### Bloodmobile Visit Here Suspended By Red Cross

There will be no more Red Cross bloodmobile visits to Wayne until further notice, Mrs. Ismael Hughes announced this week.

Mrs. Hughes, chairman of Wayne county Red Cross chapter's bloodmobile committee, said that a visit tentatively scheduled for March presumably would be cancelled due to a nationwide reduction in desirable blood collection quotas.

"Effective Feb. 1, 1954, Wayne county and other counties participating in the defense blood program will be placed on a standard basis and will not be scheduled periodically or regularly, as in the past," Dr. George L. Clark, Nebraska-Iowa regional blood program director, said in a letter to Mrs. Alfred Eddie, Wayne county Red Cross chairman.

In revealing the new policy to local Red Cross officials, Dr. Clark said that with the reduced quotas, sufficient blood probably could be "collected during the normal course of operations in regional chapters" without periodic bloodmobile visits to the various counties.

He urged all chapters affected by the change to retain their bloodmobile committees "should any local or national emergency arise." The regional director also thanked the Wayne chapter for its "instrumental" part in making the blood collection program "such a success."

### County Exceeds Quota for 1953 In U. S. Bonds

Wayne county had exceeded its Savings Bond quota for all of 1953 by the end of November. State Sales Director Leland R. Hall reported this week.

Purchases for the first 11 months, he said, totaled \$515,171.75, or 104 per cent of the county's quota. State-wide sales for the same period amounted to \$83,585,869.08, he said.

Percentages of the 1953 quota for some neighboring counties follow: Cedar, 128; Cummins, 148; Dixon, 118; Madison, 110; Pierce, 120; Stanton, 117; and Thurston, 110.

### 'THE SIGN OF PEACE'

The story is told of a family riding a crowded Christmas holiday train. It was a small family. There were only the father, the mother and their tiny baby. The father was a soldier and was carried up awkwardly in his chair sleeping soundly.

His infant son was sleeping, too, and he was curled up like his father, but gracefully in his mother's arms. Only the young mother was awake. And her eyes, though open, hung heavy with exhaustion.

Yet, they were eyes that told a story of peace. And why not? She could behold the handsomeness of her husband and his manliness, and she was grateful just to have him there. She could glance at the beauty of her baby son and love him for his gentleness. Her eyes shone with love. They were a true sign of peace to those who saw her.

**Mrs. Lou Owens Recalls Riding World's First Ferris Wheel in 1892**

A newspaper illustration Sunday reminded Mrs. Lou Owens, Wayne, of a ferris wheel ride taken more than 61 years ago.

And a memorable ride it was. Not only was the first ferris wheel the world's first, it has never again been equalled in size, according to the description accompanying the illustration.

The mammoth wheel was 256 feet high, nearly the length of a Wayne block. It carried 1,440 riders.

Instead of seats featured in most of the thousands of ferris wheels that have followed it, the giant original was surrounded with house-sized, cage-like structures in which the passengers rode.

Mrs. Owens recalls that the wheel's steel axle was two or three feet thick.

**Will Be 85 in February**

The wheel was built for the 1892 Chicago World's Fair. Mrs. Owens, who will be 85 next February 4, lived near Aurora, Ill., then and frequently went to Chicago, about 40 miles away. She moved to Nebraska in 1900.

## Giant boy

Recently, a group of scientists and engineers was asked to predict what's next.

Now that we have electrified farms, factories and homes, is that the end? The answer appears to be no, that the electrical industry is a "giant boy" with its great growth still ahead. Here are some of the predictions.

Take a personal thing first. Millions of homes will have heat pumps to heat and cool automatically—using electricity for fuel.

You can expect to cook food someday by electronics—in seconds. Electrical incinerators will consume your waste paper and waste food. Dust will be taken from the air electrically. The day may come when TV screens hang like pictures on the wall, with only a tiny wire to the set.

Nuclear fuels are on the timetable of the scientists. Energy from the atom will eventually be a major source of power, regardless of whether fossil fuels are seriously depleted. By century's end, most new plants generating electricity will operate with atomic (fission) fuel. Aircraft, battleships and the like will measure fuel consumption in grams.

Storing heat from the sun is another long-range project of scientists, with billions in savings as the potential result.

The year 2000 looks big and distant. Actually it is only 47 years away. By then, any puny prognostications made today will have been rewritten many times. But larger. Electricity has always been a field where each new fact generates many more things new. The years should be interesting to watch.

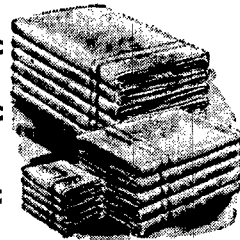

Most significant item gleaned from these results is the wide variation in yields between varieties in a single year. However, when averaged over a number of years the difference narrows rapidly which leads to the conclusion that seasonal variation affects varieties differently.

A 1953 test in Cedar county which included 24 state certified and experimental varieties showed a variation in yield between the best and poorest varieties of 39 bu. per acre.

The number of acres of state certified varieties grown is small as compared to the named commercial hybrid varieties but the test results obtained were typical. Selection of varieties which have proven consistent producers in an area is extremely important.

We hope to include several of the popular commercial hybrids in our corn test in 1954. The proper blending of all these factors: soil type, fertility, cultural practices, seed variety, planting date, moisture supply and seasonal variation are necessary for maximum corn yields.

Chances of matching these right is a little like hitting the jackpot on a slot machine. The big difference is that we have some choice in making decisions about most of the factors involved except the weather.

- Your decision on these factors is your best bet to get maximum yields.
1. Selection of best adapted varieties.
  2. An adequate fertilizer program.
  3. Increased planting rate.

**Hog Numbers Questionable**

Veteran hog producers are concerned about the reaction of the "in and out" hog producer to the presently improved market situation. They say that potential brood sows are selling at prices considerably higher than the market justified. Those familiar with hog production know that numbers can be built up fast and the market reacts violently to an over supply. A fairly stable market is dependent on moderate receipts distributed throughout the year.

Commercial farm managers and reliable long time operators agree that the safest, surest protection for the livestock producer is one which fits the kinds and numbers of stock to the average, feed supplies produced and to the labor and housing available on the individual farm. They advise against radical changes in operation and recommend a consistent and well planned program from year to year.

Some of the factors contributing to improvement in the hog market is the trend to meat type hogs, marketed at lighter weights, which results in less loss.
