Wegner Mann, Winside, was named the 1953 Wayne county soil conservation progress winner. It was announced Tuesday by Jack Smith, work unit conservatist for the local district.

Mann, who farms 2 1/2 miles east of Winside, was given the award for his outstanding projects in soil conservation during the past year. The contest ended Sept. 15.

The county winner purchased his quarter section a year ago last spring. He signed an agreement with the conservation district during the summer and had a complete plan made for the farm.

Last fall he built 66 miles of terraces and prepared most of the waterways. This spring he performed all farming operations on the contour. He also seeded 36 acres to permanent pasture.

## Joint Rites Held Sunday For Two Accident Victims

Joint funeral services for LuVone Henningsen, 6, and June Muller, 6, were held Sunday at the Salem Lutheran church, Wakefield.

LuVone, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Henningsen, and June, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Muller, were killed Thursday morning when struck by a truck driven by John Ronfeldt, Wakefield, while crossing Highway 9, four and one-half miles north of Wakefield on their way to school.

Patrolman Clarence Mayhew reported Ronfeldt was driving his truck north when Earl Nelson, Concord, drove a truck on to the highway from the west and turned south.

LuVone, who had just arrived at school with her mother, saw Maxine Muller and June coming across the road and ran to meet them. She then started walking with them on the west side of the highway.

As the Nelson truck went by the two girls darted into the highway behind the truck and into the path of the Ronfeldt vehicle. Ronfeldt said he didn't see the girls until they dashed out from

behind the Nelson truck which was coming toward him.

LuVone died 15 minutes after the mishap while June died at 2 p.m. Thursday at the Wakefield hospital.

June Adele Muller was born at Wayne Jan. 26, 1947. She is survived by her parents, three sisters, Marcella, Maxine and Phyllis; and her grandmothers, Mrs. Clara Baker and Mrs. Mary Muller.

A memorial fund for the girls has been started.

## Nearly Million Bushels Corn Delivered to PMA

County PMA Chairman T. P. Roberts said Wednesday that nearly a million bushels of 1952 seeded corn will have been delivered to county bin sites when delivery operations are completed soon.

Deadline for delivery was Wednesday, but Roberts said some farmers had been unable to deliver their corn before Sept. 30. Bins at Sholes and Winside, with a combined capacity of 400,000 bushels are now full.

Roberts said. Nearly 500,000 bushels are stored at the Wayne site.

Announcement of the 1953 corn loan rate for Wayne county is expected in about 10 days, Roberts said.

## Corn Contest Entries to Close Saturday at 5:30

Farmers in the Wayne trade area have only three more days in which to enter their corn in the third annual corn contest sponsored by Wayne merchants and The Wayne Herald. The contest closes Saturday at 5:30 p.m.

Up to Wednesday noon 11 groups of ears had been entered in the contest. Quentin Preston, Winside, had the first entry in the division with three ears weighing 4 lbs. 5 oz. Herbert Hansen, Wayne, won last year's contest with an entry weighing 6 lbs. 5 1/2 oz.

Winners in the tall stalk division this year are expected to be shorter than a year ago because of the dry weather in late summer. Kenneth Baker, Wakefield, won the 1952 contest with a 14-foot stalk.

Twenty-four Wayne merchants are offering prizes valued at over \$100 for the five tallest stalks of corn and five heaviest groups of three ears of corn. The Herald is awarding a free six-month subscription as a bonus to the 10 prizewinners.

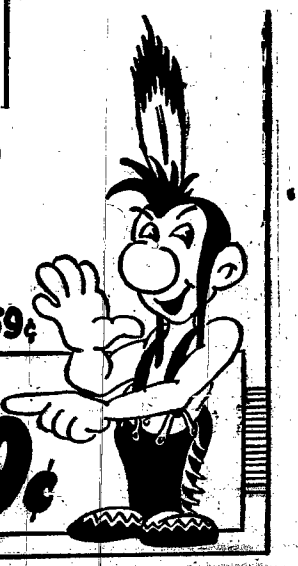

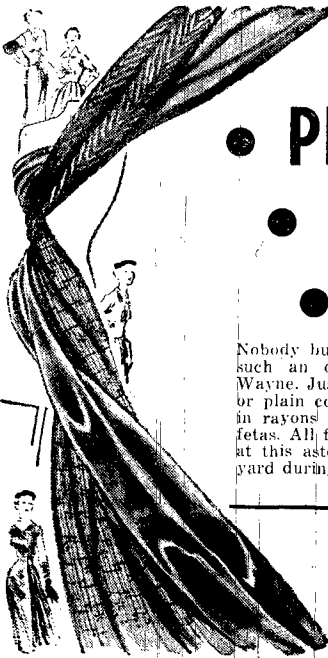

## A Community Project

Oct. 1-8 is National Newspaper Week—the time when newspapers all over the nation re-dedicate themselves to the service of the people.

Too many persons think "Freedom of the Press" means only the newspaper's right to print the news and to interpret it—on the editorial pages—as they see it.

However freedom of the press has a far deeper meaning. It is actually the people's right to know, to be informed of the happenings over the village, county, state, nation and the world. It is the people's right to have a free press as much as it is the right of the press to print the news.

The newspaper, providing a source of information, helps the voter to cast an intelligent ballot, by telling him what the various candidates plan to do, what incumbents are doing.

A free, informed people must have a free, informed press. And it is the responsibility of the press to keep the people informed.

The strength of a newspaper is directly in proportion to the support it gets from its subscribers and advertisers. Without readers it has no advertisers—without advertisers it can furnish nothing for the subscribers to read.

The advertisements in a newspaper are also news of interest to the subscribers. By keeping the readers informed of the stock on hand, its kind and quality, they provide information to guide the buying of the public.

On the local level newspapers join in community projects, providing publicity and news on behalf of the community's efforts.

Many community projects would still be lagging or not accomplished today if it were not for the local newspaper plugging away in behalf of the effort.

The newspaper's opinions—expressed in the editorial columns—are just that—the opinion of the newspaper. However space is available to everyone to express his opinion on the editorial pages by writing a letter to the editor and signing his name.

Thus the newspaper is a community project in itself. And during National Newspaper Week we re-dedicate this newspaper to the service of the community.

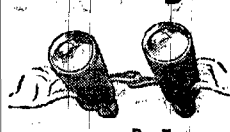

Wayne got a break right after the next kickoff when a Trojan center blocked a pass from center and was downed on the Wakefield three yard line. Carlson punted to Tietz who ran it to the Wakefield 19. Wayne had a second touchdown five plays later when Palmer went over from the one.
