Usually these accidents happen because the operator is hurrying and fails to turn off the power when he cleans stalks and weeds from the rollers.

: It is ironical that the very machine that has saved farmers long days of work in the fields should also cost them long days of needless pain and misery and leave so many maimed for life.

A little care and patience exercised during corn-picking season will save many hands, fingers and feet — perhaps even lives — this year.

The importance of co-operation goes much further than the mere giving of donations, however. If everyone co-operates on this first Community Chest drive, it will mean a greater measure of human welfare for your dollars.

Cost of administration under the Community Chest plan usually runs about five percent —— rarely over 10 percent even for newly organized groups, while costs of up to 25 percent of donations for administration of independent drives are not uncommon.

#### **Motor Vehicle Taxes Also** Show Reduction from '52

Wayne county personal property owners will start paying a 1953 tax bill of nearly \$250,000 Nov. 1, County Treasurer Jean Boyd said this week.

Personal property tax notices will be mailed out by that date. The taxes become delinquent Dec. 31, 1953 and draw seven percent interest from that date until paid.

Most taxpayers will be pleased when they see their notices as the figures are considerably under those for 1952. This is because of the new 50 percent assessment law and the new system of paying motor vehicle taxes separately.

The total personal property tax for Wayne county is \$247,742.42, as compared with \$378,746.98 in 1952. Approximately \$60,000 of the 1952 total was motor vehicle taxes.
