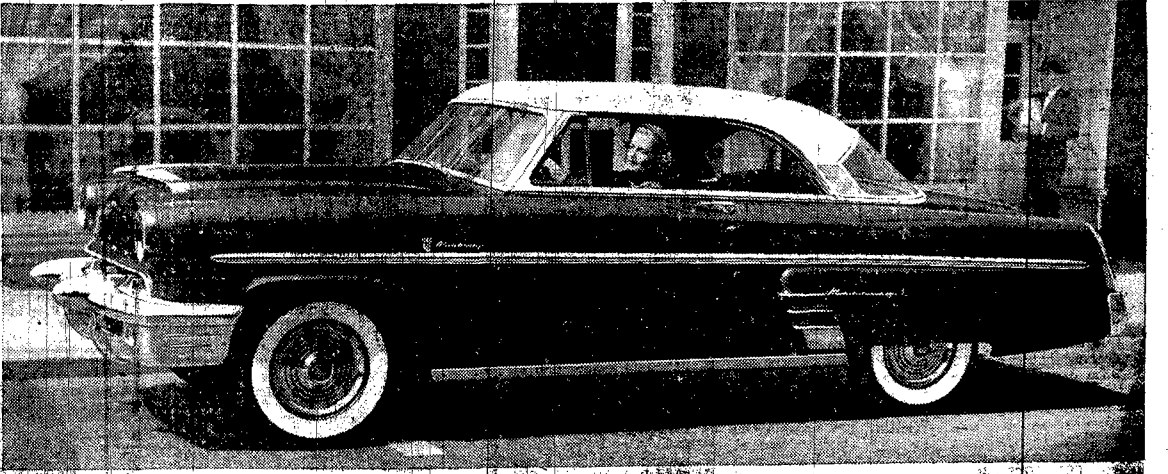
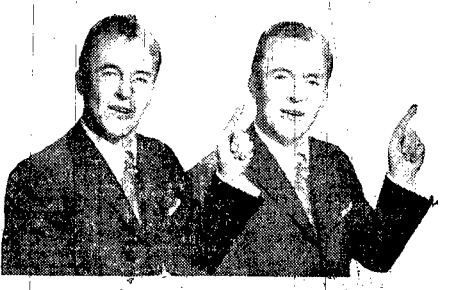

Wayne, Dixon Soil Winners In Sioux City Tonight

The Wayne (Nebr.) Herald, Thursday, Nov. 5, 1953

Wayne and Dixon soil conservation winners will be in Sioux City tonight for the annual permanent agriculture program.

The stories below give a brief description of the conservation practices used on each of the farms.

Martin Holmberg

Martin Holmberg and his wife Elsie live on a farm three miles west and one-half mile south of Wakefield. The 160 acre farm is owned by Martin's father, Henry Holmberg, who is retired and living in Wakefield.

Martin started farming this place in 1948. Two years later he realized the farm was not producing as he had expected. In 1948 he signed up as a cooperater with the Wayne County Soil Conservation district and that spring the conservation technicians made a farm plan for him.

He started his conservation practices the same spring by seeding sod waterways and building the terraces. He also contoured the rest of the farm. The rest of the terracing has followed as the crop rotations permitted until today he has about four miles of terraces on the farm.

The number of cattle being finished on this place is increasing because of the increase in production since the start of conservation farming. At the present he has 48 head of cattle on feed and is milking two cows. About 100 head of

hogs are raised and marketed each year.

Fertilizes Pasture
As for fertilizer Martin wants to raise his own nitrogen with legumes. He is using red clover, sweet clover and alfalfa. He used one ton of 0-45-0 (phosphate) on his new seeding of alfalfa. He also used 200 pounds of 33-0-0 (ammonium nitrate) per acre on his 16 acres of pasture. Martin reports the pasture responded very well to the treatment.

His crop rotation is to be one year corn followed by oats seeded with a legume. Alfalfa is to remain in one location three years then be rotated to new ground. This will get alfalfa rotated over the farm quicker and often than the long term rotation of corn and soybeans. Soybeans planted on the contour this year.

Martin and his wife both state that since contouring and terracing the yellow colored soils on the hills they are becoming darker each year. Where the feet of corn was only three feet tall it is now seven feet tall and producing good yields.

Leo Hansen

Leo Hansen operates the quarter section of land owned by his mother, Mrs. Marie Hansen. It is located five miles north and three miles west of Wayne.

In 1947 Mrs. Hansen signed as a cooperater with the Wayne County Soil Conservation district and a plan was made. The actual building of conservation control structures was started at once. Technicians laid out terrace lines on which Leo built terraces. There are about five miles of terraces completed on this farm today. In addition to this all of the waterways are seeded a good cover of grass sod established in all of them.

The pasture is bottom land which is too wet to farm. About 11 cows and 11 calves are kept each year to utilize this pasture. One hundred head of hogs are raised annually.

Leo is using one year corn in his rotation and building up nitrogen in his soil by the use of legumes. He used phosphate fertilizer on his alfalfa seeding last year and 15-15-0 (nitrogen and phosphate) fertilizer on his oats and legume seeding this spring. He stated that half of his corn ground was covered with barnyard manure this spring. "Our aim is to feed most of the crop that we produce on the farm," stated Leo.

Werner Mann

Werner Mann, his wife Vera and two children, Dean 6 and Dick 4, live on a farm on highway 35 two and one-half miles east of Winside.

Werner started farming his father's farm in 1945. He has been using a complete conservation program on this place. A year ago last spring Mann purchased a quarter section of land adjoining his father's place on the south. He signed an agreement with the Wayne County Soil Conservation district during the summer and had a complete plan made for the farm. In the fall he began to apply the recommended conservation plan by building 6.6 miles of terraces and prepared most of the waterways. This spring all of the farming operations were performed on the contour. He also seeded 30 acres for permanent pasture.

Werner stated that he knows from his experiences on his dad's place that conservation pays and that he would not hesitate to apply conservation practices on his own farm.

Gene McIntyre

The Gene McIntyre farm was chosen to represent Dixon county because more of the permanent type soil conservation practices have been applied between Sept. 1, 1952 and Sept. 1, 1953 than on any other farm in the county.

McIntyre constructed 7,200 feet of terraces, this spring and 4,710 feet this fall. He has established two acres of waterways. Approximately 40 acres of the terraced land has been seeded to permanent pastures. He also seeded 15 acres of alfalfa which he plans to work into his crop program and get it moved over the entire farm as soon as possible.

His rotation has been oats with sweet clover, corn. He makes good use of the barnyard manure and, in order to make it go around, he uses commercial fertilizer.

This farm is located 2 1/2 miles southwest of Iona. McIntyre purchased this 160 acre farm through the FFA in 1952.

McIntyre's livestock program consists of eight Brown Swiss, approximately 100 head of

Hampshire hogs and 150 laying hens. He plans to work into a beef program later as things shape up a little better.

Mr. and Mrs. McIntyre's family consists of three boys and two girls, Janis is 17, Carroll 15, Merle and Earl 8 and Jim 1. McIntyre, in talking of future plans for the farm, states that he, first of all, wants to complete the terracing program, get the fields located and lined up, construct some diversion terraces above the farmstead so as to stop the washing there after heavy rains and get a good windbreak started. Last of all, if it will work out, build a dam below the active spring that flows past the farmstead and have a good fish pond.

Marvin Draghu

Marvin Draghu's 160-acre rolling farm is located five miles west and four miles north of Wakefield. Mr. and Mrs. Draghu have one daughter, Cynthia, 3.

Draghu became a cooperater with the Dixon County Soil Conservation district in 1948. In 1950 he was selected as the progress winner in the Sioux County Permanent Agriculture contest for establishing the most soil conserving practices in a one-year period. To date, Mr. Draghu has four acres of waterways and 5.6 miles of terraces established. He constructed his own terraces and waterways with a disc-plow. He has grassed turnrows around all his fields.

Draghu states that there is really no comparison between the farm now and what it was when he first began his conservation program. He attributes this quick response to the rotation he follows. Alfalfa two years, corn, oats-red clover, red clover, corn, oats and back to alfalfa again. He uses phosphate fertilizer on his legumes and prepares his own nitrogen and makes good use of barnyard manure.

Draghu states that "the southwest hill on the place wouldn't grow corn big enough to pick. It would hardly grow cockleburs. Today you can see that the use of legumes in his rotation, the terraces and contour farming, are building fertility and at the same time holding it on the hillside."

Draghu has a good livestock program as well. He feeds 35 to 40 head of cattle each year. He has 15 head of Holstein and milking Shorthorn cows. He raises about 150 head of spring and fall pigs, using purebred Spotted Poland China and Hampshire crosses. They have about 100 chickens.

In summarizing Mr. Draghu feels that even though there are disadvantages in conservation farming, point rows, irregular areas, taking longer to farm, etc., the disadvantages are greatly outweighed by the advantages. "My farm is coming back in fertility, and its going to get better each year now that I can hold the fertility and soil in place."

Percy Lockwood

Mr. and Mrs. Percy Lockwood live 3 1/2 miles north and 1 mile east of Allen on highway 20. They have three boys, Martin 27, Merle 24 and Milton 15. Martin farms north of Allen. Merle will be attending the University of Nebraska and Milton will be a sophomore at Allen high school.

Lockwood has lived on this farm 52 years. He was 12 years old when his father died and he has been operating the farm ever since. During that time Lockwood states that "he has seen the soil wash away, the valleys fill up and the ditches get deeper." Sometimes he feels that maybe he started his conservation program too late.

Since 1951 when Lockwood became a cooperater with the Dixon County SCD he has lost no time. He has shaped and seeded 6.5 acres of waterways and constructed over three miles of terraces. He is getting grassed turnrows around most of his fields. The steep slopes of the farm are seeded to permanent hay and pasture.

One steep slope has been turned over to the game commission. They have the area fenced and planted to trees and shrubs adapted for wildlife. He has a good rotation of corn, oats and sweetclover, but plans to work over to oats with red clover and corn rotation. He likes to apply commercial phosphate on his legumes and raise his own nitrogen.

Livestock Program
Lockwood has a livestock program that fits in with his hillside farm. He has 40 head of highbred Shorthorn cattle from which he raises his own for feeding. He sells the bulls. He has 100 head of purebred Chester White hogs. He sells 30 to 50 boars per year. He also sells a few sows. The rest go to market.

Milton is an FFA member at Allen high school and has as his project two litters of Chester Whites. Mrs. Lockwood also gets into the good livestock picture by taking care of 200 Triple-A grade chickens. She sells eggs to the hatchery.

Lockwood is not only kept busy on the farm but also has many outside activities in the county and community. He is president of the Nebraska Chester White Breeders association, president of the local Big-4 Telephone company, a community committeeman on the PMA, a FFA committeeman, a supervisor of the Dixon County Noxious Weed district and a member of the Farm bureau.

Mrs. Lockwood stated that the first big difference she noticed in the conservation program was the large amount of water that used to come down through a ditch in the farmstead before the terraces were constructed. Now, even with heavy rains, very little water runs through the farmstead.

In summarizing their conservation program, both Mr. and Mrs.

Lockwood wants to complete the terracing change some more fence rows and field boundaries and then begin working on and beautifying their farmstead. They want to get a good windbreak started as soon as they can. Mrs. Lockwood stated "You have to take care of the land first, then it in return will take care of you."

Weller-Haase

Mr. and Mrs. Victor Haase live three miles north of Wayne. They have four children: Ronny 8, Margaret 7, Sally 3 1/2 and Betty 14 months. This 233-acre farm is owned by Eugenia Weller and managed by E. J. Thompson.

Haase has done a good job of conserving the soil on this farm since he became a cooperater with the Dixon County Soil Conservation district in 1947. He has constructed over five miles of terraces and shaped and seeded seven acres of grassed waterways with plow and disc-tiller. He has practically all of the turn rows around the fields established.

His rotations have been oats with sweetclover, and corn, letting the sweetclover stand over the second year on poorer areas. He is gradually changing over to using red clover as his legume. He leaves 15 to 20 acres of clover lay over each year for hay and seed.

Haase makes good use of the manure from his feed lots. This year he used an additional six tons of commercial fertilizer on small grain and corn.

Haase has a well-balanced livestock program. He has seven Guernsey and Shorthorn milk cows, usually has six to eight steers in the feed lot, markets about 150 head of hogs each year and has about 250 laying hens.
