



Then, after wisely wagging heads have hashed over this "serious situation" in football, the conference breaks up and the conferees, each 10 minutes late for dinner, will jump into their respective cars and go roaring home, crowding stop lights, acaring pedestrians, running stop signs and committing sundry other traffic offenses.

But that seems to be the right and oper thing to do. As long as you are at wheel of a car, anything goes.

These same heads which dolefully wag over the "serious situation" in football have probably left more marks of their passing than any football game.
