The Swimming Pool Problem

Talk of Wayne's need for a swimming pool is increasing.

Children talk about it, naturally. And so do those old enough to be their grandparents—persons who themselves probably would use a pool little, if any.

If conversation is to be translated into action, the entire community must give the matter serious thought. Citizens must review the problems involved and decide whether Wayne gets a pool or not.

Here are the major problems which must be considered by all who are genuinely interested in a pool.

First, there is the pocketbook problem. How much will a pool cost? How will it be paid for? What will this mean to me?

Before a price tag can be pinned on a proposed pool, two other questions must be decided. How big a pool does Wayne need? Will the building be done entirely by a contractor or will some labor and materials be donated?

Prices mentioned for a suitable contractor-built pool run between \$70,000 and \$80,000, although one engineer says a less expensive pool would provide adequate bathing facilities.

Whatever the size, there is no question that donated labor would reduce the cost materially. Great does this summer will open a pool built largely by donated labor, countless hours of it.

Regardless of how corners are cut, eventually monetary bedrock will be struck—the minimum number of dollars a pool will cost us. Where will they come from?

State law limits to \$35,000 the amount of municipal bonds that can be floated for a pool. Voters, of course, would have to approve issuing bonds. At present valuation, a one-mill tax levy would retire a \$35,000 issue in about 10 years.

To raise the amount needed to supplement a bond issue would require a well-organized fund raising

drive, generously supported by people throughout the Wayne area. Another, and perhaps as difficult, problem is location. A pool must be where most of the people want it, within the limits of property cost and engineering requirements. Some would be disappointed no matter where a pool was built. But surely, in all of Wayne, there must be a spot that would please most of the people.

While cost and location are major issues, there is a still greater one.

A tremendous amount of work is necessary to set machinery in motion to get a pool for Wayne! And it is unfair to expect City Council to shoulder the whole load. To be sure, if Wayne ever gets a pool the councilmen will play a major part.

But some civic group or groups, convinced that a pool is needed, must assume the gigantic task of organizing the fund drive and seeing it through. And the entire community must be ready to assist with dollars and work.

There is no easy way to transform conversation and dreams about a pool into reality!

If all New Year's resolutions were laid end to end they wouldn't reach to the first of February.

Ample the topics listed for discussion are farm outlook, crop varieties, bruchidiosis, plant diseases, insects, weed control and fertilizers.

Plan Now For Spring Tree Planting Orders are being taken now in the extension office for tree seedlings made available under the Clark-McNary farm forestry act.

These standards have been added to the available list for the first time this year. They are Nanking cherry, Cotoneaster and Tatarian honeysuckle. Ten broadleaf and five evergreen varieties also are available. Most of these species are well adapted to conditions in Wayne county to make suitable and effective windbreaks.

Fifty-two Wayne county farmers planted 14,500 of these trees in 1953.

Eggs in January Do you remember when farmers didn't expect the hens to lay during the cold winter months? As a result of improved breeding, feeding and care the modern hen starts laying several months earlier than she did 20 years ago and continues to lay throughout the winter.

Winter temperatures are responsible for more high quality eggs which are now in plentiful supply at reasonable prices.

Housewives have an advantage in winter because commercial breakers who buy for wholesale freezing or drying prefer to wait until later when yolks are deeper yellow when hens are on green feed.

FARM NEWS REVIEW AND FORECAST

"Our Roots Are In This Land"

Commodity Briefs

CATTLE

Shipments of stocker and feeder cattle to country points in October were about half of the number a year ago. For the July-November period they were 30% under a year ago. The nine Corn Belt states were down 30% in October and down 24% for July-November.

SHEEP

The USDA has announced a support price of not less than 52.1 cents per pound (grease basis) for 1954-produced wool. This reflects 90% of parity and is 1 cent below last year. Shipments of sheep to country points in Nebraska in October were down 6% from a year earlier. For the July-October period shipments were down 12%. In shipments of feeder lambs during November were down 14%. For the nine Corn Belt states they were down 9% in October and 24% for the July-October period compared to a year ago.

INCOME TAXES

The Department of Agricultural Economics of the University of Nebraska Extension Service has prepared a new farm income tax record book designed to make keeping farm records and filing income Taxes much easier. This new farm record book can be obtained from your county Agricultural Extension agent or directly from the Extension Service, College of Agriculture, Lincoln. The price is 40 cents to individuals or 35 cents to organizations which order quantities of 50 or more.



Farm Costs Production Costs

Although we do not have total farm expense data for Nebraska farms it is safe to say that production expenses have moved well beyond the half billion dollar mark. In the United States, estimated farm production expenses were 5 billion dollars in 1953. They were 23 billion dollars in 1952. Production expenses did not decline much in the United States in 1953 and are not expected to decline much in 1954. The same general pattern is expected in Nebraska.

prices. Farmers are expected to spend less freely on machinery in 1954 than in past years.

SEED COSTS VARIABLE

Bluegrass and redtop prices are exceedingly high and are expected to remain high until next harvest. Most other forage and grass seed prices are lower than a year earlier. In a majority of years, seed can be purchased at lower prices in the fall than in the spring. However, seed in abundant supply such as alfalfa, tall-fescue and Ladino clover may decline in price as the season progresses. Prices of alfalfa seed will be lower during 1953-54 than they have been for many years—so low that the amount harvested next year and in 1955 may fall off sharply. If this happens, prices could advance in the fall of 1954 and 1955 with tremendous income gains to those holding inventories.

Nitrogen is expected to be more plentiful and easier to get in the future. Two new manufacturing plants supplying Nebraska are expected to begin output in 1954—one south of Omaha and one in Lawrence, Kansas.

Phosphate is expected to be more plentiful next year than in the last few years. Potash is expected to exceed last year's supply by as much as 15%. While the anticipated supply of fertilizer is expected to increase in all three major classes it would be no more than is needed under favorable growing conditions.

With dry weather and low net incomes farmers may be discouraged in using normal or liberal applications of fertilizer. However, do not expect big bargains in fertilizer. Fertilizer manufacturing is highly concentrated among a few firms. Managers do not like to cut prices if it reduces their net income.

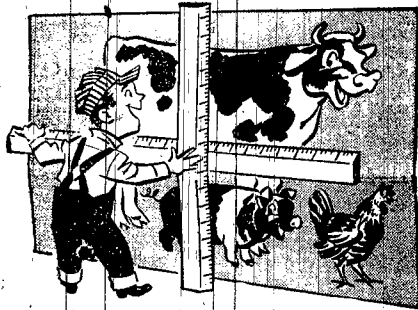
Where farmers are forced to cut back purchases in response to lower net incomes, prices of some production supplies may weaken in 1954. Farmers can take some precautions in protecting themselves against the cost-price squeeze but the entire problem can not be solved there. Buying at the lowest price is a task that includes more than finding the store with the lowest price. Checking two or three sources of supplies to compare prices is an easy task. Determining the best time to buy is not so easy unless you spend some time at it.

No bargains are expected in interest, taxes, wage rates and petroleum products in 1954. There may be some limited price concessions in chemicals and fertilizers. Seasonal price patterns of manufactured products are not as pronounced as in farm products because most manufacturers operate on a cost-plus plan of pricing.

MACHINERY COSTS CONTINUE HIGH

Prices of farm machinery in 1954 are expected to remain near current levels. Farm machinery manufacturers are not like farmers; they cut production back sharply when sales lag and inventories advance. This helps them to maintain high

Usefulness of Feed-Price Ratios



Their Meaning and How To Calculate

The livestock producer will plan his operations several months in advance to make his production program fit in with economic conditions as he interprets them. He must decide whether to buy or sell feed and whether to increase his livestock holdings or whether to reduce them.

No one can be sure that price predictions will materialize but a study of price relationships will give a better background on which to base judgments than if no such study was made. The relative prices of different available feeds and different kinds of livestock permit a rather wide choice of livestock enterprises which may be undertaken.

Not only does the livestock producer have the alternative of selling feed or feeding it but if the decision is to feed it, then he has the alternative of choosing the livestock enterprise that he considers will be most profitable.

HOW TO CALCULATE RATIO

There are four price ratios which are of more or less common interest to Nebraska farmers. These are: (1) the hog-corn ratio; (2) the beef-corn ratio; (3) the butterfat-feed ratio and (4) the egg-feed ratio. The hog- and beef-corn ratios indicate the number of bushels of corn that 100 pounds of live weight of hog or cattle will buy. For instance, if corn is worth \$1.50 per bushel and hogs are worth \$19.00 per 100 pounds then \$19 divided by \$1.50 equals 12.7 bushels of corn that 100 pounds of live hog will buy.

Experience and tests show that 100 pounds live weight must usually equal the value of about 11 bushels of corn if hogs are to prove a profitable venture for the average farmer. The ratio is expressed thus 1:11. The ratio of 1:12.7 obtained above would indicate a greater possibility of profits than if the ratio was 1:11 or a lower number. Hog- and beef-corn ratios for the past 13 months in Nebraska and the United States are shown in the following table:

The prices used in the tabulation were reported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as those received by farmers on the 15th of each month. No distinction is made as to grade or quality but average prices for all grades are given.

MEANING OF RATIOS

A study of the ratios will possibly indicate profit trends for the entire group but will not necessarily insure profits on an individual enterprise.

The ratios are based on average prices of corn, hogs and cattle in the above table. Some stock growers and feeders use a higher percentage of corn than others, and then too, some market a higher quality livestock than do other feeders. Some market their cattle as grassers without feeding them any corn. These and other practices followed by an individual may cause a different earning pattern than that indicated by the feed-price ratio.

Each livestock producer must decide for himself whether or not his methods of feeding and handling of livestock are likely to return a profit. The feed-price ratio, if covering a sufficient period of time, may be a valuable indicator to use in making this decision because it may indicate whether or not prices are favorable to him.

FORMULA of Butterfat- and Egg-Feed RATIOS

The butterfat-feed ratio and the egg-feed ratio may be used to advantage in the same manner as the hog-corn and beef-corn ratios. The butterfat-feed ratio shows the number of pounds of feed that one pound of butterfat will buy. The feed used in this computation is a concentrate consisting of 2 parts by weight of corn meal, 1 part ground oats, 1 part wheat bran and 1 part soybean meal. The egg-feed ratio indicates the number of pounds of feed that can be bought with one dozen eggs. The feed used in this computation consists of scratch grain and mash fed in equal parts. The scratch grain consist of 2 parts by weight of corn, 1 part wheat and 1 part oats. The mash to consist of 1 part corn meal, 1 part ground oats, 1 part shorts, 1 part bran and 1 part meat scrap. Butterfat- and Egg-Feed ratios for the past 13 months in Nebraska and the United States are shown in the following table:

THE ECONOMIC SITUATION

"Business continued active in the opening weeks of the fall season, with the major economic sectors showing relatively small changes. Production schedules in a number of industries were trimmed to restrain inventory growth. The business picture continued to encompass mixed trends, however, and some industries were showing a firmer tone.

"Retail sales in October held at the September rate, following small reductions on a seasonally adjusted basis in the previous two months. Steel

operations at 95% of capacity averaged above the reduced summer rate.

"These developments were accompanied by some layoffs of workers though not on a widespread scale, and unemployment remained at its postwar low. Although in many manufacturing industries the usual seasonal expansion of employment did not materialize, in large part the moderate curtailment of manufacturing production has been brought about by a reduction in the work week." —Survey of Current Business, Nov. 1953.

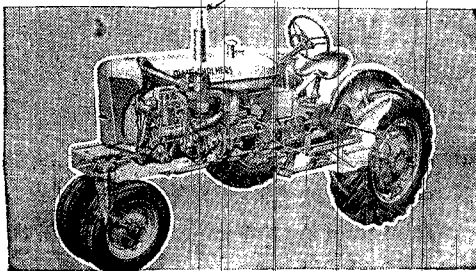

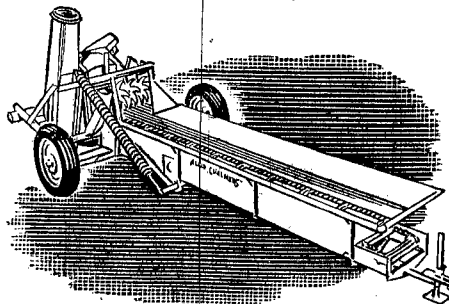

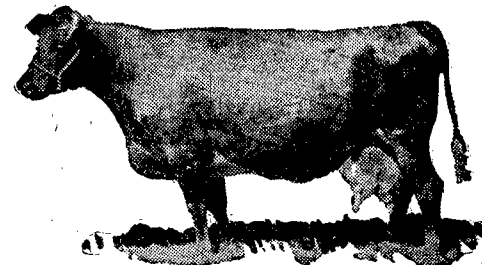
