





A Worthy Project

A remark by Mrs. Elsie Micha at the Selective Service Board revealed a condition existing in Wayne that perhaps no one but she has realized.

All the county's young men who volunter or are drafted for military service get no recognition at all of the fact that they are leaving their homes to serve their country.

They meet at the draft board the morning they board the bus to Omaha, are handed orders and travel expenses by Mrs. Micha and then they are left to fate except for farewells from girl friends and relatives.

When the boys reach camp they find that other towns have breakfasts for the loys and their families on the morning they leave; some are given small kits of foilet articles; perhaps some books to read on the trip and a couple of candy bars at least something to let the boys know that the people of the town and county realize they are leaving and are grateful for the service they will render.

Few of these boys would go to military service if they were not required to do so, it is true, but the fact that they do go—and with little if any complaints, should not go unnoticed. Boys leaving today may be giving their lives for us shortly. In these unsettled times, no one knows what tomorrow will bring on the international scene.

A continuing program to show these young men that their sacrifices are known, understood and appreciated would be a

worthy effort for a service dlub or other organization.
\* In one town, the VFW Auxiliary provides doughnuts and coffee for draftees and their families as a sort of farewell breakfast, and administer alfund that provides young men inexpensive travel kits containing toilet articles and candy bars. The Auxiliary members sew small, sturdy bags for the men to carry these items.


The expense of such a program would be small, the labor required would be almost negligible and the dividends it would pay in its effect on our young folks would be well worth all the effort.
