

## City Community Chest Meet Slated Oct. 1

### Third Annual Tall Corn Contest Opens Thursday; Offer Over \$100 in Prizes

#### Local Farmers Eligible for 24 Awards

Wayne's third annual corn contest, sponsored by Wayne merchants and The Wayne Herald, gets underway today and runs until 5:30 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 3.

Over \$100 in prizes is being offered for the five tallest stalks and the five heaviest groups of three ears of corn in this territory. A total of 24 prizes, plus 40 six-months free subscriptions to The Wayne Herald are being offered.

Entries must be brought to The Herald office. All farmers in the Wayne trade area are eligible to enter. Each farmer may enter one stalk and one group of three ears. Farmers should bring the entire stalks to not cut it off above the ground. Ears should be shucked and clipped off clean at the base. The ears must be dried.

First place winners in each division will get five of the prizes. The second and third place winners will get three and two prizes, respectively. The other four winners will get one prize each.

Wayne, Wakefield Winners  
Herbert Hansen, Rt. 3, Wayne, copied the heaviest ears division last year with an entry which weighed 5 lbs. 5 oz. Kenneth Baker, Rt. 2, Wakefield won the tall stalk division with an entry measuring an even 14 feet.

The group is currently practicing five times weekly but will go to a six-a-week schedule in a couple of weeks, Mrs. Selz said.

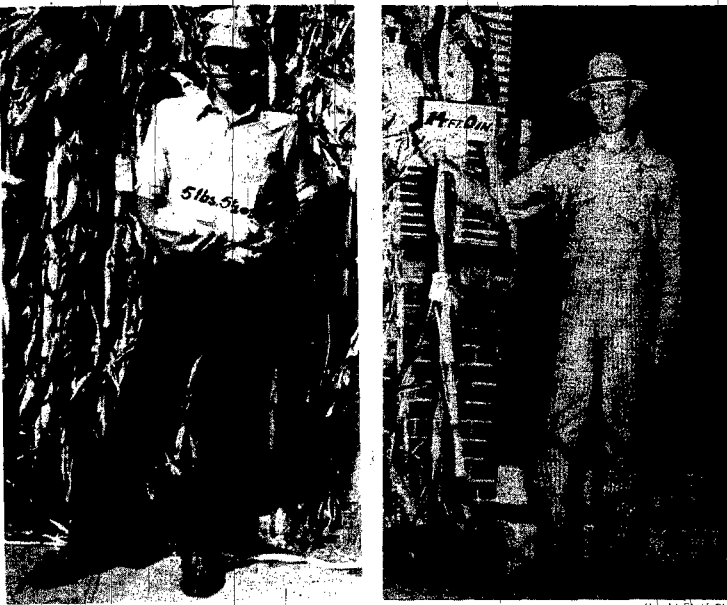

Classes of retail business covered by the survey. Local stores selling food, another important index, accounted for \$1,862,000 of the volume, bettering the previous year's record of \$1,663,000. They garnered 17 cents of each retail dollar.

Stores selling general merchandise, including variety and department stores, had sales of \$813,000 in the year, slightly more than seven cents.

The stores dealing in furniture, household supplies and radio equipment did business to the tune of \$373,000, equal to three cents.

Drug store operations came to \$162,000, representing nearly two cents.

## A More Deadly Game

Football season is hardly started and we have already recorded two deaths on Nebraska gridirons. These deaths will start a rash of over-the-coffee conferences about the dangers of football. Some of the statements will go like this:

"They ought to abolish the sport. It never does the boys any good anyway."

"Well, they should provide the boys with more protective clothing so they can't get hurt."

"They should prohibit tackling and blocking, then there wouldn't be any danger of injury."

Other suggestions will run clear through the realm of imagination to the super-ridiculous.

Then, after wisely wagging heads have hashed over this "serious situation" in football, the conference breaks up and the conferees, each 10 minutes late for dinner, will jump into their respective cars and go roaring home, crowding stop lights, scaring pedestrians, running stop signs and committing sundry other traffic offenses.

But that seems to be the right and proper thing to do. As long as you are at the wheel of a car, anything goes.

These same heads which dolefully wag over the "serious situation" in football have probably left more marks of their passing than any football game.

Newspapers, radio and television each day report the deaths of the highways but people only shake their heads and say it is "too bad."

But let one death occur on the football field and they are after someone's scalp—either that of the coach, school officials or anyone handy at the time.

Now it is not the Herald's contention that deaths on the football field are to go unnoticed. We think everything should be done to protect the players from injury and still let them play a slurr-bang game. The cooperation and sportsmanship it teaches is good for them.

And anyone who has seen the gear worn by the present-day football player knows that officials have done much to give the player every possible protection.

It just doesn't figure.

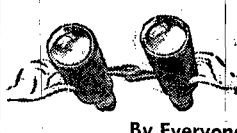

# Blue Devils Trounce Madison 39-0 For Second Win

## Tietsort, Johnson Spark Opening Loop Victory

Displaying their most potent offensive attack of the season, Wayne High's Blue Devils racked up their second straight win Friday night by shutting out a hapless Madison eleven 39-0.

It was the opening Husker conference game for both teams and put Wayne in a first place tie with Stanton in the West division standings.

The Blue Devils, paced by Larry Johnson and Rod Tietsort, rolled up the amazing total of 470 yards offensively. Johnson scored three times while Tietsort tallied twice. Don Wightman ran for the sixth touchdown.

Madison was virtually helpless. Had the Dragons been without Fullback Brube Dittberner the score would have been much worse. The speedy little junior chalked up 101 of Madison's 134 yards from scrimmage.

Wayne tallied in every period, one in each of the first two and twice in the third and fourth. Johnson and Tietsort had field days skirting the Madison ends. Johnson averaged 12 yards per try on 13 carries while Tietsort averaged eight in 17.

Johnson brought the crowd to its feet on the fourth play of the second half with a brilliant 72-yard jaunt to paydirt. Tietsort did the same thing when he raced 40 yards with a pass interception with two minutes left in the game.

It wasn't all potatoes and gravy for Wayne, however. The Blue Devils looked sloppy on their blocking several times and they drew 85 yards in penalties. Several times Wayne missed touchdowns on long gains when downfield blocking was lax.

Considering the strength of the opponents, Wayne's defense left much to be desired. Madison made consistent gains over the Blue Devils. The visitors racked up 10 first downs with an offense much less potent than that of Allen a week earlier. Larry Hofeldt was bothered by a groin injury suffered earlier in the week and could not block effectively. He sat out the last quarter.

Wayne took a 7-0 lead with 2:40 left in the first period when Johnson cut between right tackle and end from nine yards out. His run capped a 68-yard march highlighted by Tietsort's 28-yard dash around right end. Gordon Zapp's placement hit the crossbar and bounced over for the extra point.

It didn't take the Blue Devils long to make it 13-0 when Dittberner's punt was partially blocked and Wayne took over on the Dragon 41. Tietsort went 18 yards to the 17 and raced 13 more for the touchdown two plays later. Zapp's placement was blocked. The half ended that way.

Johnson's 72-yard run came when the second half was only four plays old. He cut between right guard and tackle and raced all the way from his own 28 behind beautiful blocking. Dick Logge provided a key block to spring the fleet back in the secondary. Zapp's placement was short.

Gilbert Schmidt set up the fourth Wayne touchdown when he recovered a Madison fumble on the Dragon 23. Tietsort got 15 yards in two tries and Wightman hit the right side for the final eight yards. Zapp kicked a placement and skirted left end for the extra point to make it 26-0. The third period closed two minutes later.

Wayne marched 72 yards for its next tally with nine by Glenn Houdersheldt and Johnson sparking the drive. Johnson finally made the end zone from five yards out. Zapp added the placement to make it 33-0.

**Pass Interception**  
The last touchdown was unexpected. Madison recovered Houdersheldt's fumble on its own 30 and Quarterback Dick Reigle tried to hit Ord Kreitman with a flat pass. Tietsort raced in to grab the ball and scooted 40 yards for the tally. Only two minutes remained when he crossed the goal line.

Wayne was knocking on the door again when the final gun sounded. Madison had received the kickoff but Tietsort intercepted

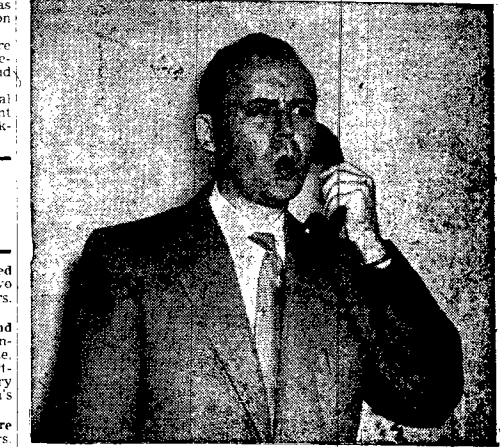

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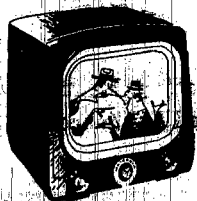

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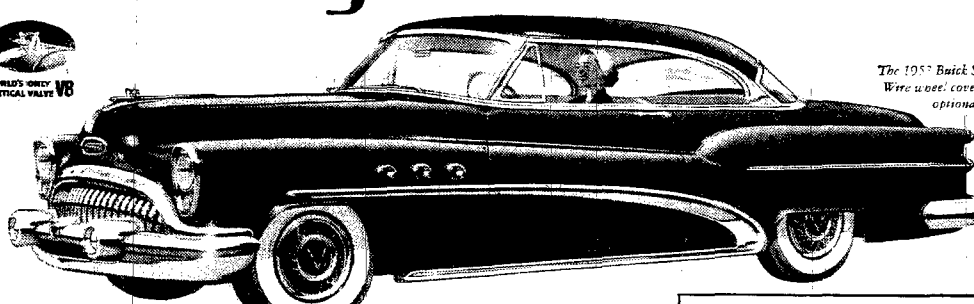
