It will follow a big pre-game rally and bonfire at Memorial stadium, featuring a tug-o-war between the freshmen and upperclassmen. If the freshmen win the contest, they will earn the right to be rid of their boaters.

Miss Bilson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bilson, Wayne, is a graduate of Wayne City high school. A major in home economics, she is active in Coliseum, National Home Economics society, and in the Westminster-Pilgrim fellowship, a religious organization.

Parade Saturday As queen of the celebration she will be presented to the public in the homecoming parade which will get underway at 10:30 Saturday morning. She will also be officially crowned at the pre-game ceremonies of the Wayne State-Midland football game Saturday afternoon.

Wakefield and Carroll Entries Are Winners in Corn Contest

Group of Ears Tops Record Set in 1952

Gerald Coenen, Carroll, and C. R. Wenstrand, Wakefield, are the winners in the third annual corn contest sponsored by Wayne merchants and The Wayne Herald.

Wenstrand collected five of the 24 prizes offered when his group of three ears weighing 5 lbs., 6 oz. topped all other entries. Coenen won the tallest stalk division with a stalk measuring 11 ft. 4 1/2 in.

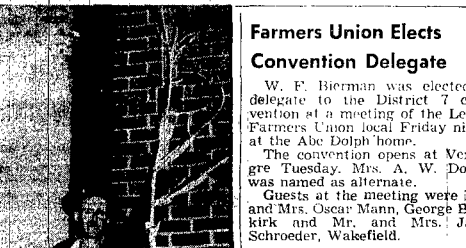
Wenstrand's entry set a new record for the contest. Herbert Hansen, Wayne, 1952 winner, held the previous record of 9 lbs. 5 1/2 oz. Coenen's entry was nearly three feet shorter than the 1952 winner entered by Kenneth Baker, Wakefield.

Wenstrand is shown with his entry in the picture at the right. His son Ronald, 11, is looking at the prize winner. The winning ears were of a giant hybrid variety. They came from a four-acre plot planted May 15. Wenstrand estimates the plot will yield about 75 bushels per acre. He picked four rows (about 1/2 acre) to get an idea of the yield and came out with 40 bushels.

The Wakefield man started farming in 1934. He moved to his present 240 acres in 1939. He is married and has three children, Ronald, Paula, 9, and Allen, 7.

22-Acre Plot Coenen, pictured at the left trying to reach the top of his winning stalk, lives on a quarter section southwest of Carroll. He also farms an additional 126 acres. The winning stalk came from a 22-acre plot.



50th ANNIVERSARY 1903 - 1953

In 1903 - The Wright brothers made their historic flight at Kitty Hawk, N. C., a flight that in 50 years revolutionized the world.
