Two Tutors To be Added To Faculty

Expansion of the curriculum and increased subject offerings for Wayne High school were approved Monday night by the school board at its regular meeting.

The expansion will necessitate the hiring of two additional instructors. Supt. E. W. Willert announced. The new courses will be added at the start of the 1954-55 school year.

Being offered for the first time will be consumer education, secretarial training, business training, journalism and debate. There will also be a revision of the American problems course.

The board also approved revision of the class schedule to accommodate an extra-curricular period from 3 to 4 p. m. daily. This will include band, which previously had juggled its schedule throughout the week.

Teachers to be hired for next year will include a man or woman for commercial subjects and a man for social science and junior high physical education.

Consumer education will follow courses in the handling of personal and business finances. Willert said. The secretarial training will include office practice, additional shorthand and typing, filing and bookkeeping.

Journalism and debate will be extra-curricular activities. Revision of the American problems course will follow recommendations of the state department of education.

Advancement Tests

Also approved Monday night was the administration of achievement tests to high school students. These tests were previously given only through the eighth grade. Only freshmen will receive the tests next year. Sophomores will be added in 1955-56 and juniors in 1956-57. The tests will allow individual students to advance at the national normal and also evaluate their own influences. Willert stated.

A new sick leave policy was also established by the board. Instructors will be entitled to no more than five days sick leave in any one school year. These may be accumulated for four years to a maximum of 20 days, but must be used exclusively for sickness and no other purpose.

The board can extend provisions of the policy in exceptional cases by majority vote.

Bank Deposits Hit Record in County Over \$10,000,000

Bank deposits in Wayne county totaled over \$10,000,000 December 31, an all-time high. Year-end statements of condition for all county banks appear in this week's Herald.

Assets of the five banks also were at record levels.

Those of State National Bank topped \$6,000,000 for the first time, and First National Bank's went over the \$3,000,000 mark, also for the first time.

Loan totals, however, were down somewhat, due primarily to the cattle market decline.

Here is a breakdown of assets, deposits and loans for each bank in the county:

State National Bank, \$6,066,110.27, assets; \$3,721,790.02, deposits and \$2,161,438.50, loans and discounts.

First National Bank, \$3,040,334.33, assets; \$2,809,357.02, deposits and \$836,700.18, loans and discounts.

Windsor State Bank, \$1,174,210.77, assets; \$1,043,436.44, deposits and \$387,647.30, loans and discounts.

Commercial State Bank of Hoskins, \$682,470.38, assets; \$583,376.45, deposits, and \$356,118.70, loans and discounts.

Farmers State Bank of Jordan, \$341,330.61, assets; \$293,946.60, deposits, and \$171,061.20, loans and discounts.

Truck, 10 Tons Hay Burn Northeast of Laurel

Fire, apparently caused by heat from flat tires, destroyed a 1950 model semi-trailer truck and 10 tons of baled hay early Saturday morning in the northeast of Laurel on Highway 20.

Walter Sickers, Ewing, owner and driver, had parked the truck beside the highway and gone to Ewing to get new tires to replace the flat ones. He was going home, he said, and was intensified when the gasoline tank exploded.

A mail truck driver discovered the fire and summoned Laurel firemen and State Highway Patrolman Clarence A. Yehew, Wayne.

By the time the owner returned to the scene, the truck and cargo had been destroyed.

\$300,000 in Construction During Year

Extensive building and remodeling highlighted 1953 as another good year for Wayne. Figures compiled by the Chamber of Commerce reveal today. Construction and remodeling totalled a conservative \$294,000.

The community added \$104,000 in residential housing during the year. Schools and churches constructed new buildings and needed work on another \$85,000. Commercial building and remodeling added another \$97,500.

First Methodist church completed construction of its new auditorium annex, conservatively estimated at \$75,000, and the new St. Mary's parochial school also completed. The school is valued at \$20,000.

Several business enterprises completed remodeling during the year. They include Melody Cleaners, McNamara's, New's Best, Franklin's, Auto Service, Jerry's, the Belbin's Pharmacy and Wayne Bakery. A new grocery store valued at \$10,000 was completed at Second and Main.

Ten new homes were constructed in the city during the year. Estimated cost of residential remodeling involved about \$12,000.

Construction and remodeling on the public campus required approximately \$80,000. This included construction of the administration industrial arts buildings and the addition and construction of a new home building on 10th and Main streets.

Record Highs

Water and electric consumption soared to new highs, city officials reported. Water consumption reached 134,512,000 gallons. City bus fares and residences used over 140 million kilowatts of electricity for the first time in history.

Over \$4,000 was spent by the city on the purchase of new equipment. See CITY REVIEW—page 6
