William Vahkamp, 5 south and 2 west — "We had a lot of ears on the ground. We finished picking out 70 acres Monday with the average about 35 bushels per acre. Our best plot did 40-45 bushels."

Erwin Fleer, 2 south and 1 east — "Not much trouble picking despite the dryness of the corn. We finished our 100 acres last week. Our yield will average 50 bushels."

The \$1.54-per-bushel seedling price on 1953 corn is in effect now. The loans will mature July 31, 1954. To be eligible for loan, new corn must grade No. 3 or better and have a moisture content of 20.5 percent or less.

## 38-Day Pheasant Season to Open Here Saturday

The multi-colored ring-necked pheasant, long-ailing monarch of Nebraska's wildlife, asserts its supremacy beginning one-half hour before sunrise Saturday as the state's 38-day pheasant season gets underway throughout Nebraska.

Thousands and thousands of enthusiastic hunters are eagerly awaiting the Saturday opening when they can hunt the majestic bird. Again, as in the past, only the rooster may be taken.

The statewide outlook for pheasant hunting this fall, however, is not as good as that which prevailed prior to the season opening last year. There appears to be fewer birds in 1953, which is reflected in the reduction of the bag limit from four to three roosters.

Hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset daily. The season closes Nov. 20. Both bag and possession limits are three. All pheasants must be a sex, identification, either the head or feet must be left on the bird.

All counties are open to pheasant hunting except for Federal and State reservations and refuges, and areas closed by the Nebraska Game Commission as to hunting areas which are closed to all hunting during the season.

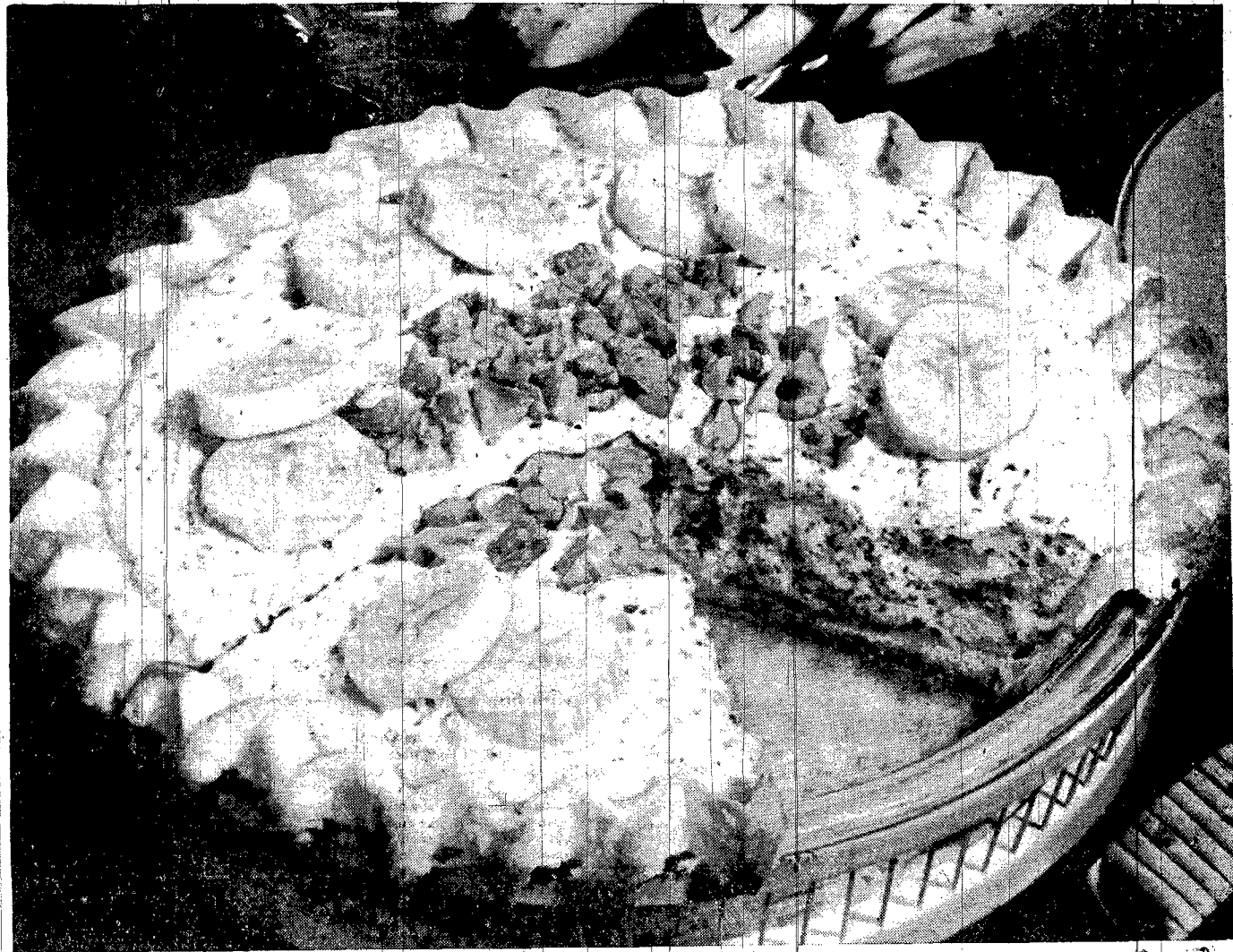

- Cut in shortening until particles are the size of small peas.
- Sprinkle water over mixture, tossing lightly with fork until dough is moist enough to hold together. Form into a ball.
- Roll out on floured pastry cloth or board to circle 1 1/2 inches larger than inverted 8-inch pie pan. Fit loosely into pie pan. Fold edge to form standing rim. Flute. Prick crust with fork.
- Bake in a very hot oven (450°F.) about 10 to 12 minutes, or until done. Cool.

### Banana Filling

1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3 medium-sized, ripe bananas\*  
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice  
1 square (1 ounce) chocolate, grated  
1/4 cup walnuts, chopped

\*Use fully ripe bananas... yellow peel flecked with brown

- Beat butter or margarine until creamy. Add confectioners' sugar gradually, beating until light and fluffy.
- Add eggs, one at a time, beating 3 minutes after each addition. (With electric mixer use medium speed.) Blend in vanilla.
- Peel and slice 2 bananas crosswise. Sprinkle with lemon juice.
- Fold chocolate and bananas into sugar mixture. Turn into cooled, baked 8-inch pie shell. Sprinkle with walnuts. Chill 2 to 3 hours.
- Just before serving, peel and slice a fully ripe banana and arrange on top of pie.

## Motor Vehicle Taxes Also Show Reduction from '52

Wayne county personal property owners will start paying a 1953 tax bill of nearly \$250,000 Nov. 1, County Treasurer Jean Boyd said this week.

Personal property tax notices will be mailed out by that date. The taxes become delinquent Dec. 31, 1953 and draw seven percent interest from that date until paid.

Most taxpayers will be pleased when they see their notices as the figures are considerably under those for 1952. This is because of the new 50 percent assessment law and the new system of paying motor vehicle taxes separately.

The total personal property tax for Wayne county is \$247,742.42, as compared with \$378,746.98 in 1952. Approximately \$60,000 of the 1952 total was motor vehicle taxes. Thus, personal taxes were reduced about \$70,000 under the 1952 figure.

## Kiwanis to Fete Farmers Monday Eve

Wayne's Kiwanis club will hold their annual urban-rural relations dinner at Emmanuel Lutheran church seven miles northwest of Wayne, Monday night. Club President Howard E. Tempers announced this week.

Club members will each invite a local farmer as a guest.

H. J. Gramlich, director of agricultural and forestry development for the Chicago and North Western railroad, will be the main speaker on the evening program. His topic will be "Pulling Together."

Greatest reduction in personal property taxes came in the town of the county. In most cases the tax bill was cut almost in half.

For example, one Wayne business was valued at \$3,850 in 1952 and the owner paid \$180 in taxes. This year the same business will pay taxes of \$99.52 on a valuation of \$2,110.

A local employee paid \$760 in personal property taxes last year on a valuation of \$153. This year his valuation is \$75 and the taxes are \$3.52.

Motor vehicle taxes will also be reduced. Under the new auto tax system, these taxes will be paid in advance when the owner purchases his 1954 license. Motor vehicle taxes become due Jan. 1 and Assessor Henry Aip will mail out notices of taxes sometime in December.

Table below gives a comparison of taxes on cars in the city of Wayne for 1952 and 1954. In addition to next year's taxes, each owner will pay a token tax of \$1 for 1953.

It must be pointed out that all the taxes above are on Wayne cars. Taxes will vary in each town and precinct according to the tax levy.

Biggest chunk of the tax load will fall on real estate owners in the towns and villages of the county. However, property owners with late model cars will save almost enough on motor vehicle and personal property reductions to offset the real estate increases.

A local business house valued at \$5,888 last year paid \$269.72 in real estate taxes. This year the same building is valued at \$8,705 and the taxes will be \$349.50.

A local home owner paid \$192.65 in real estate taxes on his home valued at \$4,200. This year the home is valued at \$6,215 and the tax bill is \$249.54.

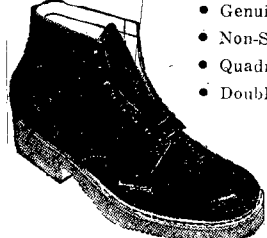

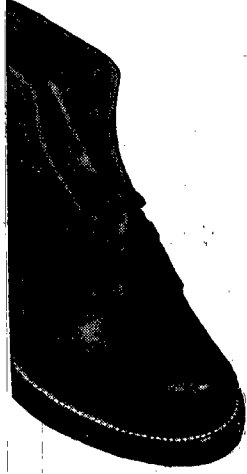

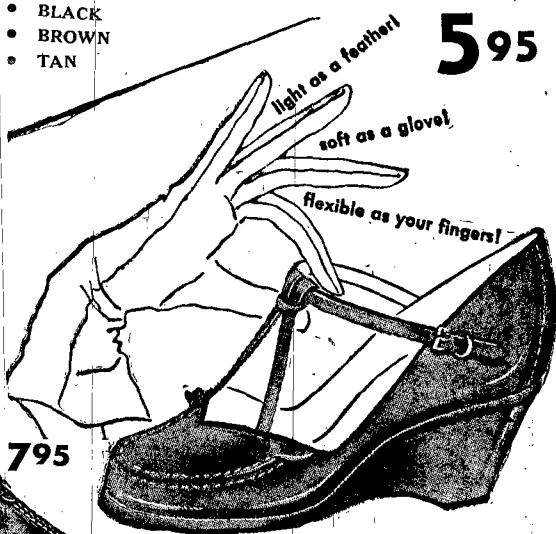

## Motor Vehicle Taxes Also Show Reduction from '52

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Most taxpayers will be pleased when they see their notices as the figures are considerably under those for 1952. This is because of the new 50 percent assessment law and the new system of paying motor vehicle taxes separately.

The total personal property tax for Wayne county is \$247,742.42, as compared with \$378,746.98 in 1952. Approximately \$60,000 of the 1952 total was motor vehicle taxes. Thus, personal taxes were reduced about \$70,000 under the 1952 figure.

Greatest reduction in personal property taxes came in the towns of the county. In most cases the tax bill was cut almost in half.

For example, one Wayne business was valued at \$3,850 in 1952 and the owner paid \$180 in taxes. This year the same business will pay taxes of \$99.52 on a valuation of \$2,110.

A local employee paid \$740 in personal property taxes last year on a valuation of \$155. This year his valuation is \$75 and the taxes are \$35.20.

Motor vehicle taxes will be reduced. Under the new auto tax system, these taxes will be paid in advance when the owner purchases his 1954 license. Motor vehicle taxes become due Jan. 1 and Assessor Henry Ayr will mail out notices of taxes sometime in December.

### Motor Vehicle Taxes Also Show Reduction from '52

Wayne county personal property owners will start paying a 1953 tax bill of nearly \$250,000 Nov. 1, County Treasurer Jean Boyd said this week. Personal property tax notices will be mailed out by that date. The taxes become delinquent Dec. 31, 1953 and draw seven percent interest from that date until paid. Most taxpayers will be pleased when they see their notices as the figures are considerably under those for 1952. This is because of the new 50 percent assessment law and the new system of paying motor vehicle taxes separately. The total personal property tax for Wayne county is \$247,742.42, as compared with \$378,746.98 in 1952. Approximately \$60,000 of the 1952 total was motor vehicle taxes. Thus, personal taxes were reduced about \$70,000 under the 1952 figure.

Gramlich was head of the animal husbandry department of the University of Nebraska for 22 years prior to taking his railroad post 11 years ago. In 1934-35 he was appointed special advisor on feeds for the AAA in Washington.

Greatest reduction in personal property taxes came in the townships of the county. In most cases the tax bill was cut almost in half. For example, one Wayne business was valued at \$3,850 in 1952 and the owner paid \$180 in taxes. This year the same business will pay taxes of \$99.52 on a valuation of \$2,110. A local employee paid \$7.60 in personal property taxes last year on a valuation of \$155. This year his valuation is \$75 and the taxes are \$3.52. Motor vehicle taxes will also be reduced. Under the new auto tax system, these taxes will be paid in advance when the owner purchases his 1954 license. Motor vehicle taxes become due Jan. 1 and Assessor Henry Cliff will mail out notices of taxes sometime in December.

The table below gives a comparison of taxes on cars in the city of Wayne for 1952 and 1954. In addition to next year's taxes, each owner will pay a token tax of \$1 for 1953.

It must be pointed out that all the taxes above are on Wayne cars. Taxes will vary in each town and precinct according to the tax levy. Biggest benefit of the tax load will fall on real estate owners in the towns and villages of the county. However, property owners with late model cars will save almost enough on motor vehicle and personal property reductions to offset the real estate increases.

A local business house valued at \$5,880 last year paid \$269.72 in real estate taxes. This year the same building is valued at \$8,705 and the taxes will be \$349.50.

A local home owner paid \$192.65 in real estate taxes on his home valued at \$4,200. This year the home is valued at \$6,215 and the tax bill is \$249.54.
