Wayne County Old Age Rolls Show Decline

Wayne county old age assistance rolls dropped from 89 in September to 87 in October, the State Public Welfare board reported.

This statewide decline in the number of elderly persons receiving assistance, Nebraska's totals for October was the lowest since the program reached full swing in 1936.

Prosperity plus increasing numbers receiving Social Security benefits were listed as two major causes of the decline.

Despite the drop in recipients, expenditures for Wayne county increased from \$4,474.26 in September to \$4,771 in October, the state report showed. This was due to exceptionally large medical outlays, said Mrs. Helen Wischhoff, county assistance director.

In other assistance categories listed on the report, recipient totals remained stable. Aid to dependent children payments totaling \$48,135 were made in October for 13 children, while the September amount was \$330.25.

Two blind persons received \$169.40 in October, compared with \$120.80.

Christmas Mail to Reach Peak Here Friday--Steele

Outgoing Christmas mail will reach its peak Friday or Saturday at the Wayne postoffice, Postmaster J. J. Steele predicted today.

He added that incoming mail will probably be at its highest point Monday or Tuesday. In 1952, the local office handled approximately 13,000 pieces of mail on the Monday before Christmas to set a new record. It is doubtful if this record will be topped next week as most local patrons have followed early mailing suggestions, Steele said.

Monday postoffice employees cancelled 9,000 cards and this figure was upped to 11,000 Tuesday. A record 120 sacks of parcel post were dispatched Monday.

As the time becomes shorter and volume reaches its peak, chances for delivery for Christmas diminish. In this connection, Steele urged the public to inquire about services such as special handling, special delivery and particularly airmail.

A picture of the brisk business at the local office is given by the volume of mail handled in the 15-day pre-Christmas period last year. During that time more than 100,000 pieces of mail were cancelled here.

Steele urged again that the public take particular care in addressing and wrapping their packages and cards properly.

'Competitor Across Street is Your Best Friend'—Reid Says

Cramer Stuck For Dinner Tab Friday

Your best friend is the man across the street in the same business as yours, the annual meeting of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce was told Friday night.

Some might call the man across the street a competitor, admitted the speaker, Don Reid, managing director of the Iowa Press association.

But with the mobility of today's auto-borne shopper, he asserted, Wayne merchants' competition lies in Norfolk, Sioux City and Omaha—not across the street. Reid advised chamber members to work wholeheartedly together to make Wayne a better place to trade and a better place to live.

With 134 persons present, the session was one of the best-attended in chamber history. This forced Herald Publisher Mark Cramer to pick up the tab for the dinner. Confident that fewer than 100 would attend, Cramer had ordered to foot the bill if attendance exceeded that figure.

Much Fury Leaves But Little Snow

High winds swept across Wayne county Sunday, accompanied by intermittent snow flurries. At times, it appeared that a blizzard might develop. However, only a trace of snow fell.

Tuesday night as the temperatures dropped so did about a half-inch of snow. Archie L. Wert estimated the snow contained about .02 of an inch of moisture, sending the 1953 Wayne total to 24.30 inches. This is nearly an inch more than the 23.45 total for all of 1952.

Officers from nearby counties, he said, have reported that groups of "pretty well organized" forgers are working in the area. So far, he added, there have been no indications that the group has victimized Wayne county businessmen.

However, McDermott said that a woman who gave a Norfolk address has passed several worthless checks in the county during the fall.

This time of year, the county attorney explained, conditions are ideal for bad-check artists. Merchants generally are extremely busy and therefore sometimes are not as careful about cashing checks as during seasons when business is slower.

McDermott said he had heard that the organized forgers operating in nearby areas resort to such practices as having checks printed bearing the name of some non-existent company, for example a construction company. Then, checks that appear to be payroll checks are written.

Among the unusual occurrences in the bad-check line recently, he said, happened to a Winside firm. The firm's name was forged on a check that was cashed in Norfolk and about the same time someone came to the firm's place of business and cashed a worthless check.

Ouch! Income Tax Time is Here Again

Let's face it! Income tax time is here again. The deadline is particularly close for you farmers. Individuals who derive at least two-thirds of their gross income from farming should file an income tax return by Jan. 31, 1954 or file a declaration of estimated tax by Jan. 15, according to an announcement by Internal Revenue officials, this week.

If the declaration of estimated taxes is filed, farmers then have until March 15 to fill their final return. Those who file their return and pay the tax before Jan. 31 need not file a declaration.

In order to assist taxpayers in filing their 1953 returns, an Internal Revenue agent will be at the places listed below on the dates indicated:

- Wayne postoffice: Jan. 18-22, Mar. 8-12
- Pender courthouse: Jan. 14 and Mar. 8
- Pierce courthouse: Jan. 20 and Mar. 2
- West Point courthouse: Jan. 15

Owens Ends 50 Years with Railroad

Has Served Five Towns In Region

Tuesday marked the end of nearly half a century of railroad-ing in Northeast Nebraska for Arthur H. Owens, station agent here since 1935.

The veteran railroador said he viewed his retirement with mixed feelings of sadness and happiness.

Owens was only 20 when he began working July 7, 1904, for the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railway as a helper in the Tekamah station. He has been with the railroad ever since.

"Railroading," he said in an interview this week, "is less interesting today than it used to be." He attributed this to the fact that railroads now can haul more ton-

nage with fewer trains. "Fewer trains kind of dull interest."

Before he had been railroading a year and a half, Owens was promoted to telegraph operator, serving in that capacity until 1907 when he became station agent at Magnet.

Served Five Towns
Since then he has served as station agent in five communities—Carroll, Craig, Pender, Wakefield and Wayne.

Owens was born Feb. 28, 1884, in Burr county where his family farmed. When he was 5, they moved to Tekamah. He attended public school there and was graduated from Tekamah high. Nov. 24, 1906, he was married to Le-nora Vance at Tekamah. She died in 1939. Aug. 29, 1942, he and Alma Nye, Pender, were married.

He has three children, G. D. Owens, Arlington Heights, Ill.; Mrs. Ray Beeremann, Dakota City,

and D. V. Owens, Detroit, like his father a railroador. He is a member of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers and the Presbyterian church.

Mr. and Mrs. Owens plan to leave the first of the year for Florida where they will spend several months. Otherwise, Owens' retirement plans are indefinite.

J. J. Künzman, agent at Wakefield, succeeded Owens.

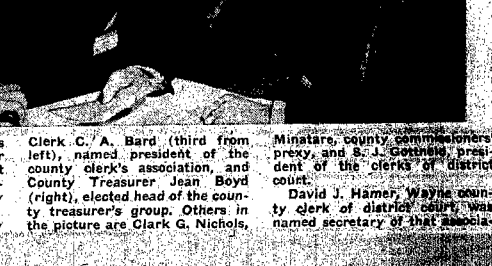

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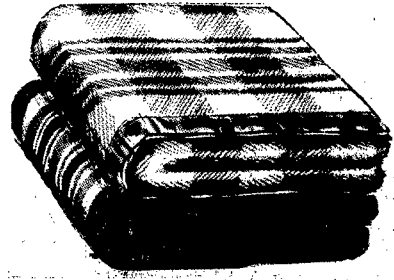

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A Judge Ruins His Career

For a classic example of the lack of elemental moral courage, consider for a minute the case of Omaha's pitiful Lester Palmer.

Involved in a relatively minor two-car collision Palmer, a traffic judge, preferred to attempt to conceal his act rather than face its momentarily embarrassing consequences.

Had he obeyed the laws he helped for so many years to enforce, Palmer would have stopped at the accident scene and made the necessary reports to police officials. This doubtless would have led to a brief news story headed something like this:

Traffic Judge In 2-Car Crash

Naturally, there would have been some embarrassment. But the matter soon would have been forgotten.

Americans are an understanding lot. While demanding (but not always getting) complete honesty and moral courage from public servants, the public realizes that holding of public office does not insure a person against the same problems that befall everyone else. And one of those problems is auto accidents.

While a few less considerate individuals might have ridiculed Palmer, we believe most of the public would have taken an "It could have happened to anyone" attitude.

But all this is conjecture. Palmer did not immediately comply with the law. He went to astonishing lengths to try to conceal his part in the accident. By his actions he robbed himself of any qualifications for further service on the bench, or elsewhere in public office.

15 Years Ago

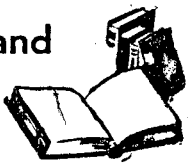

Economy Beef Cuts—Good Buy

We often hear the complaint that despite the drop in cattle prices good steak is still selling for 1.00 a pound. The fact that more customers have been switching to the comparatively few fancy cuts has created a demand that has kept price on these cuts relatively high. At the same time this switch in demand has resulted in the point where they are definitely a best buy.

The yield of salable retail cuts of the various kinds from a 1000-lb. choice steer is approximately 448 lbs. divided as follows: Fancy steaks, 30 lbs.; other steaks and roasts, 118 lbs.; medium priced cuts, 111 lbs.; and economy cuts, 185 lbs.

All of the cuts from a beef carcass must move over the retail counter at about the same rate. The best method of insuring complete clearance is through adjusting prices. The spread in prices between economy and fancy cuts today is far greater than normal. Soybean Acreage Increased

Nebraska farmers in the eastern third of the state and in the irrigated areas are showing increased interest in developing part of their acreage to soybeans. The average acreage was 108,000 with average yield of 19 bu. Replacing a portion of the normal oat acreage with soybeans is steadily gaining favor. Hawkeye has been the most popular variety grown in this area.

Early Chicks Best
By ordering flock replacement chicks now for delivery in January or February, such early chicks can be out of the way on range releasing the brooder house and equipment for other uses such as a broiler or capon project, turkey poulters or as a swine farrowing house.

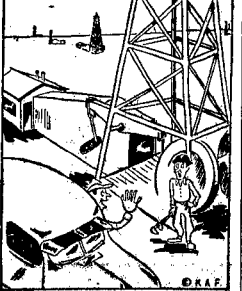
Starting the replacement pullets early has always been good sound management. Careful attention can be given the chicks during the brooding period because other farmwork is less pressing. The pullets will be out on range in late spring and early summer when high quality green feed is most available, resulting in maximum feed economy and pullet development.

Isolation of the young growing stock from old hens on the farm is the most important single disease control measure available to the flock owner. The habit of leaving the pullets in the brooder house and just letting them run around the farmstead, often mixing with the old hens, results in serious economic loss from disease.

A pullet range shelter placed on good range in isolation from other poultry is sound economical investment which needs to be made on thousands of Nebraska farms.

Meyer Hits 20 to Pace Big Victory

Accuracy at the free throw line paid off again for Wayne State's Wildcats Monday night at the city auditorium. Coach Chuck Obye's quint sank 14 of 15 gift tosses in the final quarter to down Omaha U's Indians, 85-77.

It was sweet revenge for the Wildcats. Omaha had beaten them 66-65 in an overtime tilt, which opened the season. Wayne now has a 2-2 record for the season.

Some dead-eye shooting by sophomore guard Dave Meyer, Wayne, highlighted the victory. Meyer dunked nine of 15 field goal attempts and led the Wayne scoring with 20 points. He was followed by Roger Higgins with 13 and Wayne Samuelson with 16.

Freshman Jim Whitney, Huntington, had a poor night from the field but he dunked seven straight free throws in the final period which enabled Wayne to pull away.

Except for a see-saw first quarter, Omaha led only twice, 43-42 and 54-52. The lead changed hands 11 times in the opening period. And the game was close throughout. Wayne's biggest advantage was a six-point spread at 52-46. Four times the teams were dead-locked in the last quarter.

Wayne got some nice relief work from Ed Wiedenfeld, who came in for Roger Higgins when the big center got his third foul in the second quarter.

Guards Big Factor
But the big factor in the Wayne victory was the ability of its guards to hit from the outside. Samuelson and Meyer collected more than half of the Wildcats' field goal production for the night.

Wayne hit on 39 percent of its shots for the tilt. Omaha could do no better than 31 percent. The teams both hit 30 fielders but Wayne collected 25 of 33 charity throws while Omaha was getting 17 of 26.

Stall Pays Off
The Wildcats began a semi-stall with 2:45 left in the game after Whitney sank two free throws to make it 77-75. The strategy paid off for Whitney dribbled in for a lay-up a minute later and made it 79-75. Claussen pulled the Indians within two points 10 seconds later by dropping in two free throws.

From there on it was all Wayne as the local lads stalled and forced the Indians to foul. Roger Miller hit two free throws and Whitney added four straight to make the final score 85-77.

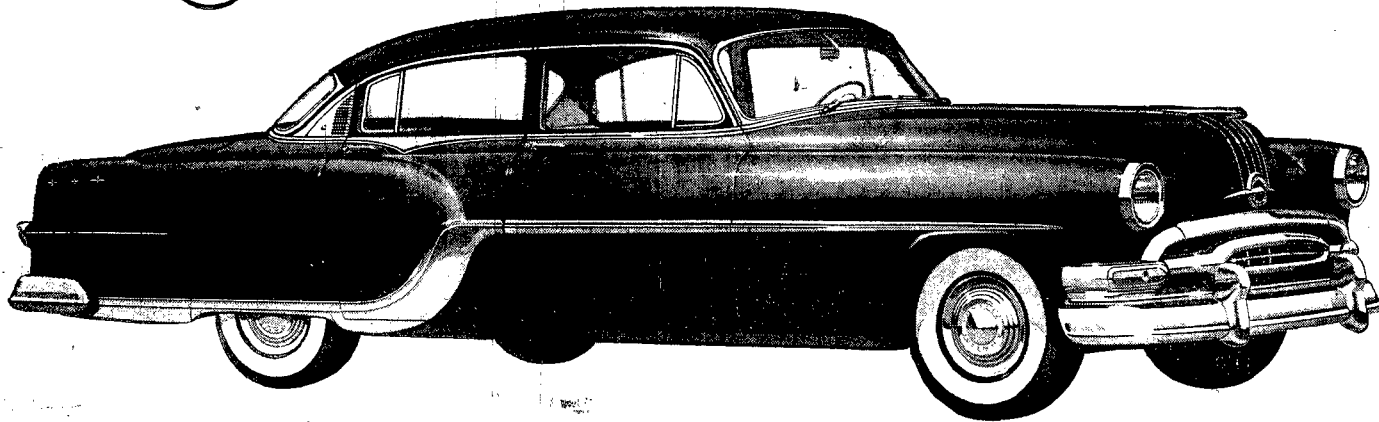

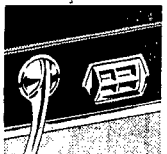

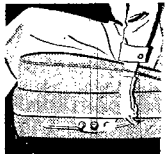
