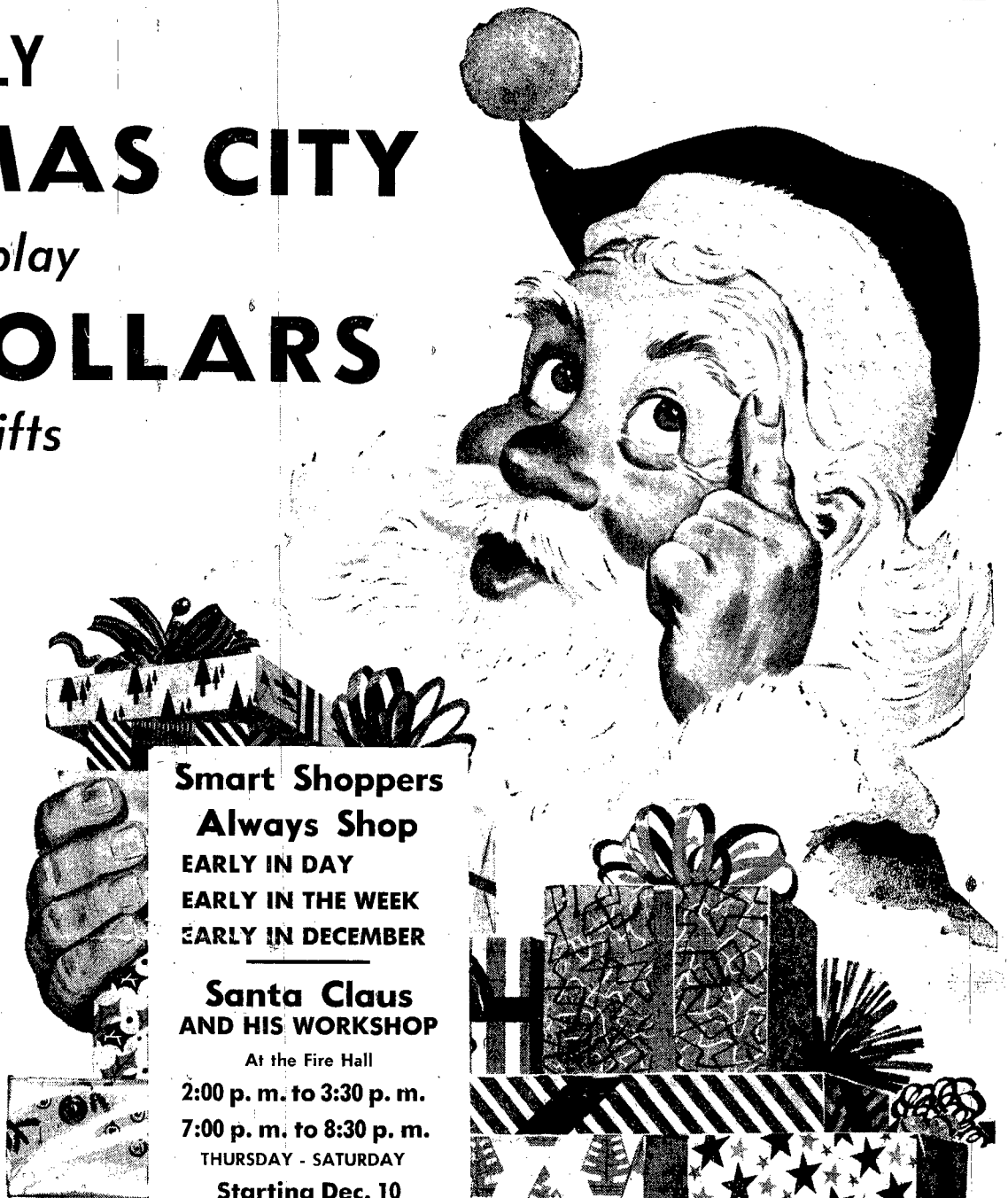

THOSE SECONDS YOU SAVE?

If you think you can save time speeding within Wayne's city limits, pick up a pencil and paper and use a little of the old arithmetic.

Giving the Chamber of Commerce the benefit of the doubt, assume that it is roughly a mile and a half from the northeast to the southwest corner of the city. Driving a moderate 20 miles an hour you can cover that distance in four and a half minutes.

At 40 miles per hour, you should be able to do it twice as quickly. Why, that's more than two minutes less than it takes at a sensible 20, you say. But just a minute.

You've got to slow down for corners and allow for traffic signals. To be sure, this will add time to the 20-mile-per-hour tip. Proportionately, however, it stacks more time on the death-flirting 40-mile-per-hour hop across town. And it reduces the time saved to seconds.

And does not have seconds occasionally come at a dear price. Playing children being what they are, no driver should start through Wayne's streets without rehearsing in his mind what he would do if a youngster suddenly scampered into the road.

At 20, in all probability you could stop before hitting the tot, or at least reduce speed enough to avoid injuring him seriously.

At 40—and all too many motorists speed along city streets that fast—you

chances of avoiding the child narrow to about one in a million. In most of the other 999,999 instances, the results would be heartbreaking tragedy that would ride with you the rest of your life.

Are the seconds you possibly might save worth it?

15 Years Ago

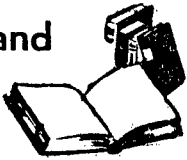

Road Improvement

Slowdown Seen From New Ruling

A slowdown instead of speedup of improvement of Nebraska's worst roads is in prospect as a result of opposition to the relocation of the Wayne-Wakefield highway which resulted in an attorney general's opinion confining relocation to roads designated as state highways by the Legislature, it became apparent Tuesday.

State Engineer L. N. Ross announced that at least five planned projects for the present biennium will be dropped. Included in addition to the Wayne-Wakefield section on Route No. 35 are:

Paving on No. 2 between Lincoln and Bennet.

Extension of improvement of U.S. No. 83 between North Platte and McCook. The department has already completed 12 miles south of North Platte through the agricultural experiment station and planned to extend it south to Maywood.

Rebuilding of the Big Springs junction with U.S. 30.

Center street relocation at Elkhorn river west of Omaha.

The governor and Engineer Ross were also bothered by the maintenance implication in the attorney general's opinion. The question as to whether the state can continue to spend money to maintain federal aid routes not on the designated state system will be asked in a request for further opinion.

Attorney Charles Ledwith of Lincoln announces that he plans to start court action to prevent the proposed relocation of No. 50 near Weeping Water in Cass county. Amendments made in the highway laws at the last session of the Legislature "eliminated" federal" roads which the state was previously authorized to relocate.

Nebraska Road Block

Editorial Reprinted from Lincoln Star, Nov. 23, 1953.

With the day dawn in Nebraska when Nebraskans are willing to turn the job of highway building involving both location and relocation of roads over to the people who know most about it?

Those people are engineers. Engineering is their daily life, their bread and butter.

The better the engineering, the greater the service, and in a state where every penny available for highway construction should return its greatest value surely there is something to be said for giving the engineer greater leeway in determining where and how highways shall be built to provide maximum service for the people who pay for them. Nebraska, for some reason, has not done this in the correct, full freedom or authority he needs for his best work.

That, unfortunately, is part of the explanation of the present muddle in which Nebraska finds itself, a muddle which may disrupt a painstaking highway system which is embodied in part of a two-year

Missouri 0-205 Oats Available

We have been advised that over 100,000 bushels of certified Missouri 0-205 oats are grown by Nebraska farmers in 1953. This seed is well distributed throughout the state, some of it growing in Wayne and each of the adjoining counties. It is apparent that there is no need to pay exorbitant prices for tested certified varieties available at reasonable prices.

A complete listing of all certified seed producers is available at the Extension office of the courthouse. How to Share Commercial Fertilizer Costs

A common question which comes to us is what arrangements are fair to the renter and owner when commercial fertilizers are purchased? The most common practice is that the landlord and tenant share the costs in the same proportion as they share the crop. However, it should be kept in mind that the usual recommendations for the application of lime and phosphate are in amounts sufficient to last for several years. A tenant should not be expected to pay for these long term applications if he has no assurance of staying on the

the farm until they have been used up.

Amount of Feed Required
Four year tests at the North Platte Experiment Station involving 81 head of Holstein steers have shown the feed requirement from birth to slaughter at 1,000 lbs. as follows: whole milk 260 lbs., meat scrap 61 lbs., oil meal 160 lbs., corn 2,040 lbs., oats 263 lbs., alfalfa 1,511 lbs., silage 5,200 lbs. and pasture days 200. The selling price of these steers was approximately \$3 per cwt. under the practical milk test for steers of their weight.

Using current feed prices and estimating other costs, the practicability of developing Holstein of similar type steers can probably be determined by the individual operator.

4-H Exhibitors Limited to Five
A recent rule adopted in Nebraska limits the number of marketable calves to be tagged for sale to five head. Additional calves may be fed for pen studies such as the class for pen of two AK-SAR-BEN but will not be tagged and are not eligible for individual showing.

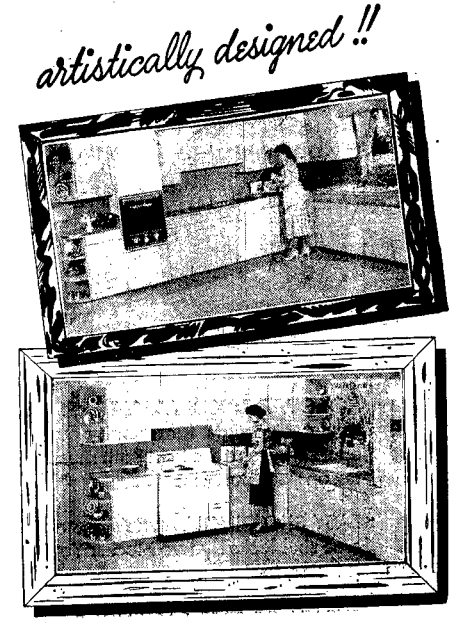

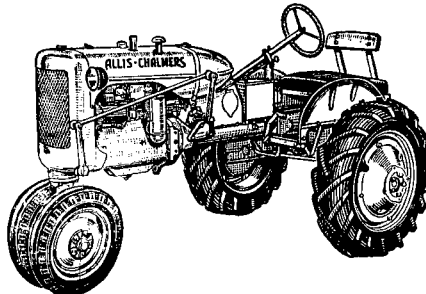

That burning cob pile is about to disappear, because industry is finding new uses for our cobs. For many years the disposal of cobs after shelling has been a problem. They have served as winter fuel on the farm and have been made into pipes and chicken litter. But these and other uses have drained off only a small part of the cobs produced every year in the United States. Most cobs have been burned in the pile.

In recent years scientists have studied the physical and chemical properties of the cob and have devised workable ways to employ this farm by-product. It now appears that the farmer may sometime realize a profit from his cob pile.

During World War II the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Northern Regional Research Laboratory, working with the Navy, developed a method of grinding the woody ring portion of cobs. The product is a soft grit which is used for the blast cleaning of materials that would be damaged by more abrasive grits.

The Chemurgy department at the Nebraska Experiment station has developed a process for producing a flour of very fine particles from the woody ring of cobs. The flour may be used as a diluent for insecticides, grain protectants, herbicides, and other powdered products. The new process allows for the first time, the production of this cob flour at a reasonable cost and without the fire hazard that is inherent in other methods of grinding.

Many other uses have been found for the soft grit material made from cobs. Grits of various textures are used for fur cleaning, burnishing and polishing, and as absorbents and driers, abrasives for hand soaps, conditioners for foundry sands, and fillers in explosives and plastics. Many cob grinding plants have been built in the past two years. One of these is the Siegrist Industries plant at Aurora.

User As Animal Feed

Corn cobs, as a part of ground corn meal, have had a limited use in animal feeds for many years. Recently there has been an emphasis on the use of ground cobs as roughage feed for cattle on both wintering and fattening rations. During the past year many hundreds of tons of ground cobs were used as the basic ingredient in mixed feeds for cattle. Since cobs contain little or no digestible protein or carotene and are low in essential minerals, their successful use requires careful attention to supplying these nutrients.

Furfural from Cobs

Chemically the cob is a carbohydrate-type material made up of carbon, hydrogen and oxygen compounds—largely cellulose, lignin, pentosans and related substances. There is a small amount of proteinaceous material. The pentosans, which make up 35 to 40 per cent of the cob, are easily converted to furfural by hydrolysis with sulfuric acid.

In the mid-twenties, the Quaker Oats company developed not only the hydrolysis process for producing furfural from oat hulls but also the major market for the chemical—namely as a solvent to extract

unwanted substances from petroleum.

Later it was found that cobs could be used in the process and now nearly the entire furfural production comes from cobs. Because of the increased use of furfural in recent years, the Quaker Oats company established a new plant at Omaha in addition to its plants at Memphis, Tenn., and Cedar Rapids, Ia. Total consumption of these plants is about 600,000 tons of cobs annually.

Leptospirosis Offers Threat To Swine Herds

A disease which has been a serious threat to cattle in recent years has been causing swine losses in the midwestern "hog belt," the American Foundation for Animal Health said today.

Foundation officials reported laboratory tests proved definitely that the disease, leptospirosis, has caused breeding failures in midwestern herds. The disease organism has been isolated in several cases of swine abortion.

Leptospirosis Offers Threat To Swine Herds

Leptospirosis may cause fever, abortions, loss of appetite, jaundice, anemia, abnormal milk and reduced milk flow in swine. When leptospirosis is suspected, the Foundation added, an accurate diagnosis is needed to make sure other types of infection are not causing the losses.

Veterinarians report that treatment is successful in some instances. Control measures to prevent further spread of the infection include immediate isolation of all swine which lose their pigs, and burning or burial of all infected matter.

Swine which recover from the disease apparently are immune to further attacks, officials said, but they may remain as carriers, furnishing a potential source of new infection. Blood tests can be used to detect infected or exposed animals.

The foundation also warned farmers to make sure infected hogs are kept from contact with other herds because the disease may be transmitted from hogs to earth. It likewise presents a public health problem because the disease may be transmitted to human beings also.

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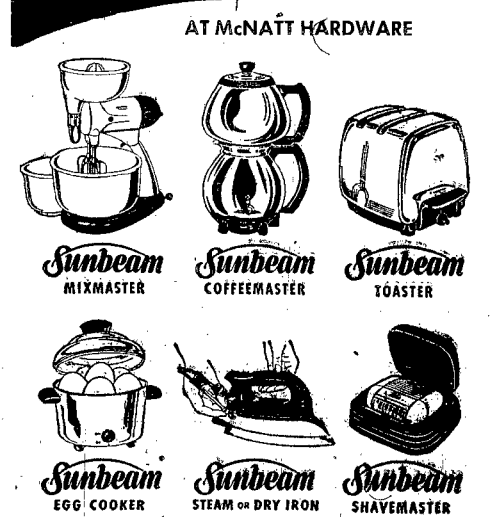

Fall Pig Crop May Be Hurt by Enteritis Attack

Midwestern hog raisers have been warned to be alert now for outbreaks of necrotic enteritis which can take a heavy toll of fall pigs if it is not checked.

The American Foundation for Animal Health said fall and early winter months are the danger season for this disease, often called "necro". The disease seems to strike especially in herds where young pigs are raised on the same ground year after year.

The first signs of the disease may be scours, lack of appetite and a rise in temperature, the Foundation said, sometimes the disease may resemble cholera

outbreaks or other acute diseases in the early stages. The Foundation said farmers noting such symptoms should obtain a diagnosis immediately because a wrong treatment for the disease could be "disastrous".

Failure to recognize the disease may enable it to spread quickly through the herd, the Foundation said, while the wrong home treatment might increase the losses.

"A good sanitation program and nutrition are the best insurance against necrotic enteritis losses," Foundation officials stated.

The Foundation said affected pigs may be treated with good results if the disease is diagnosed in time.

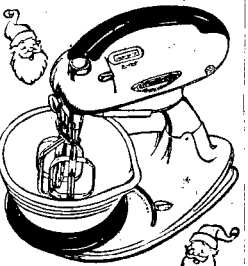

Christmas Gifts Not Different

Though rocket ships and jet planes have replaced hobby horses and dolls all have "real" hair that can be curled, there's basically little difference between the toys that will delight young Nebraskans next Christmas and those which brought special joy from their grandparents when they were children.

The toy display in the State Historical society's museum in the state capitol, indicates that little girls in grandmother's time played with dolls of all shapes, sizes and kinds — just as little girls of today do — ranging from the finest porcelain to home-made dolls. One doll in the collection was brought by a Union soldier to his daughter when he came from the Civil War. Another, with a home-made body, was given a little girl in Pekin, Illinois, in 1881. Later, when the family emigrated to Buffalo County, Nebraska, the treasured doll came along.

Then there is Gertrude Eaton's charming little doll of the 1880's, which has blonde mohair hair and a complete wardrobe to place in her stylish trunk. Dollies rode in carriages, just like little brother and sister. One very attractive doll, gummy, dating from the late Seventies, has tin-plate metal bound wheels used before the advent of rubber tires.

For playing house, Grandma had doll quilts, metal beds, toy iron and trivets, cradles, and tiny tables. Perfect for a tea party were the delicate Lowestoft doll dishes from the Gibson collection. The handle-less cups indicate that they date from the early 19th century. They were brought to Nebraska from New England after the Civil War.

Grandma would have been delighted, as a little boy, to have the hobby horse purchased in Hebron in 1893 for Dr. R. D. Green. The perky little horse, just recently added to the Museum's collection has metal stirrups and a realistic mane and tail.

Other toys for boys in the display include marbles of all sizes, jack knives, blocks, a hand-carved saw that can be pulled on wheels, ice skates. There also is a set of hand-carved jack straws, dating from the 1860's, a red "Patron" sled, a miniature horse, sleigh and riders.

One of the most prized gifts in the days before the movies and television was the magic lantern with its many colored slides of wonderful scenes from all over the world. The historical society is anxious to add to its collection of pioneer toys, particularly would like to acquire early toy stoves, engines, trains, cannons, mechanical birds, and a little red wagon. If you have any of these — or home-made toys of any type — write Marvin F. Kist, Director of the Museum. That toy on your list may help fill a gap in this interesting and growing collection.

ASC Making Corn Acreage Survey; May Use Allotments

Committee Seeks Three Year Figures

Preparations are under way in Wayne county for possible corn acreage allotments in 1954. Thomas P. Roberts, county ASC (former) PMA committee chairman, said this week.

A farm-to-farm canvass is being made to determine acreages devoted to each crop in 1951, 1952 and 1953. Community ASC committee members are conducting the county-wide study.

Because the figures for each farm in the county must be assembled by December 15, farmers are urged to have the information ready to avoid delay when the ASC committee calls.

Last used in '50

Acreage allotments were last imposed for corn in 1950. Plans for assembling the necessary information are in line with the recent announcement of the U. S. Department of Agriculture that there will be no marketing quotas for the 1954 corn crop but that under mandatory provisions of present laws, acreage allotments probably will be proclaimed later for all commercial corn producing areas, including Wayne county.

Final decision on corn acreage allotments for next year's crop will be made when more is known about the effect of drought on the supply and prospective demand.

The law directs that the decision must be made prior to Feb. 1, 1954.

The opinion, written by Assistant Attorney General Ralph E. Nelson, says maintenance expenditures for non-statutory roads, of which Highway 35 is one, cannot be made from gas tax funds or motor vehicle registration fees.

Effect of this ruling would be to stop all maintenance on nearly 2,000 miles (about 20 percent) of the state's highway system. In addition to Highway 35, it would affect Highway 29 between South Sioux City and O'Neill.

Attorney General Clarence Beck pointed out that the counties might maintain the sections of the road involved in the new opinion.

However, Wayne County Commissioner Emil Meyer, in whose district Highway 35 lies, said Wednesday, "To my knowledge, we have no authority to take over maintenance of Highway 35. It has been maintained as a state highway and has never been designated as a county road."

Meyer said he has approximately 250 miles of roads in his district at the present time. Maintenance costs average about \$200 per mile per year, he added. During the past year, Meyer will receive about \$100,000 exclusive of gas tax funds and license fees, for road work.

During the 1952-53 fiscal year, Wayne county received approximately \$72,000 from gas taxes and license fees. Under the new ruling, none of these monies could be used for Highway 35 maintenance.

State capital observers immediately expressed the belief that a special session of the legislature is inevitable.

Gov. Robert Crochy refused immediate comment on the situation and said he could study it and determine what he can do by administrative processes. He added, however, that he could not deny that a special session may be necessary. He termed the opinion "critically important."

Consideration in case a special session is called may also be given to taxation law changes.

bow and arrow. The arrow he shot into her heart. All the males in the tribe then let fly, shooting arrows into the victim.

The diorama shows the sacrifice about to begin. It is based on an actual ceremony witnessed by missionaries in the Loup valley. Human sacrifice was rare among the North American Indians, but it is reported that the ceremony depicted in the diorama was performed in Nebraska as late as 1836.

The ceremony, of course, was all a part of the highly developed religion of the Pawnee. The greatest god of the Pawnee was Tirawa, creator of the universe. Below him were a great many gods varying in importance. They were divided into two great classes: Those of the earth and those of the heavens. Those of the earth were usually identified with animals while those of the heavens were visualized as stars. Most important of the two was the morning star and the evening star from whom all life on earth has sprung. And it was to the morning star that this sacrifice was offered.

The ceremony depicted in the diorama, though offensive in the extreme in the modern eye, is a grim and realistic reminder of the great progress civilization has made here in Nebraska and the West during the brief period of white occupation.

Nebraska Senators.

One of the most colorful and controversial careers in the history of public life was that of Kenneth S. Wherry. United States senator from 1948 to his death in 1951.

Sen. Wherry was born at Liberty in Gage county, Feb. 28, 1892. That year his family moved to Pawnee City, and the firm of Wherry Brothers was established there.

Young Ken was educated at the Pawnee City high school, the University of Nebraska, where he received his B.A. in 1914, and Harvard University. During World War I he served in the Naval Air Corps.

After the war he returned to Pawnee City to join the firm of Wherry Brothers, which had established branch offices at Wynome and Humboldt. During the years 1918-30 Wherry was especially active in the sales and distribution of automobiles and implements, in the furniture and undertaking business and in livestock and farming operations. He was a licensed embalmer and funeral director in Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa and Missouri.

One of Wherry's early interests was the Pawnee County Agricultural society and from 1927 he served as president of that organization, assuming leadership in forming the local Pawnee County fair and stock show.

He was a member of the Pawnee City council for two terms, serving the second term as mayor. He was elected to the state senate in 1928 and served two terms in the body.

Wherry's initial efforts in politics on a state-wide basis were not particularly successful. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the Republican nomination for governor in 1932 and for the nomination for United States senator in 1934. He was an active member of the Republican State Central committee, however, served as president of State Rounders day in 1937, and was chosen Republican state chairman in 1939, a post he held until 1942.

As state chairman, Wherry rapidly made a name for himself and soon became known as one of the nation's most effective political party leaders. In 1941-42 he served as western director for the Republican National committee in 22 states west of the Mississippi River.

Defeated, Norris

His great opportunity came in 1942 when he was given the Republican nomination for United States Senate. George W. Norris, 81 years old, was running as an independent for his sixth term. Foster May, Omaha radio announcer, received the Democratic nomination. Though Norris and May together polled more votes than Wherry, the Republican nominee had a comfortable margin over Sen. Norris, who ran second.

Sen. Wherry's rise in the Senate was little short of meteoric. In 1944 he was named Republican Senate whip, and in 1949 Republican floor leader. He was re-elected easily to his second term in 1948, defeating Terry Carpenter.

Senator Wherry died of cancer and other complications in Washington D. C. Nov. 29, 1951. He was buried in the Pawnee City cemetery.
