Commodity Briefs

Cattle Prices Steady

Prices of high quality slaughter cattle have remained steady the past month. Prices are not expected to weaken very much the coming month. The U.S.D.A. has announced that it expects that CATTLE PRICES HAVE REACHED THEIR LOW MARK GENERALLY EXCEPT FOR SHORT SEASONAL FLUCTATIONS AND BUNCHING OF RECEIPTS. Feeder prices have also remained steady.

Hogs . . .

Prices appear to have passed their seasonal high and to be entering the lower phase which may continue for the remainder of the year, though averaging higher than last year. Indications still are that about 5% fewer pigs will be farrowed this fall.

Wheat . . .

Rains and snows the past two weeks over most of the state have improved Nebraska's winter wheat.

Economic Situation Optimistic

The national economy passed another production peak in the April - June quarter of 1953.

National disposable income is at a record level at a rate of \$288 billion dollars. Consumer credit stands at slightly over \$27 billion dollars, but is being paid off faster than new debts are being created — the bulk of consumer credit outstanding is for automobiles. Personal savings are a huge backlog against adversity

- they are up 20% from 1946.

Since the April - June quarter, business activity has generally leveled out except for three rather important segments. Steel is operating at 90% of capacity, new home construction is down 25% and about 5% less is being spent for plant expansion and for equipment. General business activity is expected to ease off from 5 to 10% during the coming year.

Adjustments Open To Dairy Farmers

Prices received this year for dairy products have been considerably below those of last year. Dairy farmers are seeking for adjustments which will bring greater returns from the dairy enterprise and the farm business as a whole. This is especially true of the grade "C" milk producers. About 4,000 of these Nebraska farmers have lost or are losing the market for their product.

There are a number of alternative enterprises which these farmers may consider. Many will change to cream production and feed the skim milk to livestock. The sale of cream and use of skim milk, under a good livestock management program, will bring a return to the farmer very close to that received for grade "C" milk.

Difficulty of Shifting to Grade "A"

Other farmers are making arrangements to convert to grade "A" milk production. Many tenants have difficulty in meeting these requirements because the landlord may not wish to make the necessary changes in permanent equipment on the farm.

This alternative grade "A" production will provide the greatest returns per man hour if the dairy operator can keep the conversion costs within reasonable limits. Conversion costs should remain under \$150 per cow.

Farmers contemplating grade "A" conversion have two alternatives in meeting this figure. They must find ways to reduce conversion tosts or they will have to increase cow numbers in order to justify a greater expense.

The initial cost of a milking parlor and milk room will be about the same for a herd of six cows as for a herd of twenty or more cows. If the cost of conversion to grade "A" is kept under \$150 per cow, the additional returns received for grade "A" over grade "C" milk will come close to meeting conversion costs the first twelve to eighteen months.

Study Other Cropping – Livestock Enterprises

Those farmers who do not have a fluid milk market may find greater man hour returns in other enterprises. On some farms the poultry project can be easily expanded. Poultry marketing specialists expect the price of commercial broilers and eggs to hold up well in the months ahead

Many farms have facilities for raising hogs. This enterprise can be expected to increase on some farms so as to utilize skim milk and other farm feeds. The market price of hogs continues to be encouraging.

The tendency to change to a beef cattle enterprice has slowed down somewhat. The price of beef cattle has been discouraging. Some farms which have large acreages of rough land in hay and pastures will probably show more profit with a beef enterprise on a long range basis.

A few farmers may change from dairy to a cash crop enterprise. Acreage allotments have been voted on wheat and may appear on other grains. Some farmers may try some other cash crop on those extra acres such as legume and grass for hay or seed.

Fluid Milk Consumption Constant

Most dairy farmers can increase their present returns by taking advantage of certain peculiarities of the milk market.

The fluid milk production-sales pattern for the last four years shows that the consumption of fluid milk in Nebraska has remained quite constant. (According to about 80% of the fluid milk market in Nebraska.) There is generally a slight decrease in consumption during the vacation months of June, July and August. Fluid milk production is much more erratic. Extreme surpluses develop in March, April, May, June and July and deficits in September, October, November and December.

Feed Supplies Ample Despite Drought

feed supplies will be generally adequate throughout the country during the coming winter despite the drought which seriously reduced crop production in some areas, including Nebraska. Damage was severe in some areas but, as the harvest progressed, was less than expected.

Bad weather tends to get considerable publicity, good weather elsewhere does not make the news. The favorable growing conditions tend to offset the unfavorable ones. This is, of course, little consolation to farmers in the drought-affected

Feed Supplies Ample

The total feed grain production for 1953 has been estimated at 118 million tons by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This is less than in five of the last seven years but is more than the usual amount consumed by livestock. In addition to this year's production, large carryovers assure an ample supply for the livestock to be fed this fall and winter. Dry, hot weather in the Corn Belt in August and

September has reduced the corn trop by about 115 million bushels since August 1 but corn production will still be the fifth largest in history, about 3.2 billion bushels. Most of the decline occurred in Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas. where the drought continued throughout September. In Nebraska, the average yield of corn is expected to be about 27 bushels per acre this year compared to 37 bushels a year ago. The total production in the state will be about 195 million bushels as compared with 262 million last year.

Small Grain Production Down 9-12 Percent

The 1953 production of oats, barley, and grain sorghums will be below average by 9, 20 and 12 per cent respectively. Rust and wet weather during harvest cut the yield of oats, barley in several important states. The acreage of grain sorghums is up one-third from last year. While yield prospects for this crop improved somewhat during August and September, the expected yield in Nebraska remains considerably below average.

Pastures continued in poor condition in much of the country in September and were especially short in Nebraska, the Southwest, the Southern Corn Belt and Virginia. Moisture is badly needed in Nebraska if winter wheat is to provide much pasture this fall. Only the northwestern and north-central parts of this state had adequate pasture as September ended.

The United States hay crop of about 105 million tons is one of the largest on record but supplies will be short in dry areas. The third cutting of alfalfa was very light in Nebraska. Total hay production is down about a half million tons from last year.
