

Community Chest Total Over \$9,000

Annual Meet Set Jan. 14

Contributions to Wayne's first annual Community Chest campaign have reached \$9,041.60, it was announced today by Clarence Kuhn, campaign chairman.

As the drive total is more than \$3,000 over the minimum quota established by the Chest directors, the board Tuesday voted to place all surplus in its contingency fund, which means the money will remain in Wayne.

Tuesday's meeting was the last regular meeting of the board. The group has met every week since Oct. 1 making plans for the drive. Further meetings will be called by Board Chairman Rev. O. B. Proett.

Still Await Opinion on Challenge

A public hearing on the proposed relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield will be held at Lincoln Monday by the state's new advisory highway commission. Plans for the hearing were announced at the Nov. 5 meeting of the commission upon a motion from Commissioner Merle Kingsbury, Ponca.

Late Flash!

A State Highway department representative Wednesday morning began buying additional right-of-way straying east of Seventh street in Wayne, preparatory to the long-delayed relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield.

The move is in line with department plans to relocate the road straight east of Wayne for eight miles and then two north to Wakefield.

At that meeting, Gov. Robert Crosby told the commission he was glad to hear the group's advice on highway matters, including relocation controversies.

However, he added, final authority rested with him since the commission is only advisory. So far, he pointed out, he had stuck with recommendations of the highway department.

Highway department officials have already announced their choice of a road going eight miles straight east of Wayne and then two miles north to Wakefield.

Conflicts on this proposed route were to have been let Dec. 2, but State Engineer L. N. Resor, delay of the letting to allow the commission to hold the public hearing.

Gov. Crosby Sunday released the text of a letter he had written to officials in other sections of the state involved in road controversies. The letter read:

"It is wrong for officials to take the attitude that if local folks are going to fight about the location, then we won't do anything until they can agree.

"This attitude has retarded the needed development of our highway system in several parts of the state.

"So far as it lies in my power, I shall see that these parts, all badly needed improvements, are completed at some location within the schedule of the two-year program."

The governor cited Highway 35 as one of the parts of the state involved in controversies.

Attorney Charles Ledwith, Lincoln, representing the Nebraska People's Highway 35 association, has challenged the right of the state to relocate the highway as it has never been designated as a part of the state highway system.

Await Opinion
State officials are awaiting a opinion from the attorney general's office concerning the challenge.

Present at Monday's meeting will be officers of the Highway 35 association, it was announced Sunday.

City Electricity Use to Top 5 Million Kilowatts

The big jump in receipts between 1946 and 1947 due to the dropping of the 10 percent discount offered if statements were paid by the tenth of the month.

Wayne's light plant was started in 1898 when the first DC current was generated. City Clerk Walter Bressler has a statement in his office dated Apr. 30, 1902 for former state senator Phil Kohl. The statement, for one month's electricity, was for 50 cents.

Alternating current was first generated at the local plant about 1918. Since that time the plant has been expanded to include four generators with a maximum capacity of 3,230 kilowatts. Value of the plant is set at nearly \$485,000.

Biggest net cost was for the latest generator installed, which was put into operation Jan. 16 this year. The dual fuel unit cost \$188,000.

Annual Total Will Reach Record High

Wayne homes and business houses will use more than five million kilowatts of electricity this year to furnish power, light, heat, cooling facilities and run electrical appliances. Light Plant Supt. N. H. Brugger said this week.

This is the first calendar year in history Wayne will top the fabulous figure, Brugger said. It represents an increase of about 10 percent over electricity used here last year. It is more than double consumption 10 years ago and nearly four times that used in 1930 when the first accurate records were started at the local plant.

Wayne is now using 1,300 kilowatts per hour when the peak load comes between 5:45 and 6:15 p. m. That figure may not seem much to anyone but an electrician, but look at this way:

That much electricity would run your television set all day for 270 consecutive days. If a housewife could start it, the same amount would keep her household iron going for 54 straight days.

And, if you like cooling breezes, it would keep your fan running 902 straight days, nearly 2 1/2 years. Yet Wayne is using this amount of electricity in an hour. With the expected increase in consumption for Christmas, the peak load will near 1,400 kilowatts. This increase would run your fan for another 100 days.

With the advent of new electrical appliances which make our life easier, Wayne's electricity consumption has increased an average of about 10 percent each year for the past 10 years. Unlike other items in great demand electricity is

still the same price paid back in 1939.

Needless to say the light plant furnishes considerable revenue to the city. This amount has also more than doubled in the past 10 years. In the last fiscal year (May 1, 1952-Apr. 30, 1953) the utility brought the city net receipts of \$120,908.51.

The table below gives the electricity consumption in kilowatts for each of the past 10 fiscal years and the receipts during the same periods.

In Bookland

THIS IS CHILDREN'S BOOK WEEK AND THE children are flocking in droves to the library. We invited them and would have been very disappointed if they hadn't come but if you see us walking along with a slight stagger and a glazed look in our eyes think nothing of it. It will be the result of a language from the fun of children's book week. Convincing some five hundred or more children that reading can be fun isn't so hard to do, but it does take some physical stamina and your librarian, while she may still have her girlish figure, isn't getting younger every year. She may get tired but working with the children grows more exciting as time goes on. The new books, over 200 of them, eight new records and 12 film strips will be on display the remainder of the week. Adults are invited to look at them during the evening hours from 7 to 9 p.m. Did you know that between 1,000 and 1,500 books go out from our library from the children's department alone every month? Yes, the children of Wayne think reading is fun.

THE ADULT DEPARTMENT WAS NOT FORGOTTEN in the excitement of entertaining the children. A new Eric Stanley Gardner mystery was put on the rental shelf called "The Case of the Green-Eyed Sister." We know one man who read until after three o'clock one morning to finish it. He confessed after we caught him looking bleary-eyed into his morning coffee. "The Tudor Rose" by Margaret Barnes is going well on the rental shelf. It is all about 15th century England and the War of the Roses. The book committee of the library board highly recommends this one. "Leaving Home" by Elizabeth Janeway is the story about what happens to every family as the children grow up and, one by one, leave their home to lead separate lives. Do you remember a book called "The Walsh Girls?" The same author wrote it which should be a good enough recommendation. It is the fruit of fifteen years' experience as a foreign correspondent who has witnessed a new Europe rising from the ashes of despair—and of America's great adventure as leader of the Western world. Critics seem to be divided in their valuation of the book but all admit that it is definitely worth reading.

HERE AND THERE With Your County Agent

By Harold Ingalls

We will know more about Wayne county soils when the test results come back from the samples submitted last week. Motivating force for this influx was provided by H. N. Parke, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee, when he so ably demonstrated the art of taking soil samples.

Some 200 farm operators and owners turned out to hear Wilbur Ringle, extension agronomist, report on results of tests with commercial fertilizers on corn and oats. He emphasized the importance of soil testing and following recommendations which come from the college of agriculture with the report of soil analysis. He says "apply lime and phosphate in the recommended amount when tests show the need. Returns from nitrogen fertilizers have been best in seasons of adequate moisture. However, the majority of tests have shown a good financial return for money invested in nitrogen."

"If one can make a general recommendation it would be this: apply 40 lbs. nitrogen on first year corn following a legume, 40 to 80 lbs. on second year corn and 60 to 100 lbs. on third year corn. You can expect progressively greater returns from nitrogen on the second and third year corn crops. From a series of tests throughout Nebraska the average yield of oats was doubled from an application of 30 lbs. phosphatic and 40 lbs. nitrogen."

Results obtained from one test in Wayne county - 1953: nitrogen on corn at second cultivation - none gave a yield of 49 bu.; 40 lbs. - 53 bu. and 80 lbs. - 60 bu. These results agree with other tests in this area and Ringle suggested that the response to nitrogen was definitely limited by the dry season and there should be considerable carry over of nitrogen for next year's crop.

I attended the annual meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Dairy Herd Improvement association which is rather a unique and exclusive organization. Unique because its members do not agree on a choice of dairy breeds. Local members of the association include Wayne and Ward Gilliland with Guernsey as their choice of breed, William VonSoggen and John Bressler, Jr., Holstein breeders, Gunnar Swanson, Arnie Ebker and Alfred Bronzyski with Brown Swiss, Clarence Bronzyski with Ayrshires and a number of the most distant members are breeders of Milking Shorthorns.

Exclusive because membership is limited to the number of working days in a month (present membership is 24). Tester Glenn Hartman is an energetic young fellow who spends one day per month with each member. More correctly, he spends one night for this is the nature of his operations. He arrives without warning at a member's farm at milking time in the evening, weighs the milk from each cow, tests for butterfat, records the amount of feed each cow receives and repeats the same the next morning. These figures are taken as the average for the month.

"Sole purpose of the organization is to measure production and returns from their dairy herds. In this respect dairymen are fortunate in having a definite measure of efficiency which is yet to be perfected for other kinds of livestock. Figures presented at this meeting show that members in testing associations get production and returns about twice the average of all dairymen."

The difference in returns between the most efficient and lowest producer in one Nebraska association this year was shown by these figures:

Best Herd
Ave. lbs. milk per cow, 13,238
Butterfat, 477
Net return per cow \$360

Low Herd
Ave. lbs. milk per cow, 6,230
Butterfat, 230
Net return per cow, \$89

These are typical of the results found in the records of all our associations. This indicates that a good cow may easily be worth four times the value of a common one. A bulletin reporting the results of fertilizer tests on oats and another one on oat variety tests throughout Nebraska in 1953 are available at the extension office.

"Army Capt. Joe Manto, after watching the Chinese from a window in our hut, disappeared for a few minutes to return with a dead mouse. He carefully fashioned a tiny parachute from some rag and harnessed it to the mouse. He then wrote 'USA 67' on the cloth and placed the whole works on a bush outside the door. When the Chinese discovered the dead four-legged paratrooper, there was an awful commotion. But we heard no more about germ warfare for several days."

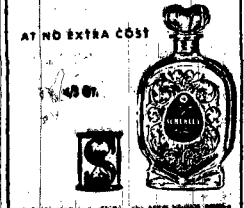

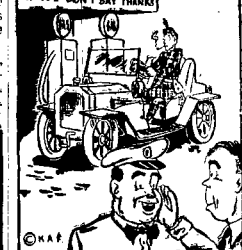

Commodity Briefs

Cattle Prices Steady

Prices of high quality slaughter cattle have remained steady the past month. Prices are not expected to weaken very much the coming month. The U.S.D.A. has announced that it expects that **CATTLE PRICES HAVE REACHED THEIR LOW MARK GENERALLY EXCEPT FOR SHORT SEASONAL FLUCTUATIONS AND BUNCHING OF RECEIPTS.** Feeder prices have also remained steady.

Hogs . . .

Prices appear to have passed their seasonal high and to be entering the lower phase which may continue for the remainder of the year, though averaging higher than last year. Indications still are that about 5% fewer pigs will be farrowed this fall.

Wheat . . .

Rains and snows the past two weeks over most of the state have improved Nebraska's winter wheat.

Economic Situation Optimistic

The national economy passed another production peak in the April - June quarter of 1953.

National disposable income is at a record level at a rate of \$288 billion dollars. Consumer credit stands at slightly over \$27 billion dollars, **but is being paid off faster than new debts are being created** — the bulk of consumer credit outstanding is for automobiles. **Personal savings are a huge backlog against adversity**

— they are up 20% from 1946.

Since the April - June quarter, business activity has generally leveled out except for three rather important segments. Steel is operating at 90% of capacity, new home construction is down 25% and about 5% less is being spent for plant expansion and for equipment. General business activity is expected to ease off from 5 to 10% during the coming year.

Adjustments Open To Dairy Farmers

Prices received this year for dairy products have been considerably below those of last year. Dairy farmers are seeking for adjustments which will bring greater returns from the dairy enterprise and the farm business as a whole. This is especially true of the grade "C" milk producers. About 4,000 of these Nebraska farmers have lost or are losing the market for their product.

There are a number of alternative enterprises which these farmers may consider. Many will change to cream production and feed the skim milk to livestock. The sale of cream and use of skim milk, under a good livestock management program, will bring a return to the farmer very close to that received for grade "C" milk.

Difficulty of Shifting to Grade "A"

Other farmers are making arrangements to convert to grade "A" milk production. Many tenants have difficulty in meeting these requirements because the landlord may not wish to make the necessary changes in permanent equipment on the farm.

This alternative grade "A" production will provide the greatest returns per man hour if the dairy operator can keep the conversion costs within reasonable limits. Conversion costs should remain under \$150 per cow.

Farmers contemplating grade "A" conversion have two alternatives in meeting this figure. They must find ways to reduce conversion costs or they will have to increase cow numbers in order to justify a greater expense.

The initial cost of a milking parlor and milk room will be about the same for a herd of six cows as for a herd of twenty or more cows. If the cost of conversion to grade "A" is kept under \$150 per cow, the additional returns received for grade "A" over grade "C" milk will come close to meeting conversion costs the first twelve to eighteen months.

Study Other Cropping — Livestock Enterprises

Those farmers who do not have a fluid milk market may find greater man hour returns in other enterprises. On some farms the poultry project can be easily expanded. Poultry marketing specialists expect the price of commercial broilers and eggs to hold up well in the months ahead.

Many farms have facilities for raising hogs. This enterprise can be expected to increase on some farms so as to utilize skim milk and other farm feeds. The market price of hogs continues to be encouraging.

The tendency to change to a beef cattle enterprise has slowed down somewhat. The price of beef cattle has been discouraging. Some farms which have large acreages of rough land in hay and pastures will probably show more profit with a beef enterprise on a long range basis.

A few farmers may change from dairy to a cash crop enterprise. Acreage allotments have been voted on wheat and may appear on other grains. Some farmers may try some other cash crop on those extra acres such as legume and grass for hay or seed.

Fluid Milk Consumption Constant

Most dairy farmers can increase their present returns by taking advantage of certain peculiarities of the milk market.

The fluid milk production-sales pattern for the last four years shows that the consumption of fluid milk in Nebraska has remained quite constant. (According to about 80% of the fluid milk market in Nebraska.) There is generally a slight decrease in consumption during the vacation months of June, July and August. Fluid milk production is much more erratic. Extreme surpluses develop in March, April, May, June and July and deficits in September, October, November and December.

Feed Supplies Ample Despite Drought

Feed supplies will be generally adequate throughout the country during the coming winter despite the drought which seriously reduced crop production in some areas, including Nebraska. Damage was severe in some areas but, as the harvest progressed, was less than expected.

Bad weather tends to get considerable publicity, good weather elsewhere does not make the news. The favorable growing conditions tend to offset the unfavorable ones. This is, of course, little consolation to farmers in the drought-affected areas.

Feed Supplies Ample

The total feed grain production for 1953 has been estimated at 118 million tons by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This is less than in five of the last seven years but is more than the usual amount consumed by livestock. In addition to this year's production, large carryovers assure an ample supply for the livestock to be fed this fall and winter. Dry, hot weather in the Corn Belt in August and

September has reduced the corn crop by about 115 million bushels since August 1, but corn production will still be the fifth largest in history, about 3.2 billion bushels. Most of the decline occurred in Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas where the drought continued throughout September. In Nebraska, the average yield of corn is expected to be about 27 bushels per acre this year compared to 37 bushels a year ago. The total production in the state will be about 195 million bushels as compared with 262 million last year.

Small Grain Production Down 9-12 Percent

The 1953 production of oats, barley, and grain sorghums will be below average by 9, 20 and 12 per cent respectively. Rust and wet weather during harvest cut the yield of oats, barley in several important states. The acreage of grain sorghums is up one-third from last year. While yield prospects for this crop improved somewhat during August and September, the expected yield in Nebraska remains considerably below average.

Pastures continued in poor condition in much of the country in September and were especially short in Nebraska, the Southwest, the Southern Corn Belt and Virginia. Moisture is badly needed in Nebraska if winter wheat is to provide much pasture this fall. Only the northwestern and north-central parts of this state had adequate pasture as September ended.

The United States hay crop of about 105 million tons is one of the largest on record but supplies will be short in dry areas. The third cutting of alfalfa was very light in Nebraska. Total hay production is down about a half million tons from last year.

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Oakland Edges Wayne High, 13-6, for Playoff Crown

Blue Devils Without Two Regulars

Oakland's speedy Vikings took the Husker conference playoff crown back to the east division Friday night, edging Wayne's Blue Devils 13-6 in the annual playoff game at Memorial stadium.

Wayne, playing without two of its regular backs, had no match for the speed of Ron Kohlmeier and Stan Johnson. The Blue Devils were without Fullback Larry Hofeldt, who broke a collarbone in the Wisner game, and Halfback Larry Johnson, who was nursing a sore leg.

The score is a good indication of the difference between the two teams, although Wayne made two touchdowns which were halted inside the Oakland 15 yard line.

Oddly enough, Oakland marched for its two scores after each of these Wayne threats.

Early in the second quarter, Wayne drove to the Oakland eight, but a fourth down pass was incomplete and the Vikings took over. Eleven plays later Wayne trailed 7-0 as Frank Stanton flipped a screen pass to Johnson and the speedy fullback raced 39 yards to the Wayne end zone. Johnson added the extra point with a smash over the right tackle.

81-Yard March

Oakland got its second touchdown on the second play of the fourth quarter with Stanton hitting Wendell Hansen with a seven-yard pass for the tally. The pass capped an 81-yard march. Kohlmeier's plunge at left tackle was short on the extra point try.

Wayne fought back scrappily and drove to a touchdown with the following kickoff. Rod Tietzort ran the kickoff back 27 yards to his own 43 and the Blue Devils drove 37 yards in 11 plays.

The touchdown came on fourth down when Tietzort flipped a perfect strike to Dick Longe in the end zone. Gordon Zapp's try for the point hit the upright and bounced back so the score remained 13-6.

Fumbles were disastrous for the Blue Devils. Oakland prevented a Wayne touchdown late in the first quarter when the Vikings recovered Tietzort's fumble on their own 18. Wayne had marched 67 yards for six first downs in the march.

Early in the third quarter, Wayne drove to the Oakland 13 but lost the ball on downs when an end run resulted in a six-yard loss. It was at these points that the Blue Devils missed the plunging power of Hofeldt.

Stiff Battle

Wayne put up one of its stiffest battles despite being outmanned. Gilbert Schmidt had one of his finest nights defensively. Three times he broke through to nail Viking backs for losses. Bob Likes also contributed some bruising tackles.

Neil Palmer tried to take up some of the slack in the backfield by giving his best running performance of the season. He also was a workhorse defensively. Lowell Johnson sparked the Wayne forward wall, despite having been in bed with flu most of the day.


