November of the same year. According to the citations, Manto displayed courage, fighting skill and absolute disregard for his own safety in gaining information which helped prevent casualties among our troops.

He was also promoted to captain in Dec., 1950 a month after his capture, but was unaware of the promotion until his release Friday.

Mrs. Manto hopes that her brother, Pvt. Dean C. Salmon, now stationed at Inchon, Korea, was able to greet Capt. Manto as he was waiting to depart from his base there. She received a cable from her husband Tuesday and plans to fly to San Francisco to meet him when his ship docks there. The cable said in part:

"My Dearest 'Suzie',
Am free again. Now headed for home. Receiving excellent care. Looking forward to seeing you soon. Best wishes to all at home."

Mrs. Manto said Wednesday, "Words cannot describe how I feel. I feel happy, blessed and humble that we will soon be reunited and sad for so many families who will not. I can only thank God and the many friends who have hoped and prayed for Joe and me through all these days of waiting. I'm so proud of Joe, and San Francisco, here I come!"

While her husband was held prisoner, Mrs. Manto lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred D. Salmon, Concord.
