Music Boosters Meet At High School

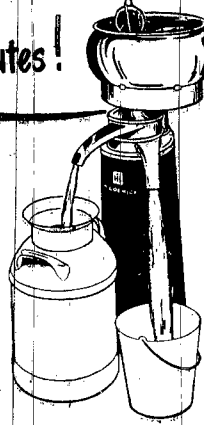

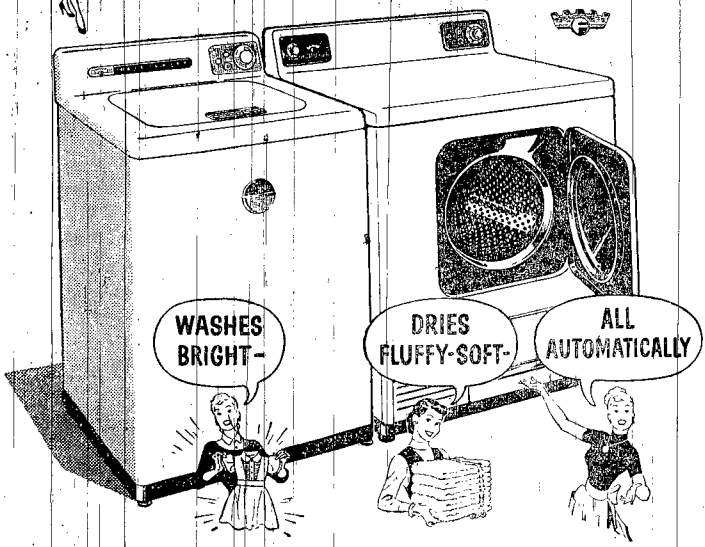

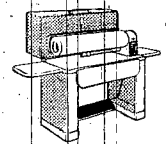

If we ever did yield, however, our usefulness as a newspaper would diminish. We would be denying you of one of your basic rights in a democracy—the right to be fully informed by a free press.

We ask anyone who may ever think of asking us not to print something, to consider seriously the following before making such a request:

The Herald does not make the news, it only reports it. And it will strive always to report all the news. If The Herald does not print news it will be because of failure to get it, not because someone has pleaded with us or attempted to pressure us into not publishing news.

When you stop to think, don't forget to start again.

So Now It's Swords!

It's latest effort to cure sinking morale, the Navy has turned to swords—a relic of the days of John Paul Jones.

Yes, on dress occasions naval officers henceforth will wear swords, just like before Pearl Harbor. Nice, shining, long, curved swords. With a glistening sword dangling awkwardly at his side, a naval officer automatically will swell with pride in his profession—so the Pentagon admirals reason.

And if you wonder why morale in the services is low, just ponder that one a while. It typifies much of the thinking, or lack of it, that keeps spirits depressed among thousands of our career servicemen, whether they are corporals or generals, admirals or seamen.

Sure, John Paul Jones wore a sword. But not to look fancy. He used it to defend his country.

He got high morale with vigorous leadership and by putting the safety and comfort of those under him uppermost in his mind. He didn't waste time figuring how he could borrow some relic of the past to pretty up his officers.

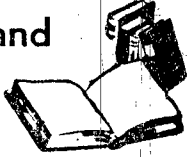

Big guns in the victory were Forward Dave Steele and Guard Ted Tow. Each scored 19 points, most of them coming in the first half.

Stanton led 15-10 at the end of the first quarter but Wayne knotted it up and went ahead 16-15 shortly after the second quarter opened. The Blue Devils led only once more in the contest, 21-19.

Control Boards

Local fans who traveled to the game consistently questioned the calls of the officials with raucous cheers but the biggest factor in the defeat was the cold shooting of the Blue Devils. Another was Stanton's ability to control the boards with its height and weight. Wayne, usually a good rebounding team, was forced to yield after Larry Hofeldt and Lowell Johnson had three fouls apiece early in the second quarter.

Referee Best was filling in for another official originally selected for the game. He called them closely and was forced to make many rulings not his own when his partner Russ Gorman seemed reluctant to blow his whistle.

Wayne definitely missed Guard Rod Thersort, who will be out for three weeks with a broken hand. Coach Harold Madejewski started Glen Hofelder in his place and experimented with several combinations in an effort to find one which would click in the scoring column. All his efforts were to no avail.

Wayne reserves suffered a similar disaster, losing 83-28. They had to rely from an 18-11 deficit midway in the second quarter.

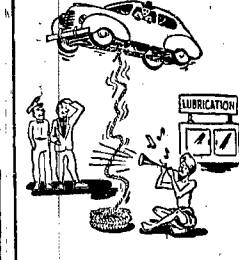

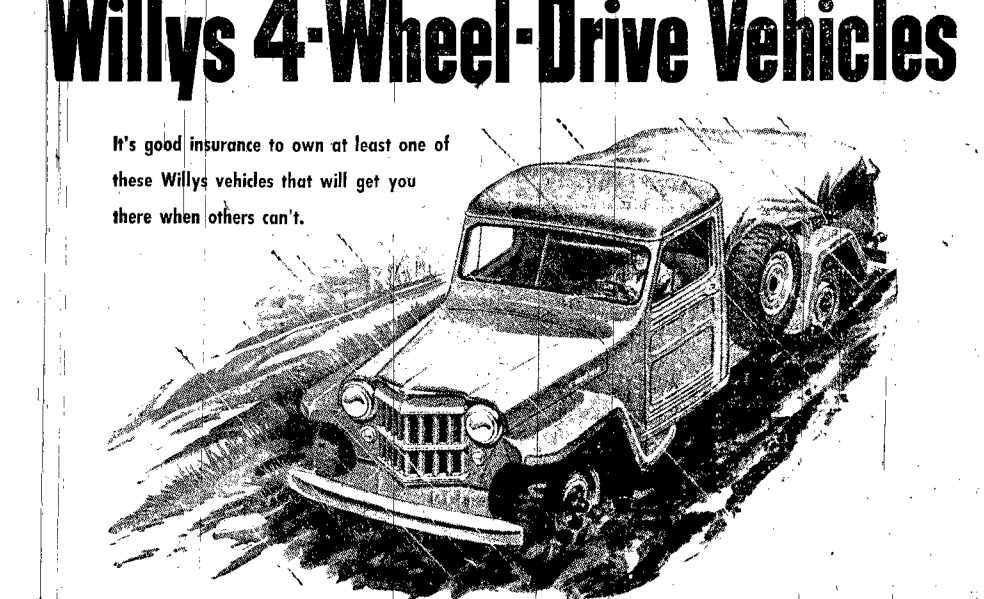
